## Synonyms of "Arbitration" as a noun (11 Words)

<b>adjudication</b>	The final judgment in a legal proceeding; the act of pronouncing judgment based on the evidence presented. <i>The matter may have to go to court for <b>adjudication</b>.</i>
<b>arbitrament</b>	The settling of a dispute by an arbitrator.
<b>arbitrement</b>	The act of deciding as an arbiter; giving authoritative judgment.
<b>conciliation</b>	The action of stopping someone being angry; placation. <i>Many disputes are settled through <b>conciliation</b> by the official body.</i>
<b>interposition</b>	The act or fact of interposing one thing between or among others. <i>He owed the preservation of his throne to the miraculous <b>interposition</b> of a stranger who suddenly appeared in his realm.</i>
<b><u>intervention</u></b>	Care provided to improve a situation (especially medical procedures or applications that are intended to relieve illness or injury). <i>Repeated <b>interventions</b> by central banks.</i>

- mediation** A negotiation to resolve differences that is conducted by some impartial party.  
*They are offering sacrifice and **mediation** between God and man.*
- mediatorship** The office or position of a mediator.
- negotiation** A discussion intended to produce an agreement.  
*A worldwide ban is currently under **negotiation**.*
- peacebuilding** The implementation of measures intended to create or sustain peace, especially in an area affected by conflict.  
*Afghanistan has registered noticeable progress in **peacebuilding** and reconstruction.*
- peacemaking** The process of bringing about peace, especially by reconciling adversaries.  
*A serious attempt to engage in **peacemaking** after years of violence.*



## Usage Examples of "Arbitration" as a noun

- *Tayside Regional Council called for arbitration to settle the dispute.*



## Associations of "Arbitration" (30 Words)

- adjudge** (in legal use) award something judicially to.  
*She was **adjudged** guilty.*
- arbiter** Someone with the power to settle matters at will.  
*The Secretary of State is the final **arbiter**.*
- arbitrate** (of an independent person or body) reach an authoritative judgement or settlement.  
*The board has the power to **arbitrate** in disputes.*
- arbitrator** An independent person or body officially appointed to settle a dispute.  
*The facts of the case are put to an independent **arbitrator**.*
- between** In between.

<b>binding</b>	One of a pair of mechanical devices that are attached to a ski and that will grip a ski boot the bindings should release in case of a fall. <i>Business agreements are intended to be legally <b>binding</b>.</i>
<b>conciliation</b>	The act of placating and overcoming distrust and animosity. <i>There was a brief period of <b>conciliation</b> but the fighting soon resumed.</i>
<u><b>intercede</b></u>	Intervene on behalf of another. <i>He <b>interceded</b> in the family dispute.</i>
<b>intercession</b>	The action of saying a prayer on behalf of another. <i>Prayers of <b>intercession</b>.</i>
<b>interposition</b>	Interference or intervention. <i>The <b>interposition</b> of members between tiers of management.</i>
<u><b>intervention</b></u>	The action or process of intervening. <i>The purpose of <b>intervention</b> is to prevent unnecessary duplication of lawsuits.</i>
<u><b>judge</b></u>	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>She was a good <b>judge</b> of character.</i>
<b>judgement</b>	The legal document stating the reasons for a judicial decision. <i>That is not in my <b>judgement</b> the end of the matter.</i>
<b>litigation</b>	A legal proceeding in a court; a judicial contest to determine and enforce legal rights. <i>The company wishes to avoid <b>litigation</b>.</i>
<b>mediate</b>	Connected indirectly through another person or thing involving an intermediate agency. <i>Public law institutions are a type of <b>mediate</b> state administration.</i>
<b>mediation</b>	The act of intervening for the purpose of bringing about a settlement. <i>The parties have sought <b>mediation</b> and it has failed.</i>
<u><b>mediator</b></u>	A negotiator who acts as a link between parties. <i>The government appointed a <b>mediator</b> to assist in finding a resolution to the dispute.</i>
<b>mid</b>	Used in combination to denote the middle. <i>The <b>mid</b> 17th century.</i>
<u><b>middle</b></u>	Put in the middle. <i>Rain during the <b>middle</b> of April.</i>
<b>modulation</b>	The exertion of a modifying or controlling influence on something. <i>Researchers observed the <b>modulation</b> of electrical conductance.</i>
<b>mollification</b>	A state of being appeased or ameliorated or tempered. <i>His unsuccessful <b>mollification</b> of the mob.</i>

<b>negotiable</b>	Legally transferable to the ownership of another. <i>The price was not <b>negotiable</b>.</i>
<b>negotiation</b>	The action or process of transferring legal ownership of a document. <i>The buyout <b>negotiation</b> lasted several days.</i>
<b>nosy</b>	Offensively curious or inquisitive. <i>They don't <b>nosy</b> into your business like some people.</i>
<b>pacification</b>	The act of appeasing someone or causing someone to be more favorably inclined. <i>A wonderful skill in the <b>pacification</b> of crying infants.</i>
<b>peace</b>	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>He just wanted to drink a few beers in <b>peace</b>.</i>
<b>reconcilable</b>	Capable of being reconciled; compatible. <i>The two propositions are hardly <b>reconcilable</b>.</i>
<b>referee</b>	Act as the referee of. <i>The <b>referee</b> sent off two French players.</i>
<b>resumption</b>	The action of beginning something again after a pause or interruption. <i>Property <b>resumptions</b> would be required to develop the bus routes.</i>
<b>umpire</b>	Act as an umpire in a game or match. <i>An <b>umpire</b> was appointed to settle the tax case.</i>
