- accomplishment** The successful achievement of a task.  
*A poet of considerable **accomplishment**.*
- adeptness** Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.  
*His quick **adeptness** was a product of good design.*
- artistry** A superior skill that you can learn by study and practice and observation.  
*The **artistry** of the pianist.*
- bent** A natural talent or inclination.  
*A man of a religious **bent**.*
- calibre** The internal diameter or bore of a gun barrel.  
*Educational facilities of a very high **calibre**.*

<b>expertise</b>	Expert skill or knowledge in a particular field. <i>Technical <b>expertise</b>.</i>
<b>expertness</b>	Skillfulness by virtue of possessing special knowledge.
<b>facility</b>	Something designed and created to serve a particular function and to afford a particular convenience or service. <i>The assembly plant is an enormous <b>facility</b>.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	Subtly skillful handling of a situation. <i>Orchestral playing of great <b>finesse</b>.</i>
<b><u>flair</u></b>	Stylishness and originality. <i>He has a <b>flair</b> for mathematics.</i>
<b>genius</b>	Exceptional creative ability. <i>This young man is my good <b>genius</b> my guardian angel.</i>
<b>gift</b>	An act of giving something as a present. <i>He has a <b>gift</b> for comedy.</i>
<b>knack</b>	A tendency to do something. <i>He had a <b>knack</b> for communicating.</i>
<b><u>mastery</u></b>	Great skillfulness and knowledge of some subject or activity. <i><b>Mastery</b> of the seas.</i>
<b><u>prowess</u></b>	A superior skill that you can learn by study and practice and observation. <i>The hereditary nobility had no monopoly of skill and <b>prowess</b> in war.</i>
<b>skill</b>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The <b>skill</b> of a well trained boxer.</i>
<b><u>talent</u></b>	People possessing natural aptitude or skill. <i>A mighty steed bought from a Thessalian merchant for thirteen <b>talents</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Aptitude" (30 Words)

<b>ability</b>	Talent, skill, or proficiency in a particular area. <i>The manager had lost his <b>ability</b> to motivate the players.</i>
<b>able</b>	Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence. <i>A <b>capable</b> administrator.</i>
<b>aptness</b>	A disposition to behave in a certain way. <i>The <b>aptness</b> of iron to rust.</i>
<b>brawn</b>	Physical strength in contrast to intelligence. <i>Pork <b>brawn</b>.</i>
<b>capability</b>	The power or ability to do something. <i>Their nuclear weapons <b>capability</b>.</i>
<b>capacity</b>	An electrical phenomenon whereby an electric charge is stored. <i>When running at full <b>capacity</b> the factory will employ 450 people.</i>
<b>competence</b>	An income large enough to live on, typically an unearned one. <i>He found himself with an ample <b>competence</b> and no obligations.</i>
<b>deftness</b>	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.

<b>deserving</b>	(often used ironically) worthy of being treated in a particular way. <i>The <b>deserving</b> poor.</i>
<b>dexterity</b>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>His record testifies to a certain <b>dexterity</b> in politics.</i>
<b>facility</b>	A building or place that provides a particular service or is used for a particular industry. <i>He had a <b>facility</b> for languages.</i>
<b>faculty</b>	An aptitude for doing something. <i>The <b>faculty</b> of sight.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	Great subtlety and tact in handling or manipulating people or difficult situations. <i>Clients want advice and action that calls for considerable <b>finesse</b>.</i>
<b>flair</b>	Distinctive and stylish elegance. <i>None of us had much artistic <b>flair</b>.</i>
<b>gifted</b>	Having exceptional talent or natural ability. <i>A <b>gifted</b> writer.</i>
<b>gumption</b>	Fortitude and determination. <i>The president would hire almost any young man who had the <b>gumption</b> to ask for a job.</i>
<b>ingenuity</b>	The property of being ingenious. <i>The <b>ingenuity</b> of Haydn's scoring.</i>
<b>knack</b>	A tendency to do something. <i>John had the enviable <b>knack</b> of falling asleep anywhere.</i>
<b>potentiality</b>	The possibility of something happening or of someone doing something in the future. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great <b>potentiality</b>.</i>
<b>potentially</b>	With a possibility of becoming actual. <i>A <b>potentially</b> dangerous situation.</i>
<b>propensity</b>	A disposition to behave in a certain way. <i>The <b>propensity</b> of disease to spread.</i>
<b>skill</b>	The ability to do something well; expertise. <i>The <b>skill</b> of a well trained boxer.</i>
<b>sleight</b>	The use of dexterity or cunning, especially so as to deceive. <i>Except by <b>sleight</b> of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
<b>suitability</b>	The quality of having the properties that are right for a specific purpose. <i>Her superiors had doubts about her <b>suitability</b> for the job.</i>

**tact** Skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues.  
*The inspector broke the news to me with **tact** and consideration.*

**talent** Natural aptitude or skill.  
*Simon is a **talent** to watch.*

**talented** Endowed with talent or talents.  
*A **talented** young musician.*

**tend** Have a tendency or disposition to do or be something be inclined.  
*She **tends** to be nervous before her lectures.*

**viability** Ability to survive or live successfully.  
*An interest in the long term **viability** of British companies.*

**workmanship** The degree of skill with which a product is made or a job done.  
*Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor **workmanship**.*
