## Associations of "Applauded" (30 Words)

<a href="#">acclaim</a>	Clap one’s hands or shout after performances to indicate approval. <i>The conference was <b>acclaimed</b> as a considerable success.</i>
acclamation	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in <b>acclamation</b>.</i>
admire	Feel admiration for. <i>I <b>admire</b> your courage.</i>
applause	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together. <i>They gave him a round of <b>applause</b>.</i>
bravo	A cry of bravo. <i><b>Bravos</b> rang out.</i>
clap	Clap one s hands together. <i>When the <b>clapping</b> had died down he stood up to make a speech.</i>
clapping	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together.
commend	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>Most one roomed flats have little to <b>commend</b> them.</i>
<a href="#">commendable</a>	Worthy of high praise. <i>He showed <b>commendable</b> restraint.</i>
<a href="#">compliment</a>	Formal greetings, especially when sent as a message. <i>She paid me an enormous <b>compliment</b>.</i>
congratulate	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>He had taken the chance to <b>congratulate</b> him on his marriage.</i>
creditable	(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful. <i>The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was <b>creditable</b>.</i>
eclat	Ceremonial elegance and splendor. <i>Entered with much <b>eclat</b> in a coach drawn by eight white horses.</i>
encomium	A formal expression of praise.

<b>enthusiastically</b>	In a lavish or enthusiastic manner. <i>The audience applauded <b>enthusiastically</b>.</i>
<b>eulogize</b>	Praise highly in speech or writing. <i>A plaque that <b>eulogizes</b> the workers.</i>
<b>eulogy</b>	A formal expression of praise for someone who has died recently. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<b>extol</b>	Praise enthusiastically. <i><b>Extol</b> the virtues of one's children.</i>
<b>flatter</b>	Give an unrealistically favourable impression of. <i>She felt <b>flattered</b> that he was confiding in her.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	Compliments or congratulations. <i>She was looking for <b>kudos</b> rather than profit.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise. <i>The obituary <b>lauded</b> him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
<b>laudable</b>	Worthy of high praise. <i><b>Laudable</b> though the aim might be the results have been criticized.</i>
<b>ovation</b>	A sustained and enthusiastic show of appreciation from an audience, especially by means of applause. <i>The performance received a thundering <b>ovation</b>.</i>
<b>panegyric</b>	A public speech or published text in praise of someone or something. <i>A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
<b>plaudit</b>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The <b>plaudits</b> for the winner died down.</i>
<b>praise</b>	The expression of approval or admiration for someone or something. <i>They sang a hymn of <b>praise</b> to God.</i>
<b>praiseworthy</b>	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>The government's <b>praiseworthy</b> efforts.</i>
<b>praising</b>	Full of or giving praise.
<b>thunderous</b>	Very loud. <i>World events of <b>thunderous</b> import.</i>
<b>uproarious</b>	Characterized by or provoking loud noise or uproar. <i>An <b>uproarious</b> party.</i>
