### Definitions of "Assemble" as a verb

- *Translate (a program) from a higher-level programming language into machine code.*
- *(of people) gather together in one place for a common purpose.*
- *Collect in one place.*
- *Cause (people or things) to gather together for a common purpose.*
- *Fit together the separate component parts of (a machine or other object).*
- *Create by putting components or members together.*
- *Get people together.*
- *(of male moths) gather for mating in response to a pheromone released by a female.*

<b>connect</b>	Make a logical or causal connection. <i>Operator could you <b>connect</b> me to the Raffles in Singapore.</i>
<b>construct</b>	Draw or delineate (a geometrical figure) accurately to given conditions. <b>Construct</b> a sentence.
<b>convene</b>	Come or bring together for a meeting or activity; assemble. <i>He had <b>convened</b> a secret meeting of military personnel.</i>
<b>fabricate</b>	Put together out of artificial or natural components or parts. <i>You will have to <b>fabricate</b> an exhaust system.</i>
<b>fit together</b>	Be agreeable or acceptable to.
<b>flock together</b>	Come together as in a cluster or flock.
<b>foregather</b>	Collect in one place. <i>Most of the students had <b>foregathered</b> by this time.</i>
<b>forgather</b>	Collect in one place.
<b>gather</b>	Collect or gather. <i>She paused to <b>gather</b> her breath and leaned against the wall puffing.</i>
<b>get together</b>	Leave immediately; used usually in the imperative form.
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>The two roads <b>join</b> here.</i>
<b>join up</b>	Cause to become joined or linked.
<b>manufacture</b>	(of a living thing) produce (a substance) naturally. <i>Julia <b>manufactured</b> a smile.</i>
<b>marshal</b>	Correctly position or arrange (rolling stock). <b>Marshal</b> facts or arguments.
<b>mass</b>	Join together into a mass or collect or form a mass. <i>Both countries began <b>massing</b> troops in the region.</i>
<b>meet</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <b>Meet</b> a need.
<b>muster</b>	(of a group of people) gather together. <i>He replied with as much dignity as he could <b>muster</b>.</i>
<b>patch up</b>	Provide with a patch; also used metaphorically.
<b>piece</b>	To join or unite the pieces of. <i>She <b>pieced</b> a quilt.</i>
<b>piece together</b>	Eat intermittently; take small bites of.
<b>put together</b>	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
<b>rally</b>	Drive in a rally. <i>A series of meetings to <b>rally</b> support for the union.</i>

<b>round up</b>	Attack in speech or writing.
<b>set up</b>	Equip with sails or masts.
<b>sew</b>	Make a garment by sewing. <i>She could <b>sew</b> the veil on properly in the morning.</i>
<b>sew up</b>	Create (clothes) with cloth.
<b><u>summon</u></b>	Call in an official matter, such as to attend court. <i>Names that <b>summon</b> up images of far off places.</i>
<b>tack</b>	Fasten or fix in place with tacks. <i>The castles have new wings and other bits <b>tacked</b> on.</i>
<b>tack together</b>	Fix to; attach.
<b>unite</b>	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>He called on the party to <b>unite</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Assemble" as a verb

- *The males assemble and hang by their front legs within a yard or two of the female.*

- *We assembled in the church basement.*
- *Assemble your colleagues.*
- *He assembled the surviving members of the group for a tour.*
- *My new machine is being assembled and my old one dismantled.*
- *The assembling of male moths around a freshly emerged female.*
- *Assemble the program and produce a file suitable to input to the simulator.*
- *A crowd had assembled outside the gates.*

Gather together or acquire an increasing number or quantity of.  
*The toxin **accumulated** in their bodies.*

### accumulation

A mass or quantity of something that has gradually gathered or been acquired.  
*The **accumulation** of wealth.*

<b>agglomerate</b>	A collection of objects laid on top of each other. <i>A multimedia <b>agglomerate</b>.</i>
<b>agglomeration</b>	A mass or collection of things; an assemblage. <i>The arts centre is an <b>agglomeration</b> of theatres galleries shops restaurants and bars.</i>
<b>aggregate</b>	Amount in the aggregate to. <i>Use <b>aggregate</b> for the first layer when filling the trench.</i>
<b>amass</b>	Gather together in a crowd or group. <i>The soldiers were <b>amassing</b> from all parts of Spain.</i>
<b>assembler</b>	A program to convert assembly language into machine language.
<b>caisson</b>	A two-wheeled military vehicle carrying artillery ammunition.
<b>cluster</b>	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>The children <b>clustered</b> round her skirts.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>He <b>collected</b> the rent.</i>
<b>collection</b>	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>A record <b>collection</b>.</i>
<b>congregate</b>	Come together, usually for a purpose. <i>The crowds <b>congregated</b> in front of the Vatican on Christmas Eve.</i>
<b>crowd</b>	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>You have to set yourself apart from the <b>crowd</b>.</i>
<b>cumulate</b>	Gather together and combine. <i>The systems <b>cumulate</b> data over a period of years.</i>
<b>electrician</b>	A person who installs and maintains electrical equipment.
<b>embedded</b>	Inserted as an integral part of a surrounding whole. <i>Confused by the <b>embedded</b> Latin quotations.</i>
<b>fix</b>	Make fixed stable or stationary. <i>Let s <b>fix</b> the date for the party.</i>
<b>flock</b>	Of birds congregate in a flock. <i>Tourists <b>flocked</b> to the shrine where the statue was said to have shed tears.</i>
<b>heap</b>	Form a heap. <i>A <b>heap</b> of gravel.</i>
<b>jam</b>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>People <b>jammed</b> their belongings into cars.</i>

<b>kit</b>	Gear consisting of a set of articles or tools for a specified purpose. <i>A first aid <b>kit</b>.</i>
<b><u>mechanic</u></b>	A skilled worker who repairs and maintains vehicle engines and other machinery. <i>From blank to blank a threadless way I pushed <b>mechanic</b> feet.</i>
<b>nucleate</b>	Form around a central area. <i>Some cells had <b>nucleated</b>.</i>
<b><u>pack</u></b>	Have the property of being packable or of compacting easily. <i>We picked up our <b>packs</b> and trudged off.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>The teacher <b>piled</b> work on the students until the parents protested.</i>
<b>sheaf</b>	A bundle of objects of one kind, especially papers. <i>He waved a <b>sheaf</b> of papers in the air.</i>
<b><u>stack</u></b>	Arrange in stacks. <i>There s <b>stacks</b> of work for me now.</i>
<b><u>stacked</u></b>	Arranged in a stack. <i>You were playing against a <b>stacked</b> deck.</i>
<b>ton</b>	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>All of a sudden I had <b>tons</b> of friends.</i>
<b>welder</b>	Joins pieces of metal by welding them together. <i>He worked as a <b>welder</b> in a steel factory.</i>
