### **Definitions of "Armistice" as a noun**

- *A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms.*
- *An agreement made by opposing sides in a war to stop fighting for a certain time; a truce.*



## Synonyms of "Armistice" as a noun (6 Words)

<b>cease-fire</b>	A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms.
<b>ceasefire</b>	A temporary suspension of fighting; a truce. A <b>ceasefire</b> agreement.
<b>cessation of hostilities</b>	A stopping.
<b>peace</b>	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. The <b>peace</b> didn't last.
<b>suspension of hostilities</b>	An interruption in the intensity or amount of something.
<b><u>truce</u></b>	An agreement between enemies or opponents to stop fighting or arguing for a certain time. The guerrillas called a three day <b>truce</b> .

## Associations of "Armistice" (30 Words)

<b><u>brief</u></b>	Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>Introductions were <b>brief</b> and polite.</i>
<b><u>cessation</u></b>	The fact or process of ending or being brought to an end. <i>A <b>cessation</b> of animal testing of cosmetics.</i>
<b><u>discontinuance</u></b>	The act of discontinuing or breaking off; an interruption (temporary or permanent).
<b><u>ephemeral</u></b>	An ephemeral plant. <i><b>Ephemerals</b> avoid the periods of drought as seeds.</i>
<b><u>finalize</u></b>	Make final; put the last touches on; put into final form. <i>Efforts intensified to <b>finalize</b> plans for post war reconstruction.</i>
<b><u>fleeting</u></b>	Lasting for a very short time. <i>For a <b>fleeting</b> moment I saw the face of a boy.</i>
<b><u>fugitive</u></b>	Quick to disappear; fleeting. <i>The <b>fugitive</b> effects of light.</i>
<b><u>halt</u></b>	Come to a halt stop moving. <i><b>Halt</b> the presses.</i>

<b>hiatus</b>	A break between two vowels coming together but not in the same syllable, as in the ear and cooperate. <i>There was a brief <b>hiatus</b> in the war with France.</i>
<b>interruption</b>	An act, utterance, or period that interrupts someone or something. <i>Students returning to education after an <b>interruption</b> in their career.</i>
<b>layover</b>	A period of rest or waiting before a further stage in a journey. <i>There was only a forty eight minute <b>layover</b>.</i>
<b>moment</b>	A quantity that expresses the average or expected value of the first second third or fourth power of the deviation of each component of a frequency distribution from a given value typically mean or zero The first moment is the mean the second moment the variance the third moment the skew and the fourth moment the kurtosis. <i>The <b>moment</b> he arrived the party began.</i>
<b>momentary</b>	Lasting for a very short time; brief. <i>A <b>momentary</b> lapse of concentration.</i>
<b>mortality</b>	Death, especially on a large scale. <i>The causes of <b>mortality</b> among infants and young children.</i>
<b>negotiate</b>	Convert (a cheque) into cash or notes. <i>She cautiously <b>negotiated</b> the hairpin bend.</i>
<b>outage</b>	A period when a power supply or other service is not available or when equipment is closed down. <i>A planned refuelling <b>outage</b>.</i>
<b>parley</b>	A negotiation between enemies. <i>They disagreed over whether to <b>parley</b> with the enemy.</i>
<b>pause</b>	Temporary inactivity. <i>We <b>pause</b> for station identification.</i>
<b>permanently</b>	In a way that lasts or remains unchanged indefinitely; for all time. <i>He is <b>permanently</b> disabled.</i>
<b>provisional</b>	A provisional stamp. <i>A <b>provisional</b> government.</i>
<b>quit</b>	Turn away from; give up. <i>He <b>quit</b> as manager of the struggling Third Division team.</i>
<b>respite</b>	Grant a respite to someone especially a person condemned to death. <i>Some poor criminal from the gibbet or the wheel <b>respite</b>d for a day.</i>
<b>sojourn</b>	A temporary stay. <i>She had <b>sojourned</b> once in Egypt.</i>
<b>stop</b>	Come to a halt stop moving. <i><b>Stop</b> consonants.</i>

<b>stopover</b>	A place where a journey is broken. <i>They made a <b>stopover</b> to visit their friends.</i>
<b>suspension</b>	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>The agitator in the vat keeps the slurry in <b>suspension</b>.</i>
<b>temporary</b>	A worker especially in an office hired on a temporary basis. <i>A <b>temporary</b> job.</i>
<u><b>tentative</b></u>	Done without confidence; hesitant. <i>Just a <b>tentative</b> schedule.</i>
<b>transitory</b>	Not permanent. <i><b>Transitory</b> periods of medieval greatness.</i>
