Definitions of "Assumed" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “assumed” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Adopted as a basis of reasoning; expected.*
- *Adopted in order to deceive.*
- *(of a manner or identity) taken on or adopted, sometimes falsely.*



Synonyms of "Assumed" as an adjective (17 Words)

<u>adopted</u>	Acquired as your own by free choice. <i>My adopted state.</i>
affected	Being excited or provoked to the expression of an emotion. <i>Affected areas.</i>
bogus	Fraudulent; having a misleading appearance. <i>A bogus insurance claim.</i>
counterfeit	Made in exact imitation of something valuable with the intention to deceive or defraud. <i>Counterfeit emotion.</i>
fake	Not genuine; imitation or counterfeit. <i>She got on the plane with a fake passport.</i>
faked	Not genuine or real; being an imitation of the genuine article.
false	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e g false oat. <i>Gave false testimony under oath.</i>
feigned	Not genuine. <i>Feigned sympathy.</i>
<u>fictitious</u>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>A fictitious address.</i>
fictive	Relating to the writing of fiction. <i>Fictive talent.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available; makeshift. <i>Crossed the river on improvised bridges.</i>
made-up	Having been paved.
make-believe	Imagined as in a play.
pretended	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>A pretended interest.</i>
pseudo	Not genuine; spurious or sham. <i>Pseudoclassic.</i>
<u>sham</u>	Bogus; false. <i>A clergyman who arranged a sham marriage.</i>
spurious	False or fake; not what it appears to be. <i>Separating authentic and spurious claims.</i>

affectation	Behaviour, speech, or writing that is pretentious and designed to impress. <i>The affectation of a man who measures every word for effect.</i>
approximation	An imprecise or incomplete account. <i>These figures are only approximations.</i>
<u>assume</u>	Make a pretence of. <i>I assume his train was late.</i>
<u>concoct</u>	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>She began to concoct a dinner likely to appeal to him.</i>
counterfeit	Pretended; sham. <i>Counterfeit works of art.</i>
estimate	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>An estimate of what it would cost.</i>

fake	Fraudulent; having a misleading appearance. <i>Rob faked suspicion a jealous concern.</i>

fancied	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A fancied wrong.</i>
feign	Pretend to be affected by (a feeling, state, or injury). <i>He feigned that he was ill.</i>
fictitious	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Reports of a deal were dismissed as fictitious by the Minister.</i>
figment	A thing that someone believes to be real but that exists only in their imagination. <i>It really was Ross and not a figment of her overheated imagination.</i>
guess	Form a correct conclusion about something by guessing. <i>She guessed the child s age at 14 or 15.</i>
imitative	(of a word) reproducing a natural sound (e.g. fizz) or pronounced in a way that is thought to correspond to the appearance or character of the object or action described (e.g. blob). <i>Man is an imitative being.</i>
impersonate	Represent another person with comic intentions. <i>She impersonates Madonna.</i>
inauthentic	Intended to deceive. <i>Baroque harpsichord pieces played on the decidedly inauthentic modern Steinway.</i>
inductive	Possessing inductance. <i>Instinct rather than inductive reasoning marked her approach to life.</i>
persona	Jungian psychology a personal facade that one presents to the world. <i>Bowie burned through one persona after another.</i>
presume	Take upon oneself; act presumptuously, without permission. <i>A restaurant bill presumes the consumption of food.</i>
pretend	Represent fictitiously as in a play or pretend to be or act like. <i>I closed my eyes and pretended I was asleep.</i>
pretended	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Eating ice cream with pretended unconcern.</i>
pseudo	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>We are talking about real journalists and not the pseudo kind.</i>
putative	Generally considered or reputed to be. <i>The putative author of the book.</i>
realistically	In a realistic manner. <i>Realistically at his age opportunities are few and far between.</i>

<u>sham</u>	Bogus; false. <i>He shammed a headache.</i>
simulate	Imitate the appearance or character of. <i>Red ochre intended to simulate blood.</i>
spurious	Not being what it purports to be; false or fake. <i>A spurious argument.</i>
<u>suppose</u>	Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand. <i>I presuppose that you have done your work.</i>
<u>supposed</u>	Doubtful or suspect. <i>People admire their supposed industriousness.</i>
