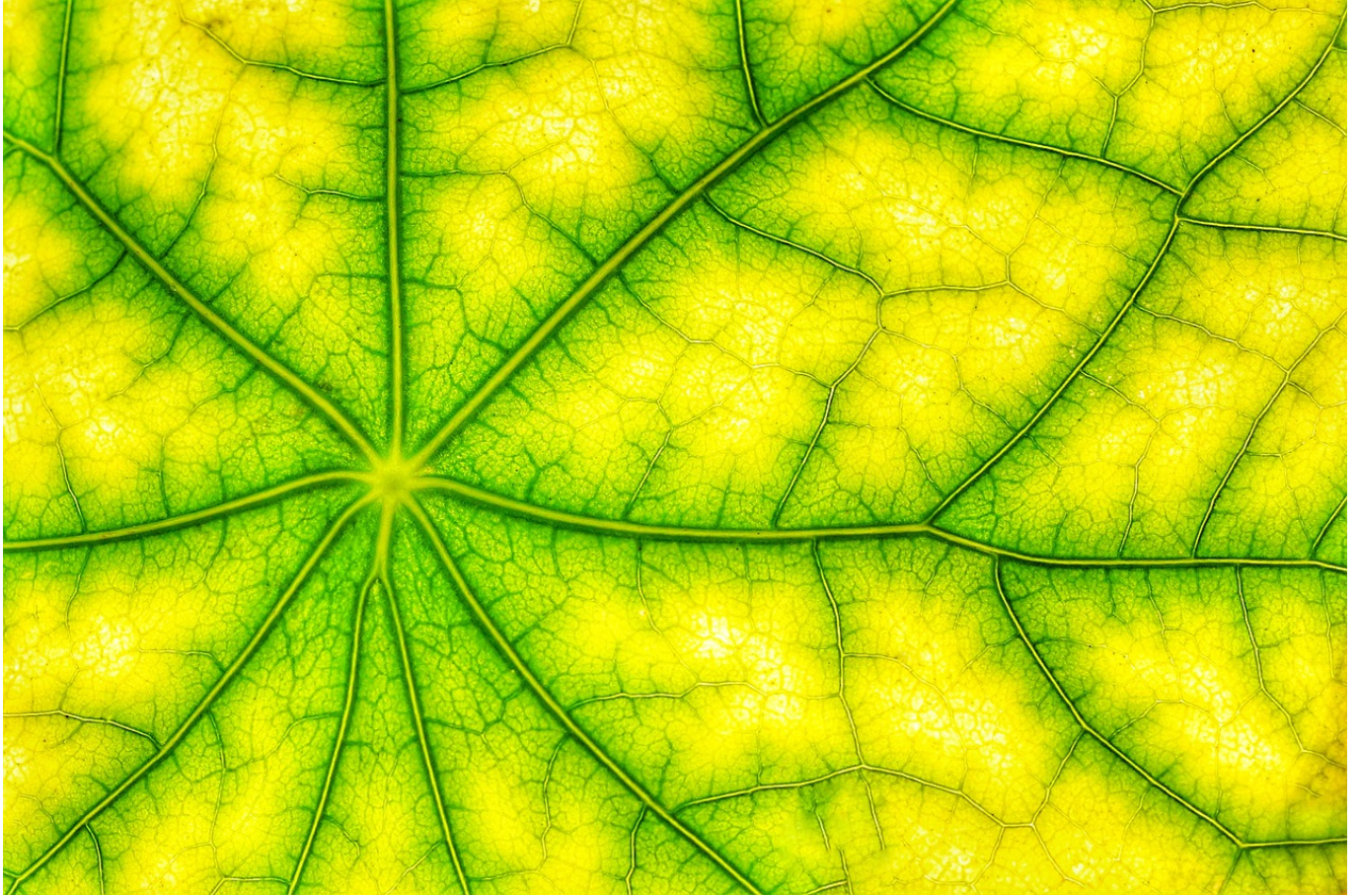

## **Assimilation as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Assimilation" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “assimilation” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A linguistic process by which a sound becomes similar to an adjacent sound.*
- *The fact of a sound being made more like another in the same or next word.*
- *The absorption and digestion of food or nutrients by the body or any biological system.*
- *In the theories of Jean Piaget: the application of a general schema to a particular instance.*
- *The process of absorbing nutrients into the body after digestion.*
- *The process of becoming similar to something.*
- *The absorption and integration of people, ideas, or culture into a wider society or culture.*
- *The state of being assimilated; people of different backgrounds come to see themselves as part of a larger national family.*
- *The process of assimilating new ideas into an existing cognitive structure.*
- *The social process of absorbing one cultural group into harmony with another.*
- *The process of taking in and fully understanding information or ideas.*



