## Argument as a Noun

### Definitions of "Argument" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “argument” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement.*
- *A fact or assertion offered as evidence that something is true.*
- *A discussion in which reasons are advanced for and against some proposition or proposal.*
- *Any of the noun phrases in a clause that are related directly to the verb, typically the subject, direct object, and indirect object.*
- *A reference or value that is passed to a function, procedure, subroutine, command, or program.*
- *A summary of the subject or plot of a literary work or play or movie.*
- *An exchange of diverging or opposite views, typically a heated or angry one.*
- *(computer science) a reference or value that is passed to a function, procedure, subroutine, command, or program.*

- An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value. For example, in the expression  $y = F(x_1, x_2)$ , the arguments of the function  $F$  are  $x_1$  and  $x_2$ , and the value is  $y$ .
- A reason or set of reasons given in support of an idea, action or theory.
- A summary of the subject matter of a book.
- A variable in a logical or mathematical expression whose value determines the dependent variable; if  $f(x)=y$ ,  $x$  is the independent variable.
- A course of reasoning aimed at demonstrating a truth or falsehood; the methodical process of logical reasoning.

- altercation**      A noisy argument or disagreement, especially in public.  
*I had an **altercation** with the ticket collector.*
- arguing**          A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement.

<b>argumentation</b>	A discussion in which reasons are advanced for and against some proposition or proposal. <i>Lines of <b>argumentation</b> used to support his thesis.</i>
<b>case</b>	An agreed summary of the facts relating to a legal case drawn up for review or decision on a point of law by a higher court. <i>That was not the <b>case</b>.</i>
<b>clash</b>	A loud jarring sound, as of metal objects being struck together. <i>A <b>clash</b> of tweeds and a striped shirt.</i>
<b><u>contention</u></b>	An assertion, especially one maintained in argument. <i>Freud s <b>contention</b> that all dreams were wish fulfilment.</i>
<b>contestation</b>	An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. <i>A self conscious <b>contestation</b> of the government.</i>
<b>contretemps</b>	A minor dispute or disagreement. <i>He tried to smooth over his <b>contretemps</b> with the policeman.</i>
<b><u>controversy</u></b>	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The announcement ended a protracted <b>controversy</b>.</i>
<b>debate</b>	A formal discussion on a particular matter in a public meeting or legislative assembly, in which opposing arguments are put forward and which usually ends with a vote. <i>The national <b>debate</b> on abortion.</i>
<b>difference of opinion</b>	The quality of being unlike or dissimilar.
<b><u>disagreement</u></b>	Lack of consensus or approval. <i><b>Disagreement</b> between the results of the two assessments.</i>
<b>disceptation</b>	Disputation, debate, discussion; an instance of this.
<b>disputation</b>	Formal academic debate. <i>A lengthy <b>disputation</b> about the rights and wrongs of a particular request.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	Coming into conflict with. <i>He had a <b>dispute</b> with his wife.</i>
<b>dissension</b>	Disagreement that leads to discord. <i>These issues caused bitter <b>dissension</b> in the party.</i>
<b>exchange of views</b>	The act of giving something in return for something received.
<b><u>feud</u></b>	A bitter quarrel between two parties. <i>His long standing <b>feud</b> with Universal Pictures.</i>

<b>fight</b>	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>There was <b>fighting</b> in the streets.</i>
<b>line</b>	In football hockey etc the goal line. <i>They attacked the enemy's <b>line</b>.</i>
<b>line of reasoning</b>	A short personal letter.
<b>logic</b>	Logical operations collectively. <i>There seemed to be a lack of <b>logic</b> in his remarks.</i>
<u><a href="#">parameter</a></u>	A reference or value that is passed to a function, procedure, subroutine, command, or program. <i>The <b>parameters</b> within which the media work.</i>
<u><a href="#">quarrel</a></u>	A reason for disagreement with a person, group, or principle. <i>She made the mistake of picking a <b>quarrel</b> with John.</i>
<u><a href="#">reasoning</a></u>	The action of thinking about something in a logical, sensible way. <i>He explained the <b>reasoning</b> behind his decision at a media conference.</i>
<b>squabble</b>	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Family <b>squabbles</b>.</i>
<b>statement</b>	A formal account of events given by a witness, defendant, or other party to the police or in a court of law. <i>Do you agree with this <b>statement</b>.</i>
<b>subject matter</b>	The subject matter of a conversation or discussion.
<b>theme</b>	The first major constituent of a clause, indicating the subject matter, typically being the subject but optionally other constituents, as in 'smitten he is not'. <i>An Irish <b>theme</b> pub.</i>
<b>tilt</b>	A combat between two mounted knights tilting against each other with blunted lances. <i>The tower had a pronounced <b>tilt</b>.</i>
<b>topic</b>	A matter dealt with in a text, discourse, or conversation; a subject. <i>Sleep deprivation became a frequent <b>topic</b> of conversation.</i>
<b>war of words</b>	An active struggle between competing entities.
<u><a href="#">wrangle</a></u>	A dispute or argument, typically one that is long and complicated. <i>An insurance <b>wrangle</b> is holding up compensation payments.</i>

