Definitions of "Asphalt" as a noun

- *Mixed asphalt and crushed gravel or sand; used especially for paving but also for roofing.*
- *The pitch used in asphalt, sometimes found in natural deposits but usually made by the distillation of crude oil.*
- *A mixture of dark bituminous pitch with sand or gravel, used for surfacing roads, flooring, roofing, etc.*
- *A dark bituminous substance found in natural beds and as residue from petroleum distillation; consists mainly of hydrocarbons.*



Synonyms of "Asphalt" as a noun (3 Words)

- bitumen** Any of various naturally occurring impure mixtures of hydrocarbons.
*A kilometre and a half of **bitumen**.*
- mineral pitch** Solid homogeneous inorganic substances occurring in nature having a definite chemical composition.
- tar** A substance resembling tar formed by burning tobacco or other material.
*High **tar** cigarettes.*

- *Cover with tar or asphalt.*
- *Surface with asphalt.*



Synonyms of "Asphalt" as a verb (12 Words)

- concrete** Make real or concrete instead of abstract.
*The post is **concreted** into the ground.*
- concrete over** Form into a solid mass; coalesce.
- cover** Provide with a covering or cause to be covered.
*She was **covered** in confusion.*
- finish** Come or bring to a finish or an end.
*Dean **finished** well to put his team ahead.*
- flag** Register a vessel in a particular country under whose flag it then sails.
*The disease was **flagged** up as a priority area for research.*
- floor** Provide a room or area with a floor.
*That question **floored** him.*
- metal** Make or mend a road with road metal.
*Several miles of the old road had been **metalled** with crushed stone.*

surface Rise or come up to the surface of the water or the ground.
*I hope the list key is going to **surface** again.*

tar Cover something with tar.
***Tar** the roof.*

tarmac Surface a road or other outdoor area with tarmac or a similar material.
*They ll be wanting to **tarmac** the path.*

tile Cover with tiles.
*The lobby was **tiled** in blue.*

top Be at the top of or constitute the top or highest point.
*Sliced and **topped** shots.*



Usage Examples of "Asphalt" as a verb

- *Asphalt the driveway.*

- avenue** A way of approaching a problem or making progress towards something.

- boulevard** A wide street in a town or city, typically one lined with trees.

- cement** Bind or join with or as if with cement.

<u>crossover</u>	The process of achieving success in a different field or style, especially in popular music. A crossover study.
crossroad	A junction where one street or road crosses another.
crosswalk	A marked part of a road where pedestrians have right of way to cross; a pedestrian crossing.
drawbridge	A bridge that can be raised to block passage or to allow boats or ships to pass beneath it. <i>There was a rattle of chains as the drawbridge was lowered.</i>
driveway	A road leading up to a private house. <i>One of the suspects backed a vehicle into the driveway.</i>
fordable	Shallow enough to be crossed by walking or riding on an animal or in a vehicle. <i>The stream was fordable.</i>
highway	(chiefly in official use) a public road. <i>The highway to success.</i>
<u>intersection</u>	A representation of common ground between theories or phenomena. <i>The set of red hats is the intersection of the set of hats and the set of red things.</i>
junction	A point where two or more things are joined. <i>The junction of Queen s Road and Lancaster Avenue.</i>
lamppost	A metal post supporting an outdoor lamp (such as a streetlight).
lane	A route prescribed for or regularly followed by ships or aircraft. <i>The car moved into the outside lane.</i>
masonry	Freemasonry. <i>Masonry nails.</i>
path	A course of conduct. <i>A vegetarian diet could be the path to a longer life.</i>
pave	A setting with precious stones so closely set that no metal shows. <i>Pave the roads in the village.</i>
pavement	Material used to pave an area. <i>A pavement cafe.</i>
<u>pedestrian</u>	A person who travels by foot. <i>The road is so dangerous pedestrians avoid it.</i>
<u>road</u>	The part of a road intended for vehicles especially in contrast to a verge or pavement. <i>They waited for a clear road at Hellifield Junction.</i>

roadway	A road (especially that part of a road) over which vehicles travel.
route	Send via a specific route. <i>The scenic route from Florence to Siena.</i>
sidewalk	A paved path for pedestrians at the side of a road; a pavement.
skyway	A covered overhead walkway between buildings. <i>Skyways from 18 000 to 40 000 feet resemble a highway system.</i>
street	The streets of a city viewed as a depressed environment in which there is poverty and crime and prostitution and dereliction. <i>The street kids of the city.</i>
tarmac	A runway or other area surfaced with tarmac or a similar material. <i>The tarmac path.</i>
walkway	A passage or path for walking along, especially a raised passageway connecting different sections of a building or a wide path in a park or garden.
