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Associations of "As a whole" (30 Words)

absolutely	Used to emphasize a strong or exaggerated statement. <i>An absolutely magnificent painting.</i>
all	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>She s been all round the world.</i>
altogether	Informal terms for nakedness. <i>Altogether he earns close to a million dollars.</i>
amply	To an ample degree or in an ample manner. <i>The persistent reader is amply rewarded.</i>
collectively	In conjunction with; combined. <i>The vast range of resources that the American people collectively own.</i>
complete	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>A complete list of courses offered by the university.</i>
completely	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’). <i>Was completely at fault.</i>
countrywide	Extending throughout a nation. <i>These units travel countrywide.</i>
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>An entire horse.</i>
entirely	Solely. <i>The traffic seemed to consist entirely of black cabs.</i>
entirety	The whole of something. <i>She would have to stay in her room for the entirety of the weekend.</i>
fully	Sufficiently; more than adequately. <i>The evidence amply or fully confirms our suspicions.</i>

gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>The orchestral gamut.</i>
generic	A consumer product having no brand name or registered trademark. <i>Is there a generic Asian mind.</i>
inclusive	Not excluding any of the parties or groups involved in something. <i>This is a testament to the inclusive environment fostered at our school.</i>
oneness	The quality of being united into one. <i>The oneness of all suffering people.</i>
<u>outright</u>	Total. <i>He was killed outright.</i>
<u>overall</u>	A loose protective coverall or smock worn over ordinary clothing for dirty work. <i>A pair of overalls.</i>
perfect	Make perfect or complete. <i>A perfect specimen.</i>
perfectly	Used for emphasis, especially in order to assert something that has been challenged or doubted. <i>You know perfectly well I can't stay.</i>
ripen	Cause to ripen or develop fully. <i>The plums ripen in July.</i>
<u>solely</u>	Not involving anyone or anything else; only. <i>Did it solely for money.</i>
<u>thoroughly</u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>She was soon thoroughly bored.</i>
<u>total</u>	Damage (something, typically a vehicle) beyond repair; wreck. <i>A total eclipse.</i>
<u>totally</u>	Completely; absolutely. <i>I'm sorry I totally didn't mean it.</i>
<u>unity</u>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>Ways of preserving family unity.</i>
<u>universal</u>	A thing having universal effect currency or application. <i>Universal wrench.</i>
unsuited	Not easy to combine harmoniously. <i>He was totally unsuited for the job.</i>

utterly Completely and without qualification; absolutely.
Utterly miserable.

wholly To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly.
*She found herself given over **wholly** to sensation.*
