Ceremonial elegance and splendor. eclat Entered with much **eclat** in a coach drawn by eight white horses. encomium A formal expression of praise.



enthusiastically	, In a lavish or enthusiastic manner. <i>The audience applauded <b>enthusiastically</b>.</i>
eulogize	Praise highly in speech or writing. A plaque that <b>eulogize</b> s the workers.
<u>eulogy</u>	A formal expression of praise for someone who has died recently. A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.
<u>extol</u>	Praise enthusiastically. <i>Extol</i> the virtues of one s children.
<u>flatter</u>	Give an unrealistically favourable impression of. She felt <b>flatter</b> ed that he was confiding in her.
kudos	Compliments or congratulations. She was looking for <b>kudos</b> rather than profit.
laud	Praise. The obituary <b>laud</b> ed him as a great statesman and soldier.
laudable	Worthy of high praise. <i>Laudable</i> though the aim might be the results have been criticized.
ovation	A sustained and enthusiastic show of appreciation from an audience, especially by means of applause. The performance received a thundering <b>ovation</b> .
panegyric	A public speech or published text in praise of someone or something. A <i>panegyric</i> on the pleasures of malt whisky.
plaudit	Enthusiastic approval. The <b>plaudit</b> s for the winner died down.
praise	The expression of approval or admiration for someone or something. <i>They sang a hymn of</i> <b>praise</b> <i>to God</i> .
praiseworthy	Deserving approval and admiration. The government s <b>praiseworthy</b> efforts.
praising	Full of or giving praise.
thunderous	Very loud. World events of <b>thunderous</b> import.
uproarious	Characterized by or provoking loud noise or uproar. An <b>uproarious</b> party.
