
## Assimilation as a Noun

#### Definitions of "Assimilation" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "assimilation" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A linguistic process by which a sound becomes similar to an adjacent sound.
- The fact of a sound being made more like another in the same or next word.
- The absorption and digestion of food or nutrients by the body or any biological system.
- In the theories of Jean Piaget: the application of a general schema to a particular instance.
- *The process of absorbing nutrients into the body after digestion.*
- The process of becoming similar to something.
- The absorption and integration of people, ideas, or culture into a wider society or culture.
- The state of being assimilated; people of different backgrounds come to see themselves as part of a larger national family.
- The process of assimilating new ideas into an existing cognitive structure.
- The social process of absorbing one cultural group into harmony with another.
- The process of taking in and fully understanding information or ideas.

absorb	Take up and reduce the effect or intensity of (sound or an impact. <i>She absorbed the information in silence.</i>
absorption	The process by which one thing absorbs or is absorbed by another. The <b>absorption</b> of photons by atoms or molecules.
accord	Harmony of people's opinions or actions or characters. The powers <b>accord</b> ed to the head of state.
agreed	(of two or more parties) holding the same view or opinion on something. All the republics are <b>agreed</b> on the necessity of a common defence policy.
agreement	Compatibility of observations. Agreement between experimental observations and theory.
assimilate	Take (gas, light or heat) into a solution. This country <b>assimilate</b> s immigrants very quickly.
awash	Covered or flooded with water, especially seawater or rain. The main deck was afloat or <b>awash</b> .
<u>blacksmith</u>	A farrier.



comprehend	Get the meaning of something. <i>He couldn t <b>comprehend</b> her reasons for marrying Lovat.</i>
<u>compromise</u>	Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. The nuclear secrets of the state were <b>compromise</b> d by the spy.
<u>concentration</u>	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>She was frowning in concentration.</i>
<u>concord</u>	Arrange by concord or agreement. A <b>concord</b> was to be drawn up.
concur	Be of the same opinion; agree. In tests cytogenetic determination has been found to <b>concur</b> with enzymatic determination.
consume	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. Carolyn was <b>consume</b> d with guilt.
denseness	The spatial property of being crowded together.
immerse	Cause to be immersed. She <b>immerse</b> d herself in her work.
immersion	Deep mental involvement in something. As a teacher she advocates learning by <b>immersion</b> .
incorporate	Include or contain; have as a component. <i>He has <b>incorporate</b>d in his proposals a number of measures.</i>
<u>ingest</u>	Absorb (information. They <b>ingest</b> oxygen from the air.
moisture	Wetness caused by water. The air was constantly heavy with <b>moisture</b> .
<u>morbid</u>	Characterized by an abnormal and unhealthy interest in disturbing and unpleasant subjects, especially death and disease. His <b>morbid</b> fascination with the horrors of contemporary warfare.
preoccupation	An idea that preoccupies the mind and holds the attention. Their main <b>preoccupation</b> was how to feed their families.
pull	The force used in pulling. She <b>pull</b> ed a handkerchief out of her pocket.
<u>saturate</u>	A saturated fat. The air is <b>saturate</b> d with the smells of food.
<u>soak</u>	Washing something by allowing it to soak. I <b>soak</b> ed in the hot tub for an hour.



<u>submerge</u>	Cover completely or make imperceptible. Houses had been flooded and cars <b>submerge</b> d.
submergence	Sinking until covered completely with water. Politicians may be blamed for <b>submergence</b> of principle.
<u>surround</u>	Surround with a wall in order to fortify. He loves to <b>surround</b> himself with family and friends.
<u>treaty</u>	A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.
unanimously	Without opposition; with the agreement of all people involved. <i>We voted unanimously</i> .
