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## Associations of "Arrogantly" (30 Words)

<b>arty</b>	Making a strong, affected, or pretentious display of being artistic or interested in the arts. <i>A very <b>arty</b> film.</i>
<b>audacious</b>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i><b>Audacious</b> explorers.</i>
<b>blowhard</b>	A boastful or pompous person. <i><b>Blowhard</b> politicians.</i>
<b>boastful</b>	Showing excessive pride and self-satisfaction in one’s achievements, possessions, or abilities. <i>He always seemed to be rather <b>boastful</b> and above himself.</i>
<b>braggart</b>	A very boastful and talkative person. <i><b>Braggart</b> men.</i>
<b>brash</b>	Offensively bold. <i>He was <b>brash</b> cocky and arrogant.</i>
<a href="#"><b>brazen</b></a>	Endure an embarrassing or difficult situation by behaving with apparent confidence and lack of shame. <i><b>Brazen</b> arrogance.</i>
<b>cocksure</b>	Marked by excessive confidence. <i>The <b>cocksure</b> golf prodigy from California.</i>
<b>conceited</b>	Characteristic of false pride; having an exaggerated sense of self-importance. <i>A <b>conceited</b> fool.</i>
<a href="#"><b>haughty</b></a>	Arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i><b>Haughty</b> aristocrats.</i>
<b>impenitent</b>	Impervious to moral persuasion. <i><b>Impenitent</b> elitists.</i>
<b>impudent</b>	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>The student was kept in for <b>impudent</b> behavior.</i>

<b>insolence</b>	Rude and disrespectful behaviour. <i>She was sacked for <b>insolence</b>.</i>
<b><u>insolent</u></b>	Marked by casual disrespect. <i>She hated the <b>insolent</b> tone of his voice.</i>
<b>lordly</b>	Of or befitting a lord. <i><b>Lordly</b> titles.</i>
<b>opinionated</b>	Obstinate in your opinions. <i>An arrogant and <b>opinionated</b> man.</i>
<b><u>overbearing</u></b>	Expecting unquestioning obedience. <i>Insufferably <b>overbearing</b> behavior toward the waiter.</i>
<b>poseur</b>	A person who habitually pretends to be something he is not. (of a person or their behaviour) failing to observe the limits of what is permitted or appropriate.
<b><u>presumptuous</u></b>	<i>The duchess would not put up with <b>presumptuous</b> servants.</i>
<b>pretentious</b>	Making claim to or creating an appearance of (often undeserved) importance or distinction. <i><b>Pretentious</b> art films.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i><b>Proud</b> princes.</i>
<b>shameless</b>	Feeling no shame. <i>His <b>shameless</b> hypocrisy.</i>
<b><u>snob</u></b>	A person who believes that their tastes in a particular area are superior to those of other people. <i>A musical <b>snob</b>.</i>
<b><u>snobbish</u></b>	Relating to, characteristic of, or like a snob. <i>The writer takes a rather <b>snobbish</b> tone.</i>
<b>supercilious</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>Curled his lip in a <b>supercilious</b> smile.</i>
<b>superciliousness</b>	The trait of displaying arrogance by patronizing those considered inferior.
<b><u>unashamed</u></b>	Expressed or acting openly and without guilt or embarrassment. <i>An <b>unashamed</b> emotionalism.</i>
<b>unrepentant</b>	Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing. <i>He was <b>unrepentant</b> and said that his comments were completely accurate.</i>

<b>upstart</b>	A person who has risen suddenly in rank or importance, especially one who behaves arrogantly. <i>The <b>upstarts</b> who dare to challenge the legitimacy of his rule.</i>
<b>vainglorious</b>	Feeling self-importance. <i>This <b>vainglorious</b> boast of personal infallibility.</i>
