<b><u>adopted</u></b>	Acquired as your own by free choice. <i>My <b>adopted</b> state.</i>
<b>affected</b>	Being excited or provoked to the expression of an emotion. <i><b>Affected</b> areas.</i>
<b>bogus</b>	Fraudulent; having a misleading appearance. <i>A <b>bogus</b> insurance claim.</i>
<b>counterfeit</b>	Made in exact imitation of something valuable with the intention to deceive or defraud. <i><b>Counterfeit</b> emotion.</i>
<b>fake</b>	Not genuine; imitation or counterfeit. <i>She got on the plane with a <b>fake</b> passport.</i>
<b>faked</b>	Not genuine or real; being an imitation of the genuine article.
<b>false</b>	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e g false oat. <i>Gave <b>false</b> testimony under oath.</i>
<b>feigned</b>	Not genuine. <i><b>Feigned</b> sympathy.</i>
<b><u>fictitious</u></b>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>A <b>fictitious</b> address.</i>
<b>fictive</b>	Relating to the writing of fiction. <i><b>Fictive</b> talent.</i>
<b>improvised</b>	Done or made using whatever is available; makeshift. <i>Crossed the river on <b>improvised</b> bridges.</i>
<b>made-up</b>	Having been paved.
<b>make-believe</b>	Imagined as in a play.
<b>pretended</b>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>A <b>pretended</b> interest.</i>
<b>pseudo</b>	Not genuine; spurious or sham. <i><b>Pseudoclassic</b>.</i>
<b><u>sham</u></b>	Bogus; false. <i>A clergyman who arranged a <b>sham</b> marriage.</i>
<b>spurious</b>	False or fake; not what it appears to be. <i>Separating authentic and <b>spurious</b> claims.</i>

<b>affectation</b>	Behaviour, speech, or writing that is pretentious and designed to impress. <i>The <b>affectation</b> of a man who measures every word for effect.</i>
<b>approximation</b>	An imprecise or incomplete account. <i>These figures are only <b>approximations</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">assume</a></u>	Make a pretence of. <i>I <b>assume</b> his train was late.</i>
<u><a href="#">concoct</a></u>	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>She began to <b>concoct</b> a dinner likely to appeal to him.</i>
<b>counterfeit</b>	Pretended; sham. <i><b>Counterfeit</b> works of art.</i>
<b>estimate</b>	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>An <b>estimate</b> of what it would cost.</i>
<u><a href="#">expect</a></u>	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>The meteorologists are <b>expecting</b> rain for tomorrow.</i>
<b>fake</b>	Fraudulent; having a misleading appearance. <i>Rob <b>faked</b> suspicion a jealous concern.</i>

<b>fancied</b>	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A <b>fancied</b> wrong.</i>
<b>feign</b>	Pretend to be affected by (a feeling, state, or injury). <i>He <b>feigned</b> that he was ill.</i>
<b><u>fictitious</u></b>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Reports of a deal were dismissed as <b>fictitious</b> by the Minister.</i>
<b>figment</b>	A thing that someone believes to be real but that exists only in their imagination. <i>It really was Ross and not a <b>figment</b> of her overheated imagination.</i>
<b>guess</b>	Form a correct conclusion about something by guessing. <i>She <b>guessed</b> the child's age at 14 or 15.</i>
<b>imitative</b>	(of a word) reproducing a natural sound (e.g. fizz) or pronounced in a way that is thought to correspond to the appearance or character of the object or action described (e.g. blob). <i>Man is an <b>imitative</b> being.</i>
<b>impersonate</b>	Represent another person with comic intentions. <i>She <b>impersonates</b> Madonna.</i>
<b>inauthentic</b>	Intended to deceive. <i>Baroque harpsichord pieces played on the decidedly <b>inauthentic</b> modern Steinway.</i>
<b>inductive</b>	Possessing inductance. <i>Instinct rather than <b>inductive</b> reasoning marked her approach to life.</i>
<b><u>persona</u></b>	Jungian psychology a personal facade that one presents to the world. <i>Bowie burned through one <b>persona</b> after another.</i>
<b><u>presume</u></b>	Take upon oneself; act presumptuously, without permission. <i>A restaurant bill <b>presumes</b> the consumption of food.</i>
<b><u>pretend</u></b>	Represent fictitiously as in a play or pretend to be or act like. <i>I closed my eyes and <b>pretended</b> I was asleep.</i>
<b>pretended</b>	Adopted in order to deceive. <i>Eating ice cream with <b>pretended</b> unconcern.</i>
<b>pseudo</b>	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. <i>We are talking about real journalists and not the <b>pseudo</b> kind.</i>
<b>putative</b>	Generally considered or reputed to be. <i>The <b>putative</b> author of the book.</i>
<b><u>realistically</u></b>	In a realistic manner. <i><b>Realistically</b> at his age opportunities are few and far between.</i>

sham

Bogus; false.  
*He **shammed** a headache.*

**simulate**

Imitate the appearance or character of.  
*Red ochre intended to **simulate** blood.*

**spurious**

Not being what it purports to be; false or fake.  
*A **spurious** argument.*

suppose

Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand.  
*I **presuppose** that you have done your work.*

supposed

Doubtful or suspect.  
*People admire their **supposed** industriousness.*
