**blue** Of a ski run of the second lowest level of difficulty as indicated by blue markers positioned along it.  
***Blue** laws.*

**blue-blooded** Belonging to or characteristic of the nobility or aristocracy.

**courtly** Refined or imposing in manner or appearance; befitting a royal court.  
*He gave a **courtly** bow.*

**dignified** Having or showing a composed or serious manner that is worthy of respect.  
*The director of the school was a **dignified** white haired gentleman.*

**elite** Selected as the best.  
***Elite** colleges.*

**gentle** Having little impact.  
*A **gentle** slope.*

<b><u>noble</u></b>	Inert especially toward oxygen. <i>A <b>noble</b> spirit.</i>
<b>patrician</b>	Befitting a person of noble origin. <i><b>Patrician</b> landholders of the American South.</i>
<b><u>titled</u></b>	(of a person) having a title indicating high social or official rank. <i>Many <b>titled</b> guests were always invited.</i>
<b>upper-class</b>	Occupying the highest socioeconomic position in a society.
<b>well born</b>	Resulting favorably.
<b>well bred</b>	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.

<b>academic</b>	Associated with academia or an academy. <i>An <b>academic</b> question.</i>
<b>aristocracy</b>	The highest class in certain societies, typically comprising people of noble birth holding hereditary titles and offices. <i>A new <b>aristocracy</b> of talented young people.</i>
<b>aristocrat</b>	A member of the aristocracy. <i>The trout is the <b>aristocrat</b> of freshwater fish.</i>
<b>burgess</b>	A Member of Parliament for a borough, corporate town, or university.
<b>condescending</b>	Having or showing an attitude of patronizing superiority. <i>She thought the teachers were arrogant and <b>condescending</b>.</i>
<b>consul</b>	(in ancient Rome) each of the two annually elected chief magistrates who jointly ruled the republic. <i>The British <b>consul</b> in Israel.</i>
<b>cultivated</b>	No longer in the natural state; developed by human care and for human use. <i><b>Cultivated</b> speech.</i>
<b>elite</b>	A group or class of persons enjoying superior intellectual or social or economic status. <i>The silent majority were looked down upon by the liberal <b>elite</b>.</i>
<b>elitism</b>	The attitude that society should be governed by an elite group of individuals. <i>I've been accused of <b>elitism</b> and snobbery because of my views on grammar and spelling.</i>
<b>elitist</b>	Someone who believes in rule by an elite group. <i>The image of polo as an <b>elitist</b> sport.</i>
<b>genteel</b>	Characterized by exaggerated or affected politeness, refinement, or respectability. <i>Her <b>genteel</b> upbringing.</i>
<b>gentry</b>	The most powerful members of a society. <i>A member of the landed <b>gentry</b>.</i>
<b>highbrow</b>	A highbrow person. <i><b>Highbrow</b> events such as the ballet or opera.</i>
<b>intellectual</b>	Of or associated with or requiring the use of the mind. <i><b>Intellectual</b> literature.</i>

<b>intelligentsia</b>	An educated and intellectual elite. <i>A distrust of the <b>intelligentsia</b> and of theoretical learning.</i>
<b>landed</b>	Owning much land, especially through inheritance. <i>The decline of <b>landed</b> estates.</i>
<b>learned</b>	Highly educated; having extensive information or understanding. <i>My <b>learned</b> friend.</i>
<b>literati</b>	The literary intelligentsia.
<b>noble</b>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. <i>A <b>noble</b> tree.</i>
<b>patrician</b>	A member of a long-established wealthy family. <i><b>Patrician</b> landholders of the American South.</i>
<b>peerage</b>	The peers of a kingdom considered as a group. <i>On his retirement as cabinet secretary he was given a <b>peerage</b>.</i>
<b>refined</b>	Developed or improved so as to be precise or subtle. <i>To gild <b>refined</b> gold.</i>
<b>regal</b>	A small portable reed organ of the 16th and 17th centuries, with a pair of horizontal bellows on top. <i><b>Regal</b> attire.</i>
<b>royal</b>	A sail set next above the topgallant on a royal mast. <i>She received a <b>royal</b> welcome.</i>
<b>scholarly</b>	Involving or relating to serious academic study. <i>A <b>scholarly</b> treatise.</i>
<b>select</b>	Selected or chosen for special qualifications. <i><b>Select</b> peaches.</i>
<b>selected</b>	Chosen in preference to another.
<b>smart</b>	Showing mental alertness and calculation and resourcefulness. <i>Hi tech <b>smart</b> weapons.</i>
<b>society</b>	A specified section of society. <i>The analogy between insect <b>society</b> and human city is not new.</i>
<b>trained</b>	Shaped or conditioned or disciplined by training; often used as a combining form. <i>The riding school was founded in the 16th century to provide <b>trained</b> horses for the Imperial Army.</i>