## Synonyms of "Assimilation" as a noun (2 Words)

**absorption** The process of absorbing nutrients into the body after digestion.  
*The country's **absorption** into the Ottoman Empire.*

**acculturation** The process of assimilating new ideas into an existing cognitive structure.  
*The process of **acculturation** may impact both social and psychological well being.*



## Usage Examples of "Assimilation" as a noun

- *The assimilation of Italians into American society.*
- *The assimilation of the knowledge of the Greeks.*
- *Watson was ready to work for the assimilation of Scots law to English law where he*

*thought it was justified.*

- When *p* is preceded by some Latin prefixes, it is doubled because of the assimilation of a consonant, as in 'apparent' (*ad-parent*).
- Nitrate assimilation usually takes place in leaves.
- There are many assimilations and elisions of consonants and vowels.



## Associations of "Assimilation" (30 Words)

<b>absorb</b>	Take up and reduce the effect or intensity of (sound or an impact). <i>She <b>absorbed</b> the information in silence.</i>
<b>absorption</b>	The process by which one thing absorbs or is absorbed by another. <i>The <b>absorption</b> of photons by atoms or molecules.</i>
<b>accord</b>	Harmony of people's opinions or actions or characters. <i>The powers <b>accorded</b> to the head of state.</i>
<b>agreed</b>	(of two or more parties) holding the same view or opinion on something. <i>All the republics are <b>agreed</b> on the necessity of a common defence policy.</i>
<b>agreement</b>	Compatibility of observations. <i><b>Agreement</b> between experimental observations and theory.</i>
<b>assimilate</b>	Take (gas, light or heat) into a solution. <i>This country <b>assimilates</b> immigrants very quickly.</i>
<b>awash</b>	Covered or flooded with water, especially seawater or rain. <i>The main deck was afloat or <b>awash</b>.</i>
<b>blacksmith</b>	A farrier.

<b>comprehend</b>	Get the meaning of something. <i>He couldn't <b>comprehend</b> her reasons for marrying Lovat.</i>
<b><u>compromise</u></b>	Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. <i>The nuclear secrets of the state were <b>compromised</b> by the spy.</i>
<b><u>concentration</u></b>	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>She was frowning in <b>concentration</b>.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange by concord or agreement. <i>A <b>concord</b> was to be drawn up.</i>
<b>concur</b>	Be of the same opinion; agree. <i>In tests cytogenetic determination has been found to <b>concur</b> with enzymatic determination.</i>
<b>consume</b>	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. <i>Carolyn was <b>consumed</b> with guilt.</i>
<b>denseness</b>	The spatial property of being crowded together.
<b>immerse</b>	Cause to be immersed. <i>She <b>immersed</b> herself in her work.</i>
<b><u>immersion</u></b>	Deep mental involvement in something. <i>As a teacher she advocates learning by <b>immersion</b>.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Include or contain; have as a component. <i>He has <b>incorporated</b> in his proposals a number of measures.</i>
<b><u>ingest</u></b>	Absorb (information). <i>They <b>ingest</b> oxygen from the air.</i>
<b>moisture</b>	Wetness caused by water. <i>The air was constantly heavy with <b>moisture</b>.</i>
<b><u>morbid</u></b>	Characterized by an abnormal and unhealthy interest in disturbing and unpleasant subjects, especially death and disease. <i>His <b>morbid</b> fascination with the horrors of contemporary warfare.</i>
<b><u>preoccupation</u></b>	An idea that preoccupies the mind and holds the attention. <i>Their main <b>preoccupation</b> was how to feed their families.</i>
<b>pull</b>	The force used in pulling. <i>She <b>pulled</b> a handkerchief out of her pocket.</i>
<b><u>saturate</u></b>	A saturated fat. <i>The air is <b>saturated</b> with the smells of food.</i>
<b><u>soak</u></b>	Washing something by allowing it to soak. <i>I <b>soaked</b> in the hot tub for an hour.</i>

<b><u>submerge</u></b>	Cover completely or make imperceptible. <i>Houses had been flooded and cars <b>submerged</b>.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	Sinking until covered completely with water. <i>Politicians may be blamed for <b>submergence</b> of principle.</i>
<b><u>surround</u></b>	Surround with a wall in order to fortify. <i>He loves to <b>surround</b> himself with family and friends.</i>
<b><u>treaty</u></b>	A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>unanimously</b>	Without opposition; with the agreement of all people involved. <i>We voted <b>unanimously</b>.</i>
