<b>aesthetic</b>	Relating to or dealing with the subject of aesthetics. <i>An <b>aesthetic</b> person.</i>
<b>alternative</b>	Relating to activities that depart from or challenge traditional norms. <i><b>Alternative</b> possibilities were neutrality or war.</i>
<b>attractive</b>	Having power to arouse interest. <i>The job is <b>attractive</b> because of the pay.</i>
<b>avant-garde</b>	Radically new or original.
<b>beautiful</b>	Of a very high standard; excellent. <i><b>Beautiful</b> poetry.</i>
<b>creative</b>	Relating to or involving the use of the imagination or original ideas to create something. <i><b>Creative</b> writing.</i>
<b>decorative</b>	Relating to decoration. <i>A <b>decorative</b> artist.</i>
<b><u>eccentric</u></b>	(of a person or their behaviour) unconventional and slightly strange. <i>A servo driving an <b>eccentric</b> cam.</i>
<b>elegant</b>	Suggesting taste, ease, and wealth. <i>An <b>elegant</b> mathematical solution simple and precise and lucid.</i>
<b>emotional</b>	(of a person) having feelings that are easily excited and openly displayed. <i>His behavior was highly <b>emotional</b>.</i>
<b>esthetic</b>	Aesthetically pleasing. <i>The illustrations made the book an <b>aesthetic</b> success.</i>
<b><u>experimental</u></b>	Based on experience as opposed to authority or conjecture. <i><b>Experimental</b> results that supported the hypothesis.</i>
<b><u>expressive</u></b>	Characterized by expression. <i>A very <b>expressive</b> face.</i>
<b><u>exquisite</u></b>	Extremely beautiful and delicate. <i>Felt <b>exquisite</b> pleasure.</i>
<b>fine</b>	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>Anything you want is <b>fine</b> by me Linda.</i>
<b><u>graceful</u></b>	Characterized by beauty of movement, style, form, or execution. <i>She was a tall girl slender and <b>graceful</b>.</i>
<b><u>idiosyncratic</u></b>	Relating to idiosyncrasy; peculiar or individual. <i>We all have our own <b>idiosyncratic</b> gestures.</i>



<b><u>imaginative</u></b>	Having or showing creativity or inventiveness. <i>Making <b>imaginative</b> use of computer software.</i>
<b><u>inventive</u></b>	Marked by independence and creativity in thought or action- Lewis Mumford. <i>The most <b>inventive</b> composer of his time.</i>
<b><u>irregular</u></b>	(of troops) not belonging to regular or established army units. <i>Their involvement in <b>irregular</b> financial dealings.</i>
<b>lovely</b>	Very pleasant or enjoyable; delightful. <i>How <b>lovely</b> to see you.</i>
<b>moving</b>	Used of a series of photographs presented so as to create the illusion of motion. <i>An unforgettable and <b>moving</b> book.</i>
<b>nonconformist</b>	Characterized by behaviour or views that do not conform to prevailing ideas or practices. <i>Their rabidly <b>nonconformist</b> deportment has made them legendary.</i>
<b>offbeat</b>	Informal terms; strikingly unconventional. <i>The answer sums up his <b>offbeat</b> skewed vision of the world.</i>
<b><u>original</u></b>	Present or existing from the beginning; first or earliest. <i>A subtle and <b>original</b> thinker.</i>
<b>ornamental</b>	Serving an esthetic rather than a useful purpose. <i>An <b>ornamental</b> fountain.</i>
<b><u>stylish</u></b>	Neat, confident, and skilful. <i>A <b>stylish</b> range of jewellery.</i>
<b><u>subtle</u></b>	(especially of a change or distinction) so delicate or precise as to be difficult to analyse or describe. <i>The German plan was simple yet <b>subtle</b>.</i>
<b><u>tasteful</u></b>	Having or showing or conforming to good taste. <i>A <b>tasteful</b> lounge bar.</i>
<b>unconventional</b>	Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention. <i>His <b>unconventional</b> approach to life.</i>
<b>unorthodox</b>	Breaking with convention or tradition. <i>An <b>unorthodox</b> lifestyle.</i>

## Associations of "Artistic" (30 Words)

<b>acrobat</b>	An athlete who performs acts requiring skill and agility and coordination.
<b>aesthetic</b>	Aesthetically pleasing. <i>The <b>aesthetic</b> faculties.</i>
<b>album</b>	One or more recordings issued together; originally released on 12-inch phonograph records (usually with attractive record covers) and later on cassette audiotape and compact disc. <i>His debut <b>album</b> was very much influenced by the jazz sound.</i>
<b>art</b>	The products of human creativity works of art collectively. <i>I was never any good at <b>art</b>.</i>
<b>artist</b>	A person whose creative work shows sensitivity and imagination. <i>A surgeon who is an <b>artist</b> with the scalpel.</i>
<b>ballet</b>	A group of dancers who regularly perform ballets. <i>The Bolshoi <b>Ballet</b>.</i>

<b>ballroom</b>	Ballroom dancing. <i>The number of people learning <b>ballroom</b> has doubled in the last two years.</i>
<b>choreograph</b>	Compose a sequence of dance steps, often to music. <i>The committee <b>choreographs</b> the movement of troops.</i>
<b>choreographer</b>	A person who composes the sequence of steps and moves for a performance of dance. <i>A professional <b>choreographer</b>.</i>
<b>choreography</b>	A notation used by choreographers. <i>As well as dancing she did a great deal of <b>choreography</b>.</i>
<b>circus</b>	A public scene of frenetic, noisy, or confused activity. <i>They used the elephants to help put up the <b>circus</b>.</i>
<b>classical</b>	Relating to the first significant period of an area of study. <i><b>Classical</b> mechanics.</i>
<b>creative</b>	A person whose job involves creative work. <i><b>Creative</b> writing.</i>
<b>dance</b>	A set of lively movements resembling a dance. <i>I <b>danced</b> her out of the room.</i>
<b>dancer</b>	A person who participates in a social gathering arranged for dancing (as a ball). <i>She thought he would become a ballet <b>dancer</b>.</i>
<b>dancing</b>	The activity of dancing for pleasure or in order to entertain others. <i>A <b>dancing</b> class.</i>
<b>disco</b>	Dance to disco music. <i>The Bee Gees <b>disco</b> classic Staying Alive.</i>
<b>esthetic</b>	Relating to or dealing with the subject of aesthetics. <i>An <b>aesthetic</b> person.</i>
<b>eurhythmics</b>	A system of rhythmical physical movements to music used to teach musical understanding (especially in Steiner schools) or for therapeutic purposes, evolved by Émile Jaques-Dalcroze.
<b>gymnast</b>	A person trained or skilled in gymnastics.
<b>kachina</b>	A small carved figure representing a kachina.
<b>mazurka</b>	Music composed for dancing the mazurka.
<b>morris</b>	Leader of the American Revolution who signed the Declaration of Independence and raised money for the Continental Army (1734-1806).
<b>music</b>	Musical activity singing or whistling etc. <i>The background <b>music</b> of softly lapping water.</i>



<b>opera</b>	Operas as a genre of classical music. <i>A very grand programme of <b>opera</b> and ballet.</i>
<b>photography</b>	The act of taking and printing photographs.
<b>pirouette</b>	Perform a pirouette. <i>She <b>pirouetted</b> and made a bow.</i>
<b>quadrille</b>	A piece of music for a quadrille. <i>A 32 horse <b>quadrille</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">singer</a></u>	United States inventor of an improved chain-stitch sewing machine (1811-1875). <i>A pop <b>singer</b>.</i>
<b>trapeze</b>	A swing used by circus acrobats.
