Synonyms of "Apprise" as a verb (20 Words)

advise	Offer suggestions about the best course of action to someone. <i>I advised him that the rent was due.</i>
appreciate	Hold dear. <i>The yen appreciated again.</i>
apprize	Put a price on; appraise. <i>The sheriff was to apprize the value of the lands.</i>

<u>brief</u>	Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>The reporters were briefed about the President's plan to invade.</i>
enlighten	Give (someone) greater knowledge and understanding about a subject or situation. <i>Christopher had not enlightened Francis as to their relationship.</i>
give notice	Dedicate.
inform	Give incriminating information about someone to the police or other authority. <i>He had been recruited by the KGB to inform on his fellow students.</i>
<u>instruct</u>	Give instructions or directions for some task. <i>Instructing electors how to record their votes.</i>
intimate	Give to understand.
keep posted	Continue a certain state, condition, or activity.
keep up to date	Retain rights to.
keep up to speed	Supply with room and board.
let know	Make it possible through a specific action or lack of action for something to happen.
make aware of	Prepare for eating by applying heat.
notify	Inform (somebody) of something. <i>You will be notified of our decision as soon as possible.</i>
revalue	Adjust the value of (a currency) in relation to other currencies. <i>We should revalue our land and buildings at least once every five years.</i>
send word	To cause or order to be taken, directed, or transmitted to another place.
send word to	Cause to be directed or transmitted to another place.
tell	Decide or determine correctly or with certainty. <i>He's telling the truth.</i>
update	Make (something) more modern or up to date. <i>Security measures are continually updated and improved.</i>

Usage Examples of "Apprise" as a verb

- *Have the students been apprised of the tuition hike?*
- *I thought it right to apprise Chris of what had happened.*

Associations of "Apprise" (30 Words)

acquaint	Know someone slightly. <i>New staff should be acquainted with fire exit routes.</i>
admonitory	Expressing reproof or reproach especially as a corrective. <i>The sergeant lifted an admonitory finger.</i>
advice	A proposal for an appropriate course of action. <i>Remittance advices.</i>
advise	Make a proposal, declare a plan for something. <i>You will be advised of the requirements.</i>
advisor	An expert who gives advice. <i>The United States sent military advisors to Guatemala.</i>
announce	Make known make an announcement. <i>The President s office announced that the siege would be lifted.</i>
announcement	The action of making an announcement. <i>The announcement of the decision of the European Parliament.</i>
counsel	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>The lawyer counselled me when I was accused of tax fraud.</i>
counseling	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action.
educational	Relating to the provision of education. <i>Children with special educational needs.</i>
guidance	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>He looked to his father for inspiration and guidance.</i>
impart	Bestow a quality on. <i>The teachers imparted a great deal of knowledge to their pupils.</i>
inform	Give incriminating information about someone to the police or other authority. <i>Religion informs every aspect of their lives.</i>
informing	A speech act that conveys information.
instruct	Give instructions or directions for some task. <i>Instructing electors how to record their votes.</i>
instructive	Useful and informative. <i>It is instructive to compare the two projects.</i>
interpretive	That provides interpretation.

message	Send as a message. <i>If I m not there leave a message on the answerphone.</i>
notification	An accusation of crime made by a grand jury on its own initiative. <i>The notification stated the grace period and the penalties for defaulting.</i>
notify	Inform (someone) of something, typically in a formal or official manner. <i>Births and deaths are required by law to be notified to the Registrar.</i>
orientation	Position or alignment relative to points of the compass or other specific directions. <i>Studies of locational awareness and orientation in young children.</i>
pronouncement	A formal or authoritative announcement or declaration. <i>Distrust of the pronouncements of politicians was endemic.</i>
<u>proposition</u>	(logic) a statement that affirms or denies something and is either true or false. <i>Californian voters rejected by a two to one majority proposition 128.</i>
sizing	Any glutinous material used to fill pores in surfaces or to stiffen fabrics.
snitch	Steal. <i>They thought he was a plant or a snitch.</i>
statement	(music) the presentation of a musical theme. <i>A reassessment of statemented children.</i>
teach	Work as a teacher. <i>I ll teach you to throw rocks at my windows.</i>
telegram	A message transmitted by telegraph.
tell	Communicate information to someone in spoken or written words. <i>I tell you that man is a crook.</i>
tip	Remove the tip from. <i>George pressed the tips of his fingers together.</i>
