Appraisal as a Noun

Definitions of "Appraisal" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “appraisal” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A document appraising the value of something (as for insurance or taxation).*
- *The classification of someone or something with respect to its worth.*
- *An act of assessing something or someone.*
- *A formal assessment, typically in an interview, of the performance of an employee over a particular period.*
- *An expert estimation of the quality, quantity, and other characteristics of someone or something.*

judgement	(law) the determination by a court of competent jurisdiction on matters submitted to it. <i>County court judgements against individuals in debt.</i>
rating	A non-commissioned sailor in the navy. <i>The rest of the new crew was made up of naval ratings.</i>
sizing up	Any glutinous material used to fill pores in surfaces or to stiffen fabrics.

critically	To a potentially disastrous degree. <i>Two critically wounded people died in hospital.</i>
dissect	Analyse (a text or idea) in minute detail. <i>An animal's eye can be easily dissected.</i>
estimate	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>It is estimated that smoking causes 100 000 premature deaths every year.</i>
estimation	A judgement of the worth or character of someone or something. <i>In my estimation the boy is innocent.</i>
evaluate	Evaluate or estimate the nature quality ability extent or significance of. <i>How do you evaluate this grant proposal.</i>
evaluation	An appraisal of the value of something. <i>An initial evaluation of the programme.</i>
feasibility	The quality of being doable. <i>The feasibility of screening athletes for cardiac disease.</i>
gauge	Measure the dimensions of an object with a gauge. <i>Mark out the details of the angled surfaces with a knife and gauge.</i>
grading	The act of arranging in a graduated series. <i>What he disliked about teaching was all the grading he had to do.</i>
guess	Form a correct conclusion about something by guessing. <i>She guessed the child's age at 14 or 15.</i>
judge	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>A distinguished panel of judges select the winning design.</i>
judgement	The cognitive process of reaching a decision or drawing conclusions. <i>That is not in my judgement the end of the matter.</i>
judgment	The legal document stating the reasons for a judicial decision. <i>They criticized my judgment of the contestants.</i>
likelihood	The state or fact of something's being likely; probability. <i>Situations where there is a likelihood of violence.</i>
measure	Determine the measurements of something or somebody take measurements of. <i>The measurements were carefully done.</i>
rubric	A direction in a liturgical book as to how a church service should be conducted. <i>It is usually discussed under the rubric of functional obesity.</i>

subjectively	In a subjective way. <i>The natural tendency we have to impute subjectively perceived qualities to objects.</i>
underrate	Make too low an estimate of. <i>They vastly underrate their own players.</i>
valuation	An appraisal of the value of something. <i>The valuation of this property is much too high.</i>
valued	Held in great esteem for admirable qualities especially of an intrinsic nature. <i>Triple valued.</i>
yardstick	A standard used for comparison. <i>League tables are not the only yardstick of schools performance.</i>
