- *(Christianity) celebration of the Ascension of Christ into heaven; observed on the 40th day after Easter.*
- *The action of rising to an important position or a higher level.*
- *The ascent of Christ into heaven on the fortieth day after the Resurrection.*
- *A movement upward.*
- *(New Testament) the rising of the body of Jesus into heaven on the 40th day after his Resurrection.*

<u>climb</u>	A mountain hill or slope that is climbed. <i>The rate of climb can be set by the pilot.</i>
launch	An act or instance of launching something. <i>The launch of a new campaign against drinking and driving.</i>

levitation	The action of rising or causing something to rise and hover in the air, typically by means of supposed magical powers. <i>Arm levitation.</i>
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>It was here that the brook had its rise.</i>
rising	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>The reforms led to peasant risings.</i>
soaring	The activity of flying a glider.

- abortive** Causing or resulting in abortion.
*An **abortive** revolt.*
- christian** A religious person who believes Jesus is the Christ and who is a member of a Christian denomination.
- corpse** The dead body of a human being.
*The **corpse** of a man lay there.*
- dead** Devoid of activity.
*His gums were **dead** from the novocain.*
- death** The personification of death.
*It was the **death** of all his plans.*

<u>decease</u>	The event of dying or departure from life. <i>Upon your decease the capital will pass to your grandchildren.</i>
deceased	Recently dead. <i>The will of Christopher Smith deceased.</i>
disbelieve	Be unable to believe. <i>To disbelieve is as much an act of faith as belief.</i>
<u>doom</u>	An unpleasant or disastrous destiny. <i>Everyone was aware of the approaching doom but was helpless to avoid it.</i>
elixir	A magical or medicinal potion. <i>A cough elixir.</i>
heaven	Used in various exclamations as a substitute for 'God'. <i>Constantine was persuaded that disunity in the Church was displeasing to heaven.</i>
immortality	The quality or state of being immortal. <i>Occasionally a guide book has achieved immortality.</i>
inanimate	Belonging to the class of nouns denoting nonliving things. <i>He was completely inanimate and it was difficult to see if he was breathing.</i>
inoperative	Not working or taking effect. <i>An inoperative law.</i>
<u>karma</u>	The effects of a person's actions that determine his destiny in his next incarnation.
<u>lifeless</u>	Lacking vigour, vitality, or excitement. <i>A lifeless planet.</i>
metempsychosis	The supposed transmigration at death of the soul of a human being or animal into a new body of the same or a different species. <i>The speaker perceives himself as an avatar in a sustained metempsychosis.</i>
<u>miracle</u>	An extraordinary and welcome event that is not explicable by natural or scientific laws and is therefore attributed to a divine agency. <i>A miracle drug.</i>
nirvana	An ideal or idyllic state or place. <i>The days of socialist nirvana in Europe are over.</i>
<u>paradise</u>	An ideal or idyllic place or state. <i>My idea of paradise is to relax on the seafront.</i>
perish	Die, especially in a violent or sudden way. <i>Must these noble hopes perish so soon.</i>

<u>purgatory</u>	(in Catholic doctrine) a place or state of suffering inhabited by the souls of sinners who are expiating their sins before going to heaven. <i>Infernal punishments are purgatory and medicinal.</i>
<u>rebirth</u>	The revival of learning and culture. <i>The endless cycle of birth death and rebirth.</i>
<u>reincarnation</u>	The rebirth of a soul in another body. <i>He believed he was the reincarnation of Louis XVI.</i>
<u>resurrect</u>	Restore (a dead person) to life. <i>He queried whether Jesus was indeed resurrected.</i>
<u>resurrection</u>	The revitalization or revival of something. <i>The resurrection of the country under a charismatic leader.</i>
resuscitated	Restored to life or consciousness.
revive	Regain life, consciousness, or strength. <i>Many pagan traditions are being revived.</i>
soul	A secular form of gospel that was a major Black musical genre in the 1960s and 1970s. <i>Their interpretation lacked soul.</i>
