Articulates as a Verb

Definitions of "Articulates" as a verb

- *Provide with a joint.*
- *Express or state clearly.*
- *Unite by forming a joint or joints.*
- *Put into words or an expression.*
- *Speak, pronounce, or utter in a certain way.*

- enounce** Utter or pronounce (words).
*The principles **enounced** in his Notes On Cinematography.*
- enunciate** Express (a proposition, theory, etc.) in clear or definite terms.
*She **enunciated** each word slowly.*
- formulate** Put into words or an expression.
*Use special effects paints that are **formulated** for the task.*
- give voice** Execute and deliver.
- joint** Provide or fasten something with joints.
*The carpenter **jointed** two pieces of wood.*
- phrase** Divide combine or mark into phrases.
*They **phrased** the music with gusto.*

pronounce	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. <i>She was pronounced dead at the scene.</i>
say	State as one's opinion or judgement; declare. <i>I cannot say zip wire.</i>
sound out	Make a certain noise or sound.
vocalise	Utter with vibrating vocal chords.
vocalize	Sing with several notes to one vowel. <i>A warbler vocalized from a reed bed.</i>
word	Put into words or an expression. <i>He words his request in a particularly ironic way.</i>



Usage Examples of "Articulates" as a verb

- *The ankle bone articulates with the leg bones to form the ankle bones.*



Articulates as an Adjective

Definitions of "Articulates" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "articulates" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Expressing yourself easily or characterized by clear expressive language.*
- *Consisting of segments held together by joints.*



Synonyms of "Articulates" as an adjective (1 Word)

articulated (of an idea or feeling) expressed; put into words.
*One of the first **articulated** emotions that you will hear from a child.*

aloud	Using the voice; not silently. <i>Please read the passage aloud.</i>
dah	The longer of the two telegraphic signals used in Morse code.
declamatory	Ostentatiously lofty in style. <i>A long declamatory speech.</i>
elocution	The skill of clear and expressive speech, especially of distinct pronunciation and articulation. <i>A Rileyesque elocution.</i>
eloquence	Powerful and effective language. <i>A preacher of great power and eloquence.</i>
eloquent	Fluent or persuasive in speaking or writing. <i>An eloquent speech.</i>
eloquently	With eloquence. <i>He expressed his ideas eloquently.</i>
enunciate	Express (a proposition, theory, etc.) in clear or definite terms. <i>She enunciated each word slowly.</i>
eulogy	A formal expression of praise for someone who has died recently. <i>A eulogy to the Queen Mother.</i>
express	By express. <i>She would express her milk using a pump and take it home for her baby.</i>
flowing	Graceful and fluent. <i>The flowing curves of the lawn.</i>
fluent	Able to flow freely; fluid. <i>His style of play was fast and fluent.</i>
formulate	Prepare according to a formula. <i>The government has formulated a policy on waste management.</i>
memorize	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>Have you memorized your lines for the play yet.</i>
monologue	A long utterance by one person (especially one that prevents others from participating in the conversation). <i>He was reciting some of the great monologues of Shakespeare.</i>
oration	The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>Pericles famous funeral oration.</i>
orator	An official speaking for a university on ceremonial occasions. <i>A theatrically effective orator.</i>

oratory	Addressing an audience formally (usually a long and rhetorical address and often pompous. <i>He loved the sound of his own oratory.</i>
persuasive	Good at persuading someone to do or believe something through reasoning or the use of temptation. <i>Persuasive eloquence.</i>
pronounce	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. <i>Asquith pronounced that this was the right course.</i>
recitation	The action of repeating something aloud from memory. <i>The recitation of traditional poems.</i>
<u>recite</u>	Recite in elocution. <i>The doctor recited the list of possible side effects of the drug.</i>
rhetorician	A speaker whose words are primarily intended to impress or persuade. <i>They re ready to listen to any smooth tongued rhetorician.</i>
<u>sing</u>	Deliver by singing. <i>Poetry should sing the variety of the human race.</i>
<u>speaker</u>	A person who speaks. <i>He is a fluent English and French speaker.</i>
talker	Someone who expresses in language; someone who talks (especially someone who delivers a public speech or someone especially garrulous. <i>I was the talker of the group.</i>
tell	Communicate information to someone in spoken or written words. <i>I can t tell the difference between margarine and butter.</i>
<u>utter</u>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>Utter nonsense.</i>
<u>verbalize</u>	Articulate; either verbally or with a cry, shout, or noise. <i>They are unable to verbalize their real feelings.</i>
vocalize	Write (a language such as Hebrew) with vowel points. <i>A warbler vocalized from a reed bed.</i>
