Appellation as a Noun

Definitions of "Appellation" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “appellation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A name or title.*
- *A geographical indication used to identify where the grapes for a wine are grown.*
- *Identifying word or words by which someone or something is called and classified or distinguished from others.*
- *The action of giving a name to someone or something.*



Synonyms of "Appellation" as a noun (12 Words)

- appellative** A common noun, such as 'doctor', 'mother', or 'sir', used as a vocative.
A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name).
- byname** *Surnames started off as **byname**s to distinguish two persons in the same locality.*
- denomination** A name or designation.
*Two cards of the same **denomination**.*
- designation** An official name, description, or title.
*Dibden Bay's **designation** as a Site of Special Scientific Interest.*
- epithet** An epithet used as a term of abuse.
*People jeered and hurled racial **epithets**.*

honorific	A tangible symbol signifying approval or distinction. <i>A sociolinguistic investigation of honorifics and their usage.</i>
label	(in a dictionary entry) a word or words used to specify the subject area, register, or geographical origin of the word being defined. <i>Independent labels.</i>
<u>name</u>	A language unit by which a person or thing is known. <i>Halt in the name of the law.</i>
<u>nickname</u>	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name). <i>Mallender's fair complexion gave rise to his nickname Ghost.</i>
sobriquet	A person's nickname. <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the sobriquet Duchesse.</i>
<u>tag</u>	The tip of an animal's tail when it is distinctively coloured. <i>I have a few tags of second hand equipment.</i>
<u>title</u>	A word such as Lord or Dame that is used before someone's name, or a form that is used instead of someone's name, to indicate high social or official rank. <i>The title Professor is reserved for one or two members of a department.</i>



Usage Examples of "Appellation" as a noun

- *The city fully justifies its appellation 'the Pearl of the Orient.'*



Associations of "Appellation" (30 Words)

alias	A name that has been assumed temporarily. <i>Fringes at higher spatial frequency are aliased by the sensor.</i>
anonymously	In a way that prevents a person from being identified by name. <i>Newman published two novels both anonymously.</i>
appoint	Furnish. <i>They appointed her as personnel manager.</i>
appointment	Law the act of disposing of property by virtue of the power of appointment. <i>Government ministers and other political appointments are frequently replaced.</i>
assign	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>They will ask you to assign your rights against the airline.</i>
assignment	An act of making a legal transfer of a right or liability. <i>The effective assignment of tasks.</i>
authorize	Give or delegate power or authority to. <i>The rock star never authorized this slanderous biography.</i>
autograph	Something written by one's own hand. <i>The earliest version of the work is possibly an autograph.</i>
candidate	A person or thing regarded as suitable for or likely to receive a particular fate, treatment, or position. <i>She was the perfect candidate for a biography.</i>
cognomen	The name used to identify the members of a family (as distinguished from each member's given name).
commissioned	Given official approval to act. <i>Those interested in pursuing careers as commissioned officers.</i>
commissioner	A government administrator. <i>A baseball commissioner.</i>
delegate	A member of a committee. <i>Congress delegates rejected the proposals.</i>
denominate	Assign a name or title to. <i>Two principal types of word associates can be denominated paradigmatic and syntagmatic.</i>
designate	Decree or designate beforehand. <i>He was designated as prime minister.</i>
designation	The action of choosing someone to hold an office or post. <i>A leader's designation of his own successor.</i>

epithet	An epithet used as a term of abuse. <i>People jeered and hurled racial epithets.</i>
excellency	An outstanding feature; something in which something or someone excels. <i>His Excellency the Indian Consul General.</i>
listing	The drawing up of a list.
memorandum	A note recording something for future use. <i>Articles of association must be signed by subscribers to the memorandum.</i>
moniker	A name. <i>His real moniker is Dave Kennedy.</i>
name	Assign a specified usually proper proper name to. <i>He wanted to protect his good name.</i>
necrology	An obituary notice.
nominate	Put forward nominate for appointment to an office or for an honor or position. <i>A day was nominated for the exchange of contracts.</i>
ordained	Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>An ordained priest.</i>
patronymic	A name derived from the name of a father or ancestor, e.g. Johnson, O'Brien, Ivanovich. <i>The patronymic naming of children.</i>
repute	The state of being highly regarded; fame. <i>The waters of the fountain are reputed to have healing properties.</i>
sobriquet	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name). <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the sobriquet Duchesse.</i>
stature	Importance or reputation gained by ability or achievement. <i>An architect of international stature.</i>
title	Give a title to. <i>He refused to give titles to his paintings.</i>
