adjudication	The final judgment in a legal proceeding; the act of pronouncing judgment based on the evidence presented. The matter may have to go to court for adjudication .
arbitrament	The settling of a dispute by an arbitrator.
arbitrement	The act of deciding as an arbiter; giving authoritative judgment.
conciliation	The action of stopping someone being angry; placation. Many disputes are settled through conciliation by the official body.
interposition	The act or fact of interposing one thing between or among others. He owed the preservation of his throne to the miraculous interposition of a stranger who suddenly appeared in his realm.
<u>intervention</u>	Care provided to improve a situation (especially medical procedures or applications that are intended to relieve illness or injury. <i>Repeated interventions by central banks.</i>



mediation	A negotiation to resolve differences that is conducted by some impartial party. They are offering sacrifice and mediation between God and man.
mediatorship	The office or position of a mediator.
negotiation	A discussion intended to produce an agreement. A worldwide ban is currently under negotiation .
peacebuilding	The implementation of measures intended to create or sustain peace, especially in an area affected by conflict. <i>Afghanistan has registered noticeable progress in peacebuilding and</i> <i>reconstruction.</i>
peacemaking	The process of bringing about peace, especially by reconciling adversaries.

Associations of "Arbitration" (30 Words)

adjudge	(in legal use) award something judicially to. She was adjudge d guilty.
<u>arbiter</u>	Someone with the power to settle matters at will. The Secretary of State is the final arbiter .
arbitrate	(of an independent person or body) reach an authoritative judgement or settlement. The board has the power to arbitrate in disputes.
arbitrator	An independent person or body officially appointed to settle a dispute. The facts of the case are put to an independent arbitrator .
between	In between. From Leipzig to Dresden with the gentle Elbe flowing between .



binding	One of a pair of mechanical devices that are attached to a ski and that will grip a ski boot the bindings should release in case of a fall. <i>Business agreements are intended to be legally binding.</i>
conciliation	The act of placating and overcoming distrust and animosity. There was a brief period of conciliation but the fighting soon resumed.
<u>intercede</u>	Intervene on behalf of another. <i>He</i> intercede <i>d</i> in the family dispute.
intercession	The action of saying a prayer on behalf of another. <i>Prayers of intercession</i> .
interposition	Interference or intervention. The interposition of members between tiers of management.
<u>intervention</u>	The action or process of intervening. The purpose of intervention is to prevent unnecessary duplication of lawsuits.
<u>judge</u>	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>She was a good judge of character.</i>
judgement	The legal document stating the reasons for a judicial decision. That is not in my judgement the end of the matter.
litigation	A legal proceeding in a court; a judicial contest to determine and enforce legal rights. <i>The company wishes to avoid litigation</i> .
mediate	Connected indirectly through another person or thing involving an intermediate agency. Public law institutions are a type of mediate state administration.
mediation	The act of intervening for the purpose of bringing about a settlement. The parties have sought mediation and it has failed.
<u>mediator</u>	A negotiator who acts as a link between parties. The government appointed a mediator to assist in finding a resolution to the dispute.
mid	Used in combination to denote the middle. <i>The mid</i> 17th century.
<u>middle</u>	Put in the middle. <i>Rain during the middle of April.</i>
modulation	The exertion of a modifying or controlling influence on something. <i>Researchers observed the</i> modulation of electrical conductance.
mollification	A state of being appeased or ameliorated or tempered. <i>His unsuccessful mollification of the mob.</i>



<u>negotiable</u>	Legally transferable to the ownership of another. <i>The price was not</i> negotiable .
negotiation	The action or process of transferring legal ownership of a document. The buyout negotiation lasted several days.
<u>nosy</u>	Offensively curious or inquisitive. They don t nosy into your business like some people.
pacification	The act of appeasing someone or causing someone to be more favorably inclined. A wonderful skill in the pacification of crying infants.
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>He just wanted to drink a few beers in peace.</i>
reconcilable	Capable of being reconciled; compatible. The two propositions are hardly reconcilable .
referee	Act as the referee of. The referee sent off two French players.
resumption	The action of beginning something again after a pause or interruption. Property resumption s would be required to develop the bus routes.
umpire	Act as an umpire in a game or match. An umpire was appointed to settle the tax case.