## Associations of "Argument" (30 Words)

<b>argue</b>	Exchange or express diverging or opposite views, typically in a heated or angry way. <i>The evidence <b>argues</b> for your claim.</i>
<b>bicker</b>	(of a flame or light) flash, gleam, or flicker. <i>Couples who <b>bicker</b> over who gets what from the divorce.</i>
<b>confute</b>	Prove to be false. <i>Restorers who sought to <b>confute</b> this view were accused of ignorance.</i>
<b><u>contention</u></b>	A point asserted as part of an argument. <i>The captured territory was the main area of <b>contention</b> between the two countries.</i>
<b>contentiousness</b>	An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.
<b><u>contradict</u></b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>He did not <b>contradict</b> what he said last week.</i>
<b><u>controversial</u></b>	Marked by or capable of arousing controversy. <i>Rushdie's <b>controversial</b> book.</i>
<b><u>controversy</u></b>	Prolonged public disagreement or heated discussion. <i>The design of the building has caused <b>controversy</b>.</i>

<b>controvert</b>	Argue about (something). <i>Subsequent work from the same laboratory <b>controverted</b> these results.</i>
<b><u>debatable</u></b>	Capable of being disproved. <i>It is <b>debatable</b> whether the country is coming out of recession.</i>
<b><u>denial</u></b>	(psychiatry) a defense mechanism that denies painful thoughts. <i>The <b>denial</b> of insurance to people with certain medical conditions.</i>
<b><u>deny</u></b>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>The servants are ordered to <b>deny</b> him.</i>
<b>discussion</b>	A detailed treatment of a topic in speech or writing. <i>See Appendix One for a more detailed <b>discussion</b>.</i>
<b>disproof</b>	The act of determining that something is false. <i>Rex was living <b>disproof</b> of the youth preserving powers imputed to life in the college.</i>
<b>disputable</b>	Open to argument or debate. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be <b>disputable</b>.</i>
<b>disputation</b>	Debate or argument. <i>The founding father of logical <b>disputation</b>.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	Coming into conflict with. <i>The accusations are not <b>disputed</b>.</i>
<b><u>enthuse</u></b>	Utter with enthusiasm. <i>They both <b>enthused</b> over my new look.</i>
<b>gainsay</b>	Speak against or oppose (someone). <i>None could <b>gainsay</b> her.</i>
<b>hassel</b>	Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981).
<b>impugn</b>	Dispute the truth, validity, or honesty of (a statement or motive); call into question. <i>The father does not <b>impugn</b> her capacity as a good mother.</i>
<b>interlocutor</b>	The performer in the middle of a minstrel line who engages the others in talk.
<b><u>objection</u></b>	An expression or feeling of disapproval or opposition; a reason for disagreeing. <i>They have raised no <b>objections</b> to the latest plans.</i>
<b>polemical</b>	Of or involving strongly critical or disputatious writing or speech. <i>A <b>polemical</b> essay.</i>

<b>rebut</b>	Drive back or repel (a person or attack). <i>He had to <b>rebut</b> charges of acting for the convenience of his political friends.</i>
<b>rebuttal</b>	A pleading by the defendant in reply to a plaintiff's surrejoinder.
<b>refutable</b>	Able to be refuted.
<b>refutation</b>	Any evidence that helps to establish the falsity of something. <i>Scientific theory is always tentative open to <b>refutation</b>.</i>
<b>refute</b>	Prove (a statement or theory) to be wrong or false; disprove. <i>A spokesman totally <b>refuted</b> the allegation of bias.</i>
<b>wrangle</b>	Have a long, complicated dispute or argument. <i>The horses were <b>wrangled</b> early.</i>
