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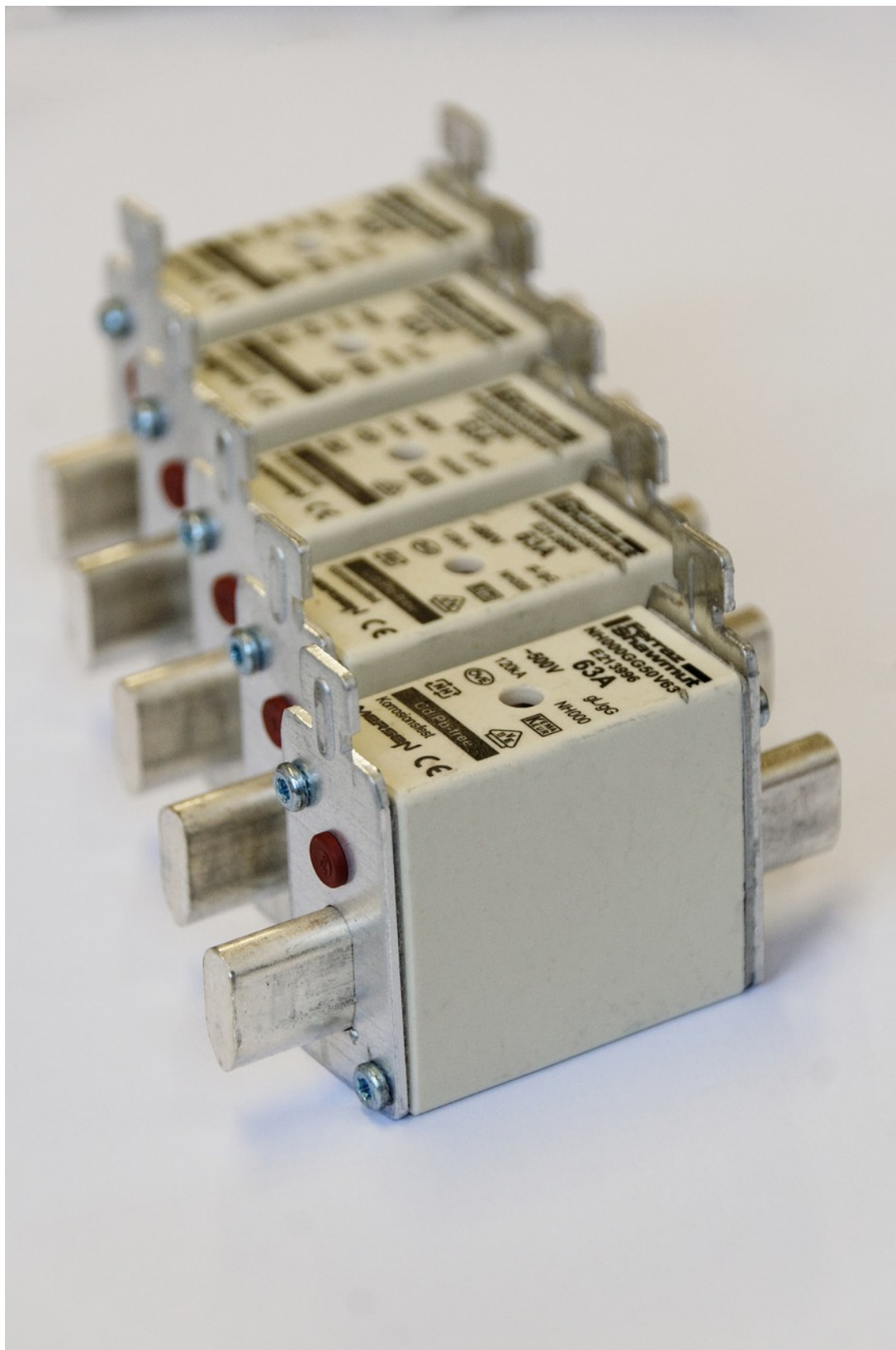

Definitions of "Assure" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “assure” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Inform positively and with certainty and confidence.*
- *Make (something) certain to happen.*
- *Cause to feel sure; give reassurance to.*
- *Make a promise or commitment.*
- *Secure the future payment of (an amount) with insurance.*
- *Be careful or certain to do something; make certain of something.*
- *Tell someone something positively to dispel any doubts.*
- *Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence.*
- *Be certain to get.*
- *Cover (a life) by assurance.*
- *Make sure of something.*
- *Make certain of.*



