loath Strongly opposed.

Loath to go on such short notice.

penitent Feeling or expressing remorse for misdeeds.

A **penitent** expression.

regretful Feeling or showing regret.

Regretful over mistakes she had made.

reluctant Disinclined to become involved.

Fresh from college and **reluctant** for the moment to marry him.

remorseful Filled with remorse; sorry.

The defendant was **remorseful** for what he had done.

repentant Expressing or feeling sincere regret and remorse; remorseful.

He is truly repentant for his incredible naivety and stypidity.

He is truly **repentant** for his incredible naivety and stupidity.

rueful Expressing sorrow or regret, especially in a wry or humorous way.

She gave a **rueful** grin.
Showing a sense of quilt.

shamefaced All the boys looked shamefaced.

Showing or feeling embarrassment from shame or a lack of self-confidence.

sheepish A sheepish grin.

slow At a slow tempo.

Slow but steady growth.

Sorry Without merit.

He looks a **sorry** sight with his broken jaw.

unwilling In spite of contrary volition. **Unwilling** to face facts.
