- *The formation of a speech sound by constriction of the air flow in the vocal organs at a particular place (e.g. the tongue, teeth, or palate) and in a particular way (as a plosive, affricate, etc.).*

- *Clarity in the production of successive notes.*
- *The shape or manner in which things come together and a connection is made.*
- *Expressing in coherent verbal form.*

diction	The articulation of speech regarded from the point of view of its intelligibility to the audience. <i>Wordsworth campaigned against exaggerated poetic diction.</i>
elocution	An expert manner of speaking involving control of voice and gesture. <i>Lessons in singing and elocution.</i>
enunciation	The articulation of speech regarded from the point of view of its intelligibility to the audience.
expression	Expression without words. <i>The expression for the circumference of a circle is $2r$.</i>
inflection	The variation of the pitch of a musical note. <i>A set of word forms differing only in respect of inflections.</i>
intonation	The action of intoning or reciting in a singing voice. <i>Poor woodwind intonation at the opening.</i>
join	A place or line where two or more things are connected or fastened together. <i>It was soldered so well that you couldn't see the join.</i>
joint	A section of a plant stem between two joints an internode. <i>Members connected together by rigid joints.</i>
junction	The action or fact of joining or being joined. <i>The junction of Queen's Road and Lancaster Avenue.</i>
juncture	The set of features in speech that enable a hearer to detect a word or phrase boundary (e.g. distinguishing I scream from ice cream). <i>It is difficult to say at this juncture whether this upturn can be sustained.</i>
manner of speaking	A way of acting or behaving.
mention	An instance of being mentioned in dispatches. <i>Although he didn't win the prize he did get special mention.</i>

modulation	The transmission of a signal by using it to vary a carrier wave; changing the carrier's amplitude or frequency or phase. <i>Great modulations of tempo.</i>
<u>proclamation</u>	The public or official announcement of an important matter. <i>Bold proclamations about their team's hopes for the season.</i>
pronunciation	The way a word or a language is customarily spoken. <i>They are always correcting my pronunciation.</i>
raising	The event of something being raised upward. <i>A raising of the land resulting from volcanic activity.</i>
<u>revelation</u>	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i>An attempt to reconcile Darwinian theories with biblical revelation.</i>
setting forth	The context and environment in which something is set.
speech	A person's style of speaking. <i>They were perfectly comfortable together without speech.</i>
speech pattern	Communication by word of mouth.
statement	An official account of facts, views, or plans, especially one for release to the media. <i>Do you agree with this statement.</i>
talk	Discussion talk about is a less formal alternative for discussion of. <i>His poetry contains much talk about love and anger.</i>
<u>timbre</u>	(music) the distinctive property of a complex sound (a voice or noise or musical sound). <i>Trumpet mutes with different timbres.</i>
tone	A musical interval of two semitones. <i>There was a general tone of ill concealed glee in the reporting.</i>
utterance	The action of saying or expressing something aloud. <i>The simple utterance of a few platitudes.</i>
ventilation	A mechanical system in a building that provides fresh air. <i>Ventilation of the mines had long been mechanized.</i>
venting	The act of venting.
voice	The melody carried by a particular voice or instrument in polyphonic music. <i>He lost his voice.</i>
voicing	Expressing in coherent verbal form.

eloquence	Fluent or persuasive speaking or writing. <i>His eloquence attracted a large congregation.</i>

eloquently	In a fluent or persuasive manner. <i>He expressed his ideas eloquently.</i>

flowing	Graceful and fluent. <i>A flowing prose style.</i>
fluent	Smoothly graceful and effortless. <i>A fluent speaker and writer on technical subjects.</i>
formulate	Create or prepare methodically. <i>He formulated his concerns to the board of trustees.</i>
memorize	Commit to memory; learn by heart. <i>He memorized thousands of verses.</i>
monologue	A long utterance by one person (especially one that prevents others from participating in the conversation). <i>He had a long and exacting monologue at the end of the film.</i>
oration	The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>There is nothing quite like his messianic oration.</i>
orator	A person who delivers a speech or oration. <i>A theatrically effective orator.</i>
oratory	A small chapel, especially for private worship. <i>He loved the sound of his own oratory.</i>
persuasive	Good at persuading someone to do or believe something through reasoning or the use of temptation. <i>Persuasive eloquence.</i>
pronounce	Pronounce judgment on. <i>The Secretary of State will shortly pronounce on alternative measures.</i>
recitation	The action of repeating something aloud from memory. <i>The recitation of traditional poems.</i>

rhetorician	A person who delivers a speech or oration. <i>They're ready to listen to any smooth tongued rhetorician.</i>
