### **Definitions of "Aspiring" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “aspiring” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Desiring or striving for recognition or advancement.*
- *Directing one's hopes or ambitions towards becoming a specified type of person.*



## Synonyms of "Aspiring" as an adjective (2 Words)

**aspirant** Having ambitions to achieve something, typically to follow a particular career.  
*An **aspirant** politician.*

**wishful** Having or expressing desire for something.  
*Without resources the proposed measures were merely **wishful** thinking.*

## Associations of "Aspiring" (30 Words)

<b>ambitious</b>	(of a plan or piece of work) intended to satisfy high aspirations and therefore difficult to achieve. <i>An <b>ambitious</b> enterprise.</i>
<b>anticipate</b>	Come or take place before (an event or process expected or scheduled for a later time). <i>They failed to <b>anticipate</b> a full scale invasion.</i>
<b>anticipation</b>	Anticipating with confidence of fulfillment. <i>They manned the telephones in <b>anticipation</b> of a flood of calls.</i>
<b><u>anticipatory</u></b>	Happening, performed, or felt in anticipation of something. <i>An <b>anticipatory</b> flash of excitement.</i>
<b>aspirant</b>	Desiring or striving for recognition or advancement. <i>An <b>aspirant</b> to the throne.</i>
<b><u>assume</u></b>	Take on titles, offices, duties, responsibilities. <i>He <b>assumed</b> full responsibility for all organizational work.</i>
<b>assumption</b>	Arrogance or presumption. <i>The <b>assumption</b> of an active role in regional settlements.</i>

<b>envisage</b>	Contemplate or conceive of as a possibility or a desirable future event. <i>The Rome Treaty <b>envisaged</b> free movement across frontiers.</i>
<b><u>expect</u></b>	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>Celia was <b>expecting</b> a visitor.</i>
<b>expectancy</b>	Something expected (as on the basis of a norm). <i>An indicator of <b>expectancy</b> in development.</i>
<b>expectation</b>	One's prospects of inheritance. <i>I sat down in <b>expectation</b> of a feast of nostalgia.</i>
<b><u>expected</u></b>	Considered likely or probable to happen or arrive. <i>The <b>expected</b> high temperatures are well above normal for this time of year.</i>
<b>forecast</b>	Predict in advance. <i>Rain is <b>forecast</b> for Scotland.</i>
<b>foresight</b>	Seeing ahead; knowing in advance; foreseeing. <i>He had the <b>foresight</b> to check that his escape route was clear.</i>
<b>future</b>	A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the future. <i>Work on the building will be shelved for the foreseeable <b>future</b>.</i>
<b>guess</b>	Guess correctly solve by guessing. <i>My <b>guess</b> is that within a year we will have a referendum.</i>
<b><u>hopeful</u></b>	Likely to turn out well in the future. <i>A <b>hopeful</b> sign.</i>
<b>lifespan</b>	The period during which something is functional (as between birth and death). <i>The human <b>lifespan</b>.</i>
<b>preconception</b>	An opinion formed beforehand without adequate evidence. <i>He did not even try to confirm his <b>preconceptions</b>.</i>
<b>predict</b>	Make a prediction about tell in advance. <i>He <b>predicts</b> that the trend will continue.</i>
<b><u>predictable</u></b>	Always behaving or occurring in the way expected. <i>The characters are stereotyped and extremely <b>predictable</b>.</i>
<b>prediction</b>	The action of predicting something. <i>A <b>prediction</b> that economic growth would resume.</i>
<b><u>presume</u></b>	Make unjustified demands; take liberties. <i>I <b>presumed</b> that the man had been escorted from the building.</i>
<b><u>presumption</u></b>	An assumption that is taken for granted. <i>The planning policy shows a general <b>presumption</b> in favour of development.</i>

<b>presuppose</b>	Require as a necessary antecedent or precondition. <i>I <b>presuppose</b> that you have done your work.</i>
<b>prognosis</b>	A prediction of the course of a disease. <i>It is very difficult to make an accurate <b>prognosis</b>.</i>
<b>promising</b>	Showing possibility of achievement or excellence. <i>A <b>promising</b> film actor.</i>
<u>suppose</u>	Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand. <i>I <b>suppose</b> I got there about noon.</i>
<b>supposition</b>	A belief held without proof or certain knowledge; an assumption or hypothesis. <i>They were working on the <b>supposition</b> that his death was murder.</i>
<u>visionary</u>	A person given to fanciful speculations and enthusiasms with little regard for what is actually possible. <i>A <b>visionary</b> leader.</i>
