| hanker | Desire strongly or persistently. She hanker ed to go back. |
| hankering | A strong desire to have or do something. A hankering for family life. |
| homesick | Experiencing a longing for one's home during a period of absence from it. <i>He was homesick for America after five weeks in Europe.</i> |
| homesickness | A longing to return home. I lived four years in London without a single pang of homesickness . |
| <u>insatiable</u> | Of a person having an insatiable appetite or desire for something especially sex. An insatiable hunger for success. |
| <u>jealous</u> | Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. She was always jealous of me. |
| <u>long</u> | Of elongated shape. A long position in gold. |
| <u>longing</u> | A yearning desire. Miranda felt a wistful longing for the old days. |
| <u>nostalgia</u> | Something done or presented in order to evoke feelings of nostalgia. An evening of TV nostalgia . |
| <u>starve</u> | Die of food deprivation. The political prisoners starve d to death. |



| thirst | Have a strong desire for something. His thirst for knowledge was mainly academic. |

| <u>unquenchable</u> | Not able to be quenched. His enthusiasm was unquenchable . |
| <u>unrequited</u> | Not returned in kind. Unrequited unanswered love. |
| want | Feel or have a desire for want strongly. <i>She wanted me to leave.</i> |
| weariness | Reluctance to see or experience any more of something. <i>He began to feel weariness.</i> |
| <u>yearn</u> | Have an intense feeling of longing for something, typically something that one has lost or been separated from. <i>No fellow spirit</i> yearn <i>ed towards her.</i> |
