congruous	In agreement or harmony. <i>This explanation is congruous with earlier observations.</i>
disposed	Usually followed by to naturally disposed toward. <i>James didn't seem disposed to take the hint.</i>
felicitous	Pleasing and fortunate. <i>The view was the room's only felicitous feature.</i>
fit	Having the requisite qualities or skills to undertake something competently. <i>Keeps fit with diet and exercise.</i>
fitting	Being precisely fitting and right. <i>A fitting reward.</i>
given	Inclined or disposed to. <i>She was not often given to anger.</i>
inclined	At an angle to the horizontal or vertical position. <i>An inclined ramp.</i>
intelligent	(of a computer terminal) incorporating a microprocessor and having its own processing capability. <i>Anna is intelligent and hard working.</i>
judicious	Having, showing, or done with good judgement or sense. <i>The judicious use of public investment.</i>
liable	Subject to legal action. <i>Liable to criminal charges.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>She is likely to forget.</i>
minded	Naturally disposed toward. <i>I am not minded to answer any questions.</i>
pertinent	Relevant or applicable to a particular matter; apposite. <i>Practitioners must consider all factors pertinent to a situation.</i>

<u>predisposed</u>	Made susceptible. <i>Because of conditions in the mine miners are predisposed to lung disease.</i>
<u>prone</u>	With a downward slope or direction. <i>A child prone to mischief.</i>
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>A quick temper.</i>
quick to learn	Performed with little or no delay.
ready	Completely prepared or in condition for immediate action or use or progress. <i>Could you have the list ready by this afternoon.</i>
<u>relevant</u>	Closely connected or appropriate to what is being done or considered. <i>Critics may find themselves unable to stay relevant in a changing world.</i>
<u>sharp</u>	Of a key having a sharp or sharps in the signature. <i>Sharp criticism.</i>
smart	(of a place) fashionable and upmarket. <i>You look very smart.</i>
<u>subject</u>	Possibly accepting or permitting. <i>Subject peoples.</i>
<u>suitable</u>	Right or appropriate for a particular person, purpose, or situation. <i>These toys are not suitable for children under five.</i>
tending	(usually followed by `to') naturally disposed toward.

fain	In a willing manner. <i>I would fain do it.</i>
felicitous	Well chosen or suited to the circumstances. <i>A felicitous phrase.</i>
<u>gladly</u>	With pleasure or gratitude; happily. <i>She offered me a lift and I gladly accepted.</i>
inclined	Having made preparations. <i>An inclined ramp.</i>
licit	Sanctioned by custom or morality especially sexual morality. <i>Usage patterns differ between licit and illicit drugs.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>A likely result.</i>
<u>opportune</u>	(of a time) especially convenient or appropriate for a particular action or event. <i>He couldn't have arrived at a less opportune moment.</i>

pertinence	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
pertinent	Relevant or applicable to a particular matter; apposite. <i>A list of articles pertinent to the discussion.</i>
<u>prone</u>	Lying face downward. <i>He was written off by many as too injury prone.</i>
proper	Belonging to oneself or itself; own. <i>Proper medical treatment.</i>
<u>properly</u>	Thoroughly; completely. <i>Please do your job properly.</i>
<u>punctual</u>	Acting or arriving or performed exactly at the time appointed. <i>She expected guests to be punctual at meals.</i>
ready	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use event etc. <i>A ready source of cash.</i>
<u>relevance</u>	The quality or state of being closely connected or appropriate. <i>This film has contemporary relevance.</i>
<u>relevant</u>	Having a bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>Her films are relevant for feminists today.</i>
rightness	The quality or state of being true or correct as a fact. <i>They are convinced of the rightness of their theories.</i>
