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## Associations of "Articulating" (30 Words)

<b>aloud</b>	Loudly. <i>Cried <b>aloud</b> for help.</i>
<b>dah</b>	The longer of the two telegraphic signals used in Morse code.
<b>declamatory</b>	Ostentatiously lofty in style. <i>A long <b>declamatory</b> speech.</i>
<b>elocution</b>	An expert manner of speaking involving control of voice and gesture. <i>Lessons in singing and <b>elocution</b>.</i>
<b>eloquence</b>	Fluent or persuasive speaking or writing. <i>A preacher of great power and <b>eloquence</b>.</i>
<b>eloquent</b>	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively. <i>The bus journey alone is <b>eloquent</b> of class inequality.</i>
<b>eloquently</b>	In an articulate manner. <i>He expressed his ideas <b>eloquently</b>.</i>
<b>enunciate</b>	Express or state clearly. <i>She <b>enunciated</b> each word slowly.</i>
<b><a href="#">eulogy</a></b>	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly, especially a tribute to someone who has just died. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<b>express</b>	Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>Many of the laboratory animals <b>express</b> the trait.</i>
<b>flowing</b>	(of a line or contour) smoothly continuous. <i>A <b>flowing</b> prose style.</i>
<b><a href="#">fluent</a></b>	Able to express oneself easily and articulately. <i>He spoke <b>fluent</b> Spanish.</i>
<b><a href="#">formulate</a></b>	Elaborate, as of theories and hypotheses. <i>Use special effects paints that are <b>formulated</b> for the task.</i>

<b>memorize</b>	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>He <b>memorized</b> thousands of verses.</i>
<b>monologue</b>	A long utterance by one person (especially one that prevents others from participating in the conversation). <i>He was reciting some of the great <b>monologues</b> of Shakespeare.</i>
<b>oration</b>	The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>Pericles famous funeral <b>oration</b>.</i>
<b>orator</b>	An official speaking for a university on ceremonial occasions. <i>A theatrically effective <b>orator</b>.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	Addressing an audience formally (usually a long and rhetorical address and often pompous). <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>
<b>persuasive</b>	Good at persuading someone to do or believe something through reasoning or the use of temptation. <i>A <b>persuasive</b> argument.</i>
<b>pronounce</b>	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. <i>Allow history to <b>pronounce</b> the verdict.</i>
<b>recitation</b>	Systematic training by multiple repetitions. <i>The <b>recitation</b> of traditional poems.</i>
<b>recite</b>	Recite in elocution. <i>He <b>recited</b> passages of Dante.</i>
<b>rhetorician</b>	A person who delivers a speech or oration. <i>They re ready to listen to any smooth tongued <b>rhetorician</b>.</i>
<b>sing</b>	Deliver by singing. <i>My brother <b>sings</b> very well.</i>
<b>speaker</b>	The presiding officer in a legislative assembly, especially the House of Commons. <i>The <b>speaker</b> at commencement.</i>
<b>talker</b>	A person who speaks or converses, often in a specified way. <i>She s quite a <b>talker</b> conversing and arguing with Henry.</i>
<b>tell</b>	Perceive (the difference between one person or thing and another). <i>He could <b>tell</b> that she was unhappy.</i>
<b>utter</b>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>He <b>uttered</b> strange sounds that nobody could understand.</i>
<b>verbalize</b>	Convert into a verb. <i>They are unable to <b>verbalize</b> their real feelings.</i>
