rudimentary	Relating to an immature, undeveloped, or basic form. <i>Rudimentary wings.</i>
serviceable	Intended or able to serve a purpose without elaboration. <i>Heavy serviceable fabrics.</i>
speculative	Engaged in, expressing, or based on conjecture rather than knowledge. <i>Speculative knowledge.</i>
substantive	Of or relating to the real nature or essential elements of something. <i>There is no substantive evidence for the efficacy of these drugs.</i>
theoretical	Concerned primarily with theories or hypotheses rather than practical considerations. <i>Theoretical physics.</i>
utilitarian	Relating to or adhering to the doctrine of utilitarianism. <i>A utilitarian building.</i>
