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| acceptance | Banking: a time draft drawn on and accepted by a bank. <i>Her acceptance of the gift encouraged him.</i> |
| admiration | Respect and warm approval. <i>They were lost in admiration of the scenery.</i> |
| appreciation | Recognition and enjoyment of the good qualities of someone or something. <i>I smiled in appreciation.</i> |
| approval | Acceptance as satisfactory. <i>They have delayed the launch to await project approvals.</i> |

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| assent | The expression of approval or agreement. <i>He gave his assent eagerly.</i> |
| commendation | Formal or official praise. <i>The detectives received commendations for bravery.</i> |
| congratulations | An expression of pleasure at the success or good fortune of another. |
| encouragement | The expression of approval and support. <i>The encouragement of foreign investment.</i> |
| endorsement | (in the UK) a note on a driving licence recording the penalty points incurred for a driving offence. <i>The cashier would not cash the check without an endorsement.</i> |
| recognition | Identification of someone or something or person from previous encounters or knowledge. <i>Experimental psychologists measure the elapsed time from the onset of the stimulus to its recognition by the observer.</i> |
| respect | The state of being admired or respected. <i>Out of respect for his privacy.</i> |
| support | The action of supporting something or someone or the state of being supported. <i>He applied to the state for support.</i> |

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| accede | Become a member of an organization. <i>By now John had died and Henry III had acceded.</i> |
| acceptance | (contract law) words signifying consent to the terms of an offer (thereby creating a contract). <i>A banker's acceptance.</i> |
| admissible | Deserving to be admitted. <i>Foreigners were admissible only as temporary workers.</i> |
| admittedly | As acknowledged. <i>Admittedly the salary was not wonderful.</i> |
| agree | Show grammatical agreement. <i>White wine doesn't agree with me.</i> |

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| agreed | United by being of the same opinion. <i>All the republics are agreed on the necessity of a common defence policy.</i> |
| allow | Allow the presence of or allow an activity without opposing or prohibiting. <i>Could happen she allowed indifferently.</i> |
| approval | Acceptance as satisfactory. <i>Words of approval seldom passed his lips.</i> |
| approve | Believe that someone or something is good or acceptable. <i>He approved himself ripe for military command.</i> |
| assent | Agreement with a statement or proposal to do something. <i>Guest house then Frank assented cheerfully.</i> |
| authorization | Official permission or approval. <i>Horowitz handed him the authorization signed by Evans.</i> |
| concur | Be in accord; be in agreement. <i>In tests cytogenetic determination has been found to concur with enzymatic determination.</i> |
| concurrence | Agreement of results or opinions. <i>Delays can be avoided by arriving at political concurrence at the start.</i> |
| consensus | A general agreement. <i>A consensus view.</i> |
| consent | Give an affirmative reply to; respond favorably to. <i>No change may be made without the consent of all the partners.</i> |
| constitution | The constitution written at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787 and subsequently ratified by the original thirteen states. <i>The constitution of a PTA group last year.</i> |
| endorsement | The action of endorsing someone or something. <i>The entertainer made millions from Pepsi endorsements.</i> |
| license | The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization. <i>I am licensed to practice law in this state.</i> |
| ok | An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence. <i>Things are okay.</i> |
| okay | In a satisfactory or adequate manner; ('alright' is a nonstandard variant of 'all right'). <i>She ll do okay on her own.</i> |
| permissible | That may be accepted or conceded. <i>Permissible behavior in school.</i> |

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| permission | The action of officially allowing someone to do a particular thing; consent or authorization. <i>Permissions to reproduce copyright material.</i> |
| <u>permit</u> | Authorize or allow (something). <i>The country is not ready to permit any rice imports.</i> |
| ratification | Making something valid by formally ratifying or confirming it. <i>Ratification of the treaty raised problems in several member states.</i> |
| ratify | Approve and express assent, responsibility, or obligation. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i> |
| sanction | Give sanction to. <i>The scheme was sanctioned by the court.</i> |
| <u>treaty</u> | A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year treaty of solidarity.</i> |
| <u>unanimous</u> | (of an opinion, decision, or vote) held or carried by everyone involved. <i>A unanimous decision.</i> |
| unanimously | Of one mind; without dissent. <i>A committee of MPs has unanimously agreed to back his bill.</i> |
| <u>yes</u> | An affirmative answer or decision, especially in voting. <i>Answering with assured and ardent yeses.</i> |
