<b>ground forces</b>	The loose soft material that makes up a large part of the land surface.
<b>herd</b>	A group of cattle or sheep or other domestic mammals all of the same kind that are herded by humans. <i>I dodged <b>herds</b> of joggers.</i>
<b>horde</b>	A vast multitude. <i>Tartar <b>hordes</b>.</i>
<b>host</b>	A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers. <i>Your <b>host</b> is Stuart Macmillan.</i>
<b>infantry</b>	Soldiers marching or fighting on foot; foot soldiers collectively. <i><b>Infantry</b> battalions.</i>
<b>land force</b>	The territory occupied by a nation.
<b>legion</b>	A large military unit. <i><b>Legions</b> of photographers and TV cameras.</i>
<b>mass</b>	A musical setting for a Mass. <i>Separate the warriors from the <b>mass</b>.</i>
<b>military force</b>	The military forces of a nation.
<b>militia</b>	The entire body of physically fit civilians eligible by law for military service—United States Constitution. <i>Small detachments of <b>militia</b>.</i>
<b>mob</b>	A flock or herd of animals. <i>My <b>mob</b> travelled and traded with other people.</i>
<b>multitude</b>	A large gathering of people. <i>They would swarm over the river in their <b>multitude</b>.</i>
<b>pack</b>	A convenient package or parcel as of cigarettes or film. <i>A <b>pack</b> of thieves.</i>
<b>regular army</b>	A soldier in the regular army.
<b>sea</b>	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>A ban on dumping radioactive wastes in the <b>sea</b>.</i>
<b>soldiery</b>	Military training or knowledge. <i>The arts of <b>soldiery</b>.</i>

<b><u>stream</u></b>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>The raft floated downstream on the current.</i>
<b><u>swarm</u></b>	A large number of people or things. <i>A <b>swarm</b> of journalists.</i>
<b>the military</b>	The military forces of a nation.
<b>throng</b>	A large, densely packed crowd of people or animals. <i>He pushed his way through the <b>throng</b>.</i>
<b>troop</b>	A group of three or more Scout patrols. <i>A <b>troop</b> of musicians.</i>
<b>u. s. army</b>	A permanent organization of the military land forces of a nation or state.
<b>us army</b>	A large number of people united for some specific purpose.
<b>usa</b>	North American republic containing 50 states - 48 conterminous states in North America plus Alaska in northwest North America and the Hawaiian Islands in the Pacific Ocean; achieved independence in 1776.

- artillery** An army unit that uses big guns.  
*Each corps included two regiments of field **artillery**.*

<b>battalion</b>	An army unit usually consisting of a headquarters and three or more companies. <i>A <b>battalion</b> of ants.</i>
<b>brigade</b>	Form into a brigade. <i>They thought the speech too closely <b>brigaded</b> with illegal action.</i>
<b>brigadier</b>	A general officer ranking below a major general.
<b>cantonment</b>	Temporary living quarters specially built by the army for soldiers.
<b>colonel</b>	A commissioned military officer in the United States Army or Air Force or Marines who ranks above a lieutenant colonel and below a brigadier general.
<b>combatant</b>	Engaging in or ready for combat. <i>A long time <b>combatant</b> for the control of Newcastle FC.</i>
<b>commander</b>	A commissioned naval officer who ranks above a lieutenant commander and below a captain. <i>The <b>commander</b> of a paratroop regiment.</i>
<b>commando</b>	A unit of commandos. <i>A <b>commando</b> attack.</i>
<b>conscription</b>	Compulsory military service. <i><b>Conscription</b> was extended to married men.</i>
<b>disarm</b>	An act of taking a weapon away from someone. <i>Police yesterday <b>disarmed</b> a parcel bomb.</i>
<b>disarmament</b>	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i>The <b>disarmament</b> of the aggressor nations must be complete.</i>
<b>grenadier</b>	A soldier armed with grenades.
<b>horde</b>	A moving crowd. <i>Tartar <b>hordes</b>.</i>
<b>legionary</b>	A soldier in a Roman legion. <i>The <b>legionary</b> fortress of Isca.</i>
<b>martial</b>	Roman poet noted for epigrams (first century BC). <i><b>Martial</b> law.</i>
<b>militant</b>	A militant reformer. <i><b>Militants</b> became increasingly impatient of parliamentary manoeuvres.</i>
<b>military</b>	The military forces of a nation. <i>As a young man he joined the <b>military</b> and pursued a career in the Army.</i>
<b>militia</b>	The entire body of physically fit civilians eligible by law for military service. <i>Creating a <b>militia</b> was no answer to the army's manpower problem.</i>

<b>munition</b>	Military weapons ammunition equipment and stores. <i>Reserves of nuclear chemical and conventional <b>munitions</b>.</i>
<b>naval</b>	Connected with or belonging to or used in a navy. <i>A <b>naval</b> officer.</i>
<b>navy</b>	The navy of the United States of America the agency that maintains and trains and equips combat ready naval forces. <i>A <b>navy</b> blue suit.</i>
<b>regiment</b>	Form military personnel into a regiment. <i>Every aspect of their life is strictly <b>regimented</b>.</i>
<b>soldier</b>	Serve as a soldier. <i>I <b>soldiered</b> with your father on his last four campaigns.</i>
<b>squad</b>	A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime. <i>The demolition <b>squad</b> from No 6 Troop were blowing up the guns.</i>
<b>warrior</b>	Someone engaged in or experienced in warfare. <i>I really love the <b>warrior</b> pose it makes me feel centred and strong.</i>
