<b>appreciation</b>	Recognition and enjoyment of the good qualities of someone or something. <i>I smiled in <b>appreciation</b>.</i>
<b>approval</b>	Acceptance as satisfactory. <i>They have delayed the launch to await project <b>approvals</b>.</i>

<b>assent</b>	The expression of approval or agreement. <i>He gave his <b>assent</b> eagerly.</i>
<b>commendation</b>	Formal or official praise. <i>The detectives received <b>commendations</b> for bravery.</i>
<b>congratulations</b>	An expression of pleasure at the success or good fortune of another.
<b>encouragement</b>	The expression of approval and support. <i>The <b>encouragement</b> of foreign investment.</i>
<b>endorsement</b>	(in the UK) a note on a driving licence recording the penalty points incurred for a driving offence. <i>The cashier would not cash the check without an <b>endorsement</b>.</i>
<b>recognition</b>	Identification of someone or something or person from previous encounters or knowledge. <i>Experimental psychologists measure the elapsed time from the onset of the stimulus to its <b>recognition</b> by the observer.</i>
<b>respect</b>	The state of being admired or respected. <i>Out of <b>respect</b> for his privacy.</i>
<b>support</b>	The action of supporting something or someone or the state of being supported. <i>He applied to the state for <b>support</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Approbation" (30 Words)

<b><u>accede</u></b>	Become a member of an organization. <i>By now John had died and Henry III had <b>acceded</b>.</i>
<b>acceptance</b>	(contract law) words signifying consent to the terms of an offer (thereby creating a contract). <i>A banker s <b>acceptance</b>.</i>
<b><u>admissible</u></b>	Deserving to be admitted. <i>Foreigners were <b>admissible</b> only as temporary workers.</i>
<b>admittedly</b>	As acknowledged. <i><b>Admittedly</b> the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<b><u>agree</u></b>	Show grammatical agreement. <i>White wine doesn t <b>agree</b> with me.</i>

<b><u>agreed</u></b>	United by being of the same opinion. <i>All the republics are <b>agreed</b> on the necessity of a common defence policy.</i>
<b>allow</b>	Allow the presence of or allow an activity without opposing or prohibiting. <i>Could happen she <b>allowed</b> indifferently.</i>
<b>approval</b>	Acceptance as satisfactory. <i>Words of <b>approval</b> seldom passed his lips.</i>
<b>approve</b>	Believe that someone or something is good or acceptable. <i>He <b>approved</b> himself ripe for military command.</i>
<b>assent</b>	Agreement with a statement or proposal to do something. <i>Guest house then Frank <b>assented</b> cheerfully.</i>
<b>authorization</b>	Official permission or approval. <i>Horowitz handed him the <b>authorization</b> signed by Evans.</i>
<b>concur</b>	Be in accord; be in agreement. <i>In tests cytogenetic determination has been found to <b>concur</b> with enzymatic determination.</i>
<b>concurrence</b>	Agreement of results or opinions. <i>Delays can be avoided by arriving at political <b>concurrence</b> at the start.</i>
<b><u>consensus</u></b>	A general agreement. <i>A <b>consensus</b> view.</i>
<b><u>consent</u></b>	Give an affirmative reply to; respond favorably to. <i>No change may be made without the <b>consent</b> of all the partners.</i>
<b><u>constitution</u></b>	The constitution written at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787 and subsequently ratified by the original thirteen states. <i>The <b>constitution</b> of a PTA group last year.</i>
<b>endorsement</b>	The action of endorsing someone or something. <i>The entertainer made millions from Pepsi <b>endorsements</b>.</i>
<b><u>license</u></b>	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization. <i>I am <b>licensed</b> to practice law in this state.</i>
<b>ok</b>	An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence. <i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>
<b>okay</b>	In a satisfactory or adequate manner; ('alright' is a nonstandard variant of 'all right'). <i>She ll do <b>okay</b> on her own.</i>
<b>permissible</b>	That may be accepted or conceded. <i><b>Permissible</b> behavior in school.</i>

<b>permission</b>	The action of officially allowing someone to do a particular thing; consent or authorization. <i><b>Permissions</b> to reproduce copyright material.</i>
<u><b>permit</b></u>	Authorize or allow (something). <i>The country is not ready to <b>permit</b> any rice imports.</i>
<b>ratification</b>	Making something valid by formally ratifying or confirming it. <i><b>Ratification</b> of the treaty raised problems in several member states.</i>
<b>ratify</b>	Approve and express assent, responsibility, or obligation. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
<b>sanction</b>	Give sanction to. <i>The scheme was <b>sanctioned</b> by the court.</i>
<u><b>treaty</b></u>	A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<u><b>unanimous</b></u>	(of an opinion, decision, or vote) held or carried by everyone involved. <i>A <b>unanimous</b> decision.</i>
<b>unanimously</b>	Of one mind; without dissent. <i>A committee of MPs has <b>unanimously</b> agreed to back his bill.</i>
<u><b>yes</b></u>	An affirmative answer or decision, especially in voting. <i>Answering with assured and ardent <b>yeses</b>.</i>
