connect	Make a logical or causal connection. <i>Operator could you connect me to the Raffles in Singapore.</i>
construct	Draw or delineate (a geometrical figure) accurately to given conditions. Construct a sentence.
convene	Come or bring together for a meeting or activity; assemble. <i>He had convened a secret meeting of military personnel.</i>
fabricate	Put together out of artificial or natural components or parts. <i>You will have to fabricate an exhaust system.</i>
fit together	Be agreeable or acceptable to.
flock together	Come together as in a cluster or flock.
foregather	Collect in one place. <i>Most of the students had foregathered by this time.</i>
forgather	Collect in one place.
gather	Collect or gather. <i>She paused to gather her breath and leaned against the wall puffing.</i>
get together	Leave immediately; used usually in the imperative form.
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>The two roads join here.</i>
join up	Cause to become joined or linked.
manufacture	(of a living thing) produce (a substance) naturally. <i>Julia manufactured a smile.</i>
marshal	Correctly position or arrange (rolling stock). Marshal facts or arguments.
mass	Join together into a mass or collect or form a mass. <i>Both countries began massing troops in the region.</i>
meet	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. Meet a need.
muster	(of a group of people) gather together. <i>He replied with as much dignity as he could muster.</i>
patch up	Provide with a patch; also used metaphorically.
piece	To join or unite the pieces of. <i>She pieced a quilt.</i>
piece together	Eat intermittently; take small bites of.
put together	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
rally	Drive in a rally. <i>A series of meetings to rally support for the union.</i>

round up	Attack in speech or writing.
set up	Equip with sails or masts.
sew	Make a garment by sewing. <i>She could sew the veil on properly in the morning.</i>
sew up	Create (clothes) with cloth.
<u>summon</u>	Call in an official matter, such as to attend court. <i>Names that summon up images of far off places.</i>
tack	Fasten or fix in place with tacks. <i>The castles have new wings and other bits tacked on.</i>
tack together	Fix to; attach.
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>He called on the party to unite.</i>

- *A crowd had assembled outside the gates.*

agglomerate	A collection of objects laid on top of each other. <i>A multimedia agglomerate.</i>
agglomeration	A mass or collection of things; an assemblage. <i>The arts centre is an agglomeration of theatres galleries shops restaurants and bars.</i>
aggregate	Amount in the aggregate to. <i>Use aggregate for the first layer when filling the trench.</i>
amass	Gather together in a crowd or group. <i>The soldiers were amassing from all parts of Spain.</i>
assembler	A program to convert assembly language into machine language.
caisson	A two-wheeled military vehicle carrying artillery ammunition.
cluster	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>The children clustered round her skirts.</i>

electrician	A person who installs and maintains electrical equipment.
embedded	Inserted as an integral part of a surrounding whole. <i>Confused by the embedded Latin quotations.</i>
fix	Make fixed stable or stationary. <i>Let s fix the date for the party.</i>
flock	Of birds congregate in a flock. <i>Tourists flocked to the shrine where the statue was said to have shed tears.</i>
heap	Form a heap. <i>A heap of gravel.</i>
jam	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>People jammed their belongings into cars.</i>

kit	Gear consisting of a set of articles or tools for a specified purpose. <i>A first aid kit.</i>
<u>mechanic</u>	A skilled worker who repairs and maintains vehicle engines and other machinery. <i>From blank to blank a threadless way I pushed mechanic feet.</i>
nucleate	Form around a central area. <i>Some cells had nucleated.</i>
<u>pack</u>	Have the property of being packable or of compacting easily. <i>We picked up our packs and trudged off.</i>
pile	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>The teacher piled work on the students until the parents protested.</i>
sheaf	A bundle of objects of one kind, especially papers. <i>He waved a sheaf of papers in the air.</i>
<u>stack</u>	Arrange in stacks. <i>There s stacks of work for me now.</i>
<u>stacked</u>	Arranged in a stack. <i>You were playing against a stacked deck.</i>
ton	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>All of a sudden I had tons of friends.</i>
welder	Joins pieces of metal by welding them together. <i>He worked as a welder in a steel factory.</i>
