<b>desertification</b>	The gradual transformation of habitable land into desert; is usually caused by climate change or by destructive use of the land. <i>The dust storms in Korea are the result of rapid <b>desertification</b> in China.</i>
<b>desiccate</b>	Lose water or moisture. <i>A <b>desiccate</b> romance.</i>
<b>desiccated</b>	(of food) dried in order to preserve it. <i>Old boxes of <b>desiccated</b> Cuban cigars.</i>
<b>drought</b>	A prolonged shortage. <i>I asked for something to slake my <b>drought</b>.</i>
<b>dry</b>	The dry season. <i>Only <b>dry</b> bread and water.</i>
<b>dryness</b>	Lack of interest, excitement, or embellishment; dullness. <i>It does little to rescue the ordinary moment from <b>dryness</b> and tedium.</i>
<b>evaporation</b>	The process of something abstract ceasing to exist. <i>Snow cover prevents <b>evaporation</b> of water from the soil.</i>
<b>famine</b>	A shortage. <i>The cotton <b>famine</b> of the 1860s.</i>
<b>forecast</b>	A prediction about how something (as the weather) will develop. <i>Rain is <b>forecast</b> for Scotland.</i>
<b>humid</b>	Containing or characterized by a great deal of water vapor. <i>A hot and <b>humid</b> day.</i>
<b>humidity</b>	Wetness in the atmosphere. <i>The <b>humidity</b> should be supplied by regularly spraying the leaves.</i>
<b>parch</b>	Cause to wither or parch from exposure to heat. <i>The sun <b>parched</b> the earth.</i>
<b>precipitation</b>	The process of forming a chemical precipitate. <i>The storm brought several inches of <b>precipitation</b>.</i>
<b>prolonged</b>	Continuing for a long time or longer than usual; lengthy. <i>The region suffered a <b>prolonged</b> drought.</i>
<b>seasonal</b>	Occurring at or dependent on a particular season. <i><b>Seasonal</b> rainfall.</i>
<b>semiarid</b>	Somewhat arid. <i>A <b>semiarid</b> region with little annual rainfall.</i>
<b>shortage</b>	The property of being an amount by which something is less than expected or required. <i>The problems of land <b>shortage</b> in the countryside.</i>

<b>temperature</b>	A body temperature above the normal. <i>I ll take her <b>temperature</b>.</i>
<b>thirst</b>	Have a craving, appetite, or great desire for. <i>An opponent <b>thirsting</b> for revenge.</i>
<b>tropical</b>	Very hot and humid. <i>A <b>tropical</b> rainforest.</i>
<b>warmer</b>	A device for warming something; a thing that warms. <i>Winter <b>warmers</b> like steamed syrup sponge.</i>
<b>weather</b>	Change under the action or influence of the weather. <i>A <b>weathered</b> old hut.</i>
<b>weatherman</b>	Predicts the weather.
<b>withered</b>	Lean and wrinkled by shrinkage as from age or illness-W.F.Starkie. <i>A girl with a <b>withered</b> arm.</i>
