### Synonyms of "Apprise" as a verb (20 Words)

<b>advise</b>	Offer suggestions about the best course of action to someone. <i>I <b>advised</b> him that the rent was due.</i>
<b>appreciate</b>	Hold dear. <i>The yen <b>appreciated</b> again.</i>
<b>apprize</b>	Put a price on; appraise. <i>The sheriff was to <b>apprize</b> the value of the lands.</i>

<b>brief</b>	Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>The reporters were <b>briefed</b> about the President's plan to invade.</i>
<b>enlighten</b>	Give (someone) greater knowledge and understanding about a subject or situation. <i>Christopher had not <b>enlightened</b> Francis as to their relationship.</i>
<b>give notice</b>	Dedicate.
<b>inform</b>	Give incriminating information about someone to the police or other authority. <i>He had been recruited by the KGB to <b>inform</b> on his fellow students.</i>
<b>instruct</b>	Give instructions or directions for some task. <i><b>Instructing</b> electors how to record their votes.</i>
<b>intimate</b>	Give to understand.
<b>keep posted</b>	Continue a certain state, condition, or activity.
<b>keep up to date</b>	Retain rights to.
<b>keep up to speed</b>	Supply with room and board.
<b>let know</b>	Make it possible through a specific action or lack of action for something to happen.
<b>make aware of</b>	Prepare for eating by applying heat.
<b>notify</b>	Inform (somebody) of something. <i>You will be notified of our decision as soon as possible.</i>
<b>revalue</b>	Adjust the value of (a currency) in relation to other currencies. <i>We should <b>revalue</b> our land and buildings at least once every five years.</i>
<b>send word</b>	To cause or order to be taken, directed, or transmitted to another place.
<b>send word to</b>	Cause to be directed or transmitted to another place.
<b>tell</b>	Decide or determine correctly or with certainty. <i>He's <b>telling</b> the truth.</i>
<b>update</b>	Make (something) more modern or up to date. <i>Security measures are continually <b>updated</b> and improved.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Apprise" as a verb

- *Have the students been apprised of the tuition hike?*
- *I thought it right to apprise Chris of what had happened.*

<b>acquaint</b>	Know someone slightly. <i>New staff should be <b>acquainted</b> with fire exit routes.</i>
<b>admonitory</b>	Expressing reproof or reproach especially as a corrective. <i>The sergeant lifted an <b>admonitory</b> finger.</i>
<b>advice</b>	A proposal for an appropriate course of action. <i>Remittance <b>advices</b>.</i>
<b>advise</b>	Make a proposal, declare a plan for something. <i>You will be <b>advised</b> of the requirements.</i>
<b>advisor</b>	An expert who gives advice. <i>The United States sent military <b>advisors</b> to Guatemala.</i>
<b>announce</b>	Make known make an announcement. <i>The President s office <b>announced</b> that the siege would be lifted.</i>
<b>announcement</b>	The action of making an announcement. <i>The <b>announcement</b> of the decision of the European Parliament.</i>
<b>counsel</b>	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>The lawyer <b>counselled</b> me when I was accused of tax fraud.</i>
<b>counseling</b>	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action.
<b>educational</b>	Relating to the provision of education. <i>Children with special <b>educational</b> needs.</i>
<b>guidance</b>	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>He looked to his father for inspiration and <b>guidance</b>.</i>
<b>impart</b>	Bestow a quality on. <i>The teachers <b>imparted</b> a great deal of knowledge to their pupils.</i>
<b>inform</b>	Give incriminating information about someone to the police or other authority. <i>Religion <b>informs</b> every aspect of their lives.</i>
<b>informing</b>	A speech act that conveys information.
<b>instruct</b>	Give instructions or directions for some task. <i><b>Instructing</b> electors how to record their votes.</i>
<b>instructive</b>	Useful and informative. <i>It is <b>instructive</b> to compare the two projects.</i>
<b>interpretive</b>	That provides interpretation.

<b>message</b>	Send as a message. <i>If I m not there leave a <b>message</b> on the answerphone.</i>
<b>notification</b>	An accusation of crime made by a grand jury on its own initiative. <i>The <b>notification</b> stated the grace period and the penalties for defaulting.</i>
<b>notify</b>	Inform (someone) of something, typically in a formal or official manner. <i>Births and deaths are required by law to be notified to the Registrar.</i>
<b>orientation</b>	Position or alignment relative to points of the compass or other specific directions. <i>Studies of locational awareness and <b>orientation</b> in young children.</i>
<b>pronouncement</b>	A formal or authoritative announcement or declaration. <i>Distrust of the <b>pronouncements</b> of politicians was endemic.</i>
<b><u>proposition</u></b>	(logic) a statement that affirms or denies something and is either true or false. <i>Californian voters rejected by a two to one majority <b>proposition</b> 128.</i>
<b>sizing</b>	Any glutinous material used to fill pores in surfaces or to stiffen fabrics.
<b>snitch</b>	Steal. <i>They thought he was a plant or a <b>snitch</b>.</i>
<b>statement</b>	(music) the presentation of a musical theme. <i>A reassessment of <b>statemented</b> children.</i>
<b>teach</b>	Work as a teacher. <i>I ll <b>teach</b> you to throw rocks at my windows.</i>
<b>telegram</b>	A message transmitted by telegraph.
<b>tell</b>	Communicate information to someone in spoken or written words. <i>I <b>tell</b> you that man is a crook.</i>
<b>tip</b>	Remove the tip from. <i>George pressed the <b>tips</b> of his fingers together.</i>
