herd	A group of cattle or sheep or other domestic mammals all of the same kind that are herded by humans. <i>I dodged herds of joggers.</i>
horde	A vast multitude. <i>Tartar hordes.</i>
host	A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers. <i>Your host is Stuart Macmillan.</i>
infantry	Soldiers marching or fighting on foot; foot soldiers collectively. <i>Infantry battalions.</i>
land force	The territory occupied by a nation.
legion	A large military unit. <i>Legions of photographers and TV cameras.</i>
mass	A musical setting for a Mass. <i>Separate the warriors from the mass.</i>
military force	The military forces of a nation.
militia	The entire body of physically fit civilians eligible by law for military service-United States Constitution. <i>Small detachments of militia.</i>
mob	A flock or herd of animals. <i>My mob travelled and traded with other people.</i>
multitude	A large gathering of people. <i>They would swarm over the river in their multitude.</i>
pack	A convenient package or parcel as of cigarettes or film. <i>A pack of thieves.</i>
regular army	A soldier in the regular army.
sea	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>A ban on dumping radioactive wastes in the sea.</i>
soldiery	Military training or knowledge. <i>The arts of soldiery.</i>

<u>stream</u>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>The raft floated downstream on the current.</i>
<u>swarm</u>	A large number of people or things. <i>A swarm of journalists.</i>
the military	The military forces of a nation.
throng	A large, densely packed crowd of people or animals. <i>He pushed his way through the throng.</i>
troop	A group of three or more Scout patrols. <i>A troop of musicians.</i>
u. s. army	A permanent organization of the military land forces of a nation or state.
us army	A large number of people united for some specific purpose.
usa	North American republic containing 50 states - 48 conterminous states in North America plus Alaska in northwest North America and the Hawaiian Islands in the Pacific Ocean; achieved independence in 1776.

<u>armament</u>	Military weapons and equipment. <i>They brought up more reinforcements and more armament.</i>
<u>armed</u>	Equipped with or carrying a firearm or firearms. <i>The many armed goddess Shiva.</i>
<u>armored</u>	Equipped with the complete arms and armor of a warrior.
artillery	An army unit that uses big guns. <i>Each corps included two regiments of field artillery.</i>

battalion	An army unit usually consisting of a headquarters and three or more companies. <i>A battalion of ants.</i>
<u>brigade</u>	Form into a brigade. <i>They thought the speech too closely brigaded with illegal action.</i>
brigadier	A general officer ranking below a major general.
cantonment	Temporary living quarters specially built by the army for soldiers.
colonel	A commissioned military officer in the United States Army or Air Force or Marines who ranks above a lieutenant colonel and below a brigadier general.
combatant	Engaging in or ready for combat. <i>A long time combatant for the control of Newcastle FC.</i>
<u>commander</u>	A commissioned naval officer who ranks above a lieutenant commander and below a captain. <i>The commander of a paratroop regiment.</i>
commando	A unit of commandos. <i>A commando attack.</i>
<u>conscription</u>	Compulsory military service. <i>Conscription was extended to married men.</i>
<u>disarm</u>	An act of taking a weapon away from someone. <i>Police yesterday disarmed a parcel bomb.</i>
disarmament	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i>The disarmament of the aggressor nations must be complete.</i>
grenadier	A soldier armed with grenades.
<u>horde</u>	A moving crowd. <i>Tartar hordes.</i>
legionary	A soldier in a Roman legion. <i>The legionary fortress of Isca.</i>
martial	Roman poet noted for epigrams (first century BC). <i>Martial law.</i>
<u>militant</u>	A militant reformer. <i>Militants became increasingly impatient of parliamentary manoeuvres.</i>
<u>military</u>	The military forces of a nation. <i>As a young man he joined the military and pursued a career in the Army.</i>
militia	The entire body of physically fit civilians eligible by law for military service. <i>Creating a militia was no answer to the army's manpower problem.</i>

munition	Military weapons ammunition equipment and stores. <i>Reserves of nuclear chemical and conventional munitions.</i>
naval	Connected with or belonging to or used in a navy. <i>A naval officer.</i>
navy	The navy of the United States of America the agency that maintains and trains and equips combat ready naval forces. <i>A navy blue suit.</i>
regiment	Form military personnel into a regiment. <i>Every aspect of their life is strictly regimented.</i>
<u>soldier</u>	Serve as a soldier. <i>I soldiered with your father on his last four campaigns.</i>
<u>squad</u>	A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime. <i>The demolition squad from No 6 Troop were blowing up the guns.</i>
<u>warrior</u>	Someone engaged in or experienced in warfare. <i>I really love the warrior pose it makes me feel centred and strong.</i>
weaponry	Weapons considered collectively. <i>America s weaponry.</i>
