## Armed as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Armed" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “armed” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Characterized by having or bearing arms.*
- *Having arms or arms as specified; used especially in combination.*
- *Involving the use of firearms.*
- *(used of persons or the military) characterized by having or bearing arms.*
- *Having claws, a beak, etc. of a specified tincture.*
- *(used of plants and animals) furnished with bristles and thorns.*
- *Furnished with bristles and thorns.*
- *Equipped with or carrying a firearm or firearms.*





## Synonyms of "Armed" as an adjective (3 Words)

**fighting** Displaying or engaging in violence, combat, or aggression.  
*Review the **fighting** forces.*

**martial** Suggesting war or military life.  
***Martial** law.*

**soldierly** (of persons) befitting a warrior.  
*It is not **soldierly** to shrink from the perils of the field.*



## Usage Examples of "Armed" as an adjective

- *The many-armed goddess Shiva.*
- *Armed robbery.*
- *Heavily armed troops.*
- *A lion rampant argent, armed and langued azure.*



## Associations of "Armed" (30 Words)

- armament**      Weaponry used by military or naval force.  
*Instruments of **disarmament** rather than of **armament**.*
- army**            The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and  
trains soldiers for land warfare.  
***Army** officers.*
- artillery**        Large but transportable armament.  
*Each corps included two regiments of field **artillery**.*
- bank**            Do business with a bank or keep an account at a bank.  
*The pilot had to **bank** the aircraft.*
- brigade**        Form or unite into a brigade.  
*They thought the speech too closely **brigaded** with illegal action.*
- brigadier**        A general officer ranking below a major general.

<b>burglary</b>	Illegal entry of a building with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>A two year sentence for <b>burglary</b>.</i>
<b>cantonment</b>	Temporary living quarters specially built by the army for soldiers.
<b>combatant</b>	Someone who fights (or is fighting). <i>In the long Russo Swedish conflict both <b>combatants</b> endured terrible sacrifices.</i>
<b>corps</b>	A branch of an army assigned to a particular kind of work. <i>Diplomatic <b>corps</b>.</i>
<b>disarm</b>	Take a weapon or weapons away from (a person, force, or country). <i>A well executed <b>disarm</b>.</i>
<b>disarmament</b>	Act of reducing or depriving of arms. <i>The <b>disarmament</b> of the aggressor nations must be complete.</i>
<b>extortion</b>	The practice of obtaining something, especially money, through force or threats. <i>The <b>extortion</b> by dishonest officials of fees for performing their sworn duty.</i>
<b>gun</b>	Used as a nickname for a ship's gunnery officer. <i>He <b>gunned</b> the car away from the kerb.</i>
<b>hijacking</b>	Robbery of a traveller or vehicle in transit or seizing control of a vehicle by the use of force. <i>He was involved in a <b>hijacking</b> in 1981.</i>
<b>insurgence</b>	A large increase. <i>Annexation provoked extensive <b>insurgence</b>.</i>
<b>larceny</b>	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
<b>martial</b>	Of or relating to the armed forces. <i><b>Martial</b> bravery.</i>
<b>military</b>	The military forces of a nation. <i>He organized his shows with <b>military</b> precision.</i>
<b>militia</b>	A military force that engages in rebel or terrorist activities in opposition to a regular army. <i>Their troops were untrained <b>militia</b>.</i>
<b>munition</b>	Military weapons ammunition equipment and stores. <i>Reserves of nuclear chemical and conventional <b>munitions</b>.</i>
<b>regiment</b>	Assign to a regiment. <i>The whole <b>regiment</b> of women MPs.</i>
<b>robbery</b>	Unashamed swindling or overcharging. <i>An armed <b>robbery</b>.</i>



**shoplifting** The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store.  
*She had convictions for **shoplifting**.*

**soldier** Serve as a soldier.  
*The **soldiers** stood at attention.*

**steal** Steal a base.  
*He finished with eight points four **steals** and seven assists.*

**theft** The action or crime of stealing.  
*He was convicted of **theft**.*

**thief** A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence.  
*The **thief** stole the drugs from a doctor's surgery.*

**thieve** Be a thief; steal something.  
*The students have been **thieving** my favourite art books.*

**thievery** The action of stealing another person's property.  
*Petty **thievery**.*
