advent

The arrival of a notable person or thing.
*The **advent** of the computer.*

appearance

A mental representation.
*It was Bernhardt's last **appearance** in America.*

approach

An initial proposal or request made to someone.
*The hunter's **approach** scattered the geese.*

arriver

Someone who arrives (or has arrived).

birth

The process of giving birth.
*They celebrated the **birth** of their first child.*

comer

Someone with a promising future.
*Many in the party see tax relief as a **comer**.*

coming	The temporal property of becoming nearer in time. <i>The coming of a new age.</i>
dawn	The first light of day. <i>It was the dawn of the Roman Empire.</i>
development	The act of making some area of land or water more profitable or productive or useful. <i>The development of his ideas took many years.</i>
<u>emergence</u>	The act of emerging. <i>I misjudged the timing of my emergence.</i>
<u>entrance</u>	The coming of an actor or performer on to a stage. <i>An entrance examination.</i>
entrant	One who enters a competition. <i>The prize will be awarded to the entrant who wins the tiebreak.</i>
entry	The action of taking up the legal right to property. <i>The entry to a block of flats.</i>
first appearance	The lowest forward gear ratio in the gear box of a motor vehicle; used to start a car moving.
inauguration	The ceremonial induction into a position. <i>The inauguration of the Modern Art Museum.</i>
incomer	A person who has come to live in an area in which they have not grown up, especially in a close-knit rural community. <i>An English incomer to Orkney.</i>
materialization	An appearance in bodily form (as of a disembodied spirit). <i>The materialization of her dream.</i>
<u>newcomer</u>	A novice in a particular activity or situation. <i>Hill one of England's relative newcomers gave them the lead.</i>
<u>occurrence</u>	An event that happens. <i>The occurrence of natural gas fields.</i>
<u>onset</u>	The beginning of something, especially something unpleasant. <i>Early onset Alzheimer's disease.</i>
<u>origin</u>	A person's social background or ancestry. <i>The terminology has its origins in America.</i>
reaching	The act of physically reaching or thrusting out.
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>Few models have had such a meteoric rise.</i>
springing up	The elasticity of something that can be stretched and returns to its original length.

start

A line indicating the location of the start of a race or a game.

*He had a ninety minute **start** on them.*

surfacing

The outermost level of the land or sea.

- *Hotel staff greeted the late arrivals.*
- *They awaited her arrival.*
- *He was dead on arrival at hospital.*
- *Ruth's arrival in New York.*

Associations of "Arrival" (30 Words)

accomplish	To gain with effort. <i>The planes accomplished their mission.</i>
achieve	Successfully bring about or reach (a desired objective or result) by effort, skill, or courage. <i>She achieved her goal despite setbacks.</i>
area	The extent or measurement of a surface or piece of land. <i>It was his area of specialization.</i>
arrive	Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>After he published his book he had arrived.</i>
attain	Reach a destination, either real or abstract. <i>Clarify your objectives and ways of attaining them.</i>
bedside	Space by the side of a bed (especially the bed of a sick or dying person). <i>The doctor stood at her bedside.</i>

bye	A run scored from a ball that passes the batsman without being hit (recorded as an extra, not credited to the individual batsman). <i>He has a bye into the second round.</i>
come	Come from be connected by a relationship of blood for example. <i>The letter hasn't come yet.</i>
comer	A person who arrives somewhere. <i>Many in the party see tax relief as a comer.</i>
distal	Situated away from the centre of the body or from the point of attachment. <i>The distal end of the tibia.</i>
end	The state of affairs that a plan is intended to achieve and that when achieved terminates behavior intended to achieve it. <i>The end house.</i>
eventually	In the end, especially after a long delay, dispute, or series of problems. <i>Eventually after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>
<u>expanse</u>	A wide scope. <i>The green expanse of the forest.</i>
<u>far</u>	At or to a certain point or degree. <i>A far trek.</i>
finale	The closing section of a musical composition. <i>The festival ends with a grand finale.</i>
<u>finally</u>	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i>A referendum followed by local legislative and finally presidential elections.</i>
finish	Cause to finish a relationship with somebody. <i>Booze will be the finish of him.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>She didn't get the joke.</i>
<u>here</u>	In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>Here is the money I promised you.</i>
<u>influx</u>	An arrival or entry of large numbers of people or things. <i>The lakes are fed by influxes of meltwater.</i>
landing	The act of coming to land after a voyage. <i>We made a perfect landing at the airstrip.</i>
locally	With reference to a particular area or one's neighbourhood. <i>I shop locally wherever possible.</i>
location	A particular place or position. <i>The movie was filmed entirely on location.</i>

near	Nearly. <i>Near beer.</i>
<u>nearby</u>	Not far away; close. <i>He slung his jacket over a nearby chair.</i>
promising	Showing signs of future success. <i>A promising start to the season.</i>
reach	An act of reaching out with one's arm. <i>He told a story to illustrate the reach of his fame.</i>
<u>scope</u>	Set the scope of a projected undertaking. <i>They d scoped out their market.</i>
<u>station</u>	The frequency assigned to a broadcasting station. <i>Troops were stationed in the town.</i>
ultimately	Finally; in the end. <i>Ultimately he had to give in.</i>
