- *The regular gathering of the teachers and pupils of a school at the start or end of the day.*
- *The act of constructing something (as a piece of machinery).*
- *The action of fitting together the component parts of a machine or other object.*
- *A group of people gathered together in one place for a common purpose.*
- *A public facility to meet for open discussion.*
- *A group of persons who are gathered together for a common purpose.*
- *The action of gathering together as a group for a common purpose.*
- *A signal for troops to assemble, given by drum or bugle.*
- *A unit consisting of components that have been fitted together.*
- *The social act of assembling.*
- *A group of machine parts that fit together to form a self-contained unit.*
- *A group of people elected to make laws or decisions for a particular country or region.*

- *The conversion of instructions in low-level code to machine code.*

assemblage	A work of art made by grouping together found or unrelated objects. <i>A loose assemblage of diverse groups.</i>
audience	A conference (usually with someone important). <i>He demanded an audience with the Pope.</i>
body	The body excluding the head and neck and limbs. <i>Restructuring formulations help to add body.</i>
building	The occupants of a building. <i>Workers in the building trades.</i>
company	A social gathering of guests or companions. <i>He missed their company.</i>
congregation	A group of people assembled for religious worship. <i>A great congregation of birds flew over.</i>
congress	The social act of assembling for some common purpose. <i>The lovers met discreetly for the purposes of sexual congress.</i>

connection	(usually plural) a person who is influential and to whom you are connected in some way (as by family or friendship). <i>Ensure that all connections between the wires are properly made.</i>
construction	An interpretation of a text or action. <i>50 000 more jobs will go from construction.</i>
<u>convention</u>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>The law is felt to express social conventions.</i>
convocation	A formal ceremony for the conferment of university awards. <i>The arguments delayed the convocation of the first congress planned for February 1992.</i>
<u>council</u>	Denoting housing provided by a local council at a subsidized rent. <i>A council flat.</i>
crowd	The mass or multitude of ordinary people. <i>He still hangs out with the same crowd.</i>
fabrication	The act of making something (a product) from raw materials. <i>The synthesis and fabrication of single crystals.</i>
fitting together	A small and often standardized accessory to a larger system.
forum	A website or web page where users can post comments about a particular issue or topic and reply to other users' postings. <i>We hope these pages act as a forum for debate.</i>
gathering	The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i>
group	Any number of entities (members) considered as a unit. <i>I've always been a fan of the guitarists in the group.</i>
joining	The act of bringing two things into contact (especially for communication). <i>The joining of hands around the table.</i>
manufacture	Manufactured articles. <i>An improvement in the manufacture of explosives.</i>
meeting	A place where things merge or flow together (especially rivers). <i>An athletics meeting.</i>
meeting place	The social act of assembling for some common purpose.
piecing together	A separate part of a whole.
putting together	The option to sell a given stock (or stock index or commodity future) at a given price before a given date.

rally	A long-distance race for motor vehicles over public roads or rough terrain, typically in several stages. <i>A rally of more than three strokes was a rarity.</i>
setting up	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal (as in a ring or other jewelry) that holds a gem in place.
synod	An assembly of the clergy and sometimes also the laity in a diocese or other division of a particular Church. <i>The deanery synod.</i>
throng	A large gathering of people. <i>A throng of birds.</i>
turnout	The outward rotation of a dancer's leg from the hip. <i>At most junctions and crossovers the trains will be able to take the turnout at 230 km h.</i>

assemblage	The social act of assembling. <i>Some vast assemblage of gears and cogs.</i>
associational	Of or relating to associations or associationism.
bicameral	Composed of two legislative bodies. <i>A bicameral Parliament consisting of an appointed Senate and a popularly elected House of Assembly.</i>
bipartisan	Supported by both sides. <i>The reforms received considerable bipartisan approval.</i>
bureaucracy	The officials in a bureaucracy considered as a group or hierarchy. <i>The unnecessary bureaucracy in local government.</i>
caucus	Hold or form a legislative caucus. <i>More than half of those young people that caucused yesterday caucused for Barack Obama.</i>
<u>chamber</u>	Place a bullet into the chamber of a gun. <i>A burial chamber.</i>
commission	Put into commission equip for service of ships. <i>Put the ships into commission.</i>
<u>conclave</u>	The meeting place for a conclave.
<u>conference</u>	Take part in a conference or conference call. <i>A conference call.</i>
congress	The social act of assembling for some common purpose. <i>Sexual congress.</i>
congressional	Of or relating to congress. <i>The document surfaced in a congressional hearing last year.</i>
<u>convene</u>	Meet formally. <i>He had convened a secret meeting of military personnel.</i>
convocation	A large formal assembly of people. <i>The arguments delayed the convocation of the first congress planned for February 1992.</i>
convoke	Call together. <i>She sent messages convoking a Council of Ministers.</i>
cumulate	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. <i>Cumulate gabbro.</i>
debrief	Put someone through a debriefing and make him report. <i>The released hostages were debriefed.</i>
forum	A public facility to meet for open discussion. <i>We hope these pages act as a forum for debate.</i>

gathering	The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i>
legislature	The legislative body of a country or state. <i>The Nevada state legislature passed a law to prohibit dumping of nuclear waste.</i>
meeting	A place where things merge or flow together (especially rivers). <i>His meeting with the salesmen was the high point of his day.</i>
parliament	The members of Parliament between one dissolution and the next. <i>The act was passed by the last parliament of the reign.</i>
placement	The act of putting something in a certain place. <i>The proper placement of microphones.</i>
plenary	A meeting or session attended by all participants at a conference or assembly. <i>Working parties would report back to the plenary with recommendations.</i>
polity	An organized society; a state as a political entity. <i>The period in which West Germany was a distinct polity.</i>
senator	A Lord of Session. <i>Senator Vandenburg.</i>
<u>session</u>	A period of recording music in a studio especially by a session musician. <i>Gym is followed by a training session.</i>
synod	A council convened to discuss ecclesiastical business. <i>The deanery synod.</i>