Synonyms of "Assure" as a verb (21 Words)

ascertain	Establish after a calculation, investigation, experiment, survey, or study. <i>An attempt to ascertain the cause of the accident.</i>
check	Put a check mark on or near or next to. <i>Please check each name on the list.</i>
control	Control others or oneself or influence skillfully usually to one's advantage. <i>No attempt was made to control for variations.</i>
convince	Cause (someone) to believe firmly in the truth of something. <i>He had finally convinced several customers of the advantages of his product.</i>
cover	Provide with a covering or cause to be covered. <i>The female covers the eggs.</i>
ensure	Make certain of obtaining or providing (something). <i>Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client ensure against being misled.</i>
guarantee	Provide a guarantee for. <i>Preparation will guarantee success.</i>
indemnify	Secure (someone) against legal liability for their actions. <i>The company has taken out insurance to indemnify its directors against liability when acting for the group.</i>
insure	Secure or protect someone against (a possible contingency). <i>Your new sum insured is shown on your renewal notice.</i>
make certain	Reach a goal, e.g.
make sure	Appear to begin an activity.
persuade	Cause somebody to adopt a certain position, belief, or course of action; twist somebody's arm. <i>Health boards were finally persuaded of the desirability of psychiatric units.</i>
promise	Make a promise or commitment. <i>Forthcoming concerts promise a feast of music.</i>
provide insurance for	Determine (what is to happen in certain contingencies), especially by including a proviso condition or stipulation.
reassure	Cause to feel sure; give reassurance to. <i>Joachim reassured him that he was needed.</i>

satisfy	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>The whole team is working flat out to satisfy demand.</i>
secure	Compress (a blood vessel) to prevent bleeding. <i>The government is concerned to secure the economy against too much foreign ownership.</i>
see	Go to see for professional or business reasons. <i>I want to see whether she speaks French.</i>
see to it	Perceive by sight or have the power to perceive by sight.
tell	Give evidence. <i>He was telling on all his former colleague.</i>
warrant	Stand behind and guarantee the quality, accuracy, or condition of. <i>The dealer warrants all the cars he sells.</i>

- *The sum assured can be paid as a lump sum.*
- *The airline tried to reassure the customers that the planes were safe.*
- *She assured herself that he was asleep.*

- *Tony assured me that there was a supermarket in the village.*
- *I assured him that traveling to Cambodia was safe.*
- *You would be assured of a welcome.*
- *'I quite understand,' Mrs Lewis assured her.*

To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true.

*It is a rich and challenging motion picture that both **affirms** life and emphasizes its fragility.*

<u>assert</u>	Assert to be true. <i>It was time to assert himself.</i>
assurance	A statement intended to inspire confidence. <i>An assurance of help when needed.</i>
<u>aver</u>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>I don't have to do anything if his problem he averred.</i>
avow	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>He avowed that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
<u>certain</u>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable Benjamin Franklin. <i>It's certain that more changes are in the offing.</i>
<u>clarify</u>	Make clear by removing impurities or solids, as by heating. <i>Clarify the butter by using a spoon to skim off the foam.</i>
confident	Having or marked by confidence or assurance. <i>A confident reply.</i>
confidently	In a self-assured way that expresses faith in oneself or one's abilities or qualities. <i>He confidently predicts a change of fortune.</i>
<u>convince</u>	Make (someone) agree, understand, or realize the truth or validity of something. <i>He had finally convinced several customers of the advantages of his product.</i>
<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>He declared last April.</i>
encourage	Persuade (someone) to do or continue to do something by giving support and advice. <i>The intention is to encourage new writing talent.</i>
ensure	Make certain of. <i>Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client ensure against being misled.</i>
exaction	Act of demanding or levying by force or authority. <i>He supervised the exaction of tolls at various ports.</i>
foolproof	Proof against human misuse or error. <i>A foolproof security system.</i>
grandiloquence	High-flown style; excessive use of verbal ornamentation.
guarantee	Stand behind and guarantee the quality accuracy or condition of. <i>Preparation will guarantee success.</i>

<u>induce</u>	Bring about or give rise to. <i>From the experimental evidence one infers or induces the hypothesis.</i>
magniloquent	Using high-flown or bombastic language.
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He was muttering foul oaths.</i>
persuadable	Being susceptible to persuasion. <i>They need to identify the most persuadable voters.</i>
persuade	(of a situation or event) provide a sound reason for (someone) to do something. <i>The cost of the manor's restoration persuaded them to take in guests.</i>
<u>pledge</u>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>They pledged to continue the campaign for funding.</i>
promise	Promise to undertake or give. <i>I've been promised to him for years.</i>
<u>purport</u>	The purpose or intention of something. <i>The purport of existence.</i>
<u>reassure</u>	Cause to feel sure; give reassurance to. <i>The airline tried to reassure the customers that the planes were safe.</i>
<u>rhetoric</u>	Language designed to have a persuasive or impressive effect, but which is often regarded as lacking in sincerity or meaningful content. <i>Mere rhetoric.</i>
<u>shout</u>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>He was shouted down as he tried to explain the decision.</i>
<u>sure</u>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>It's going to be a good day for sure.</i>
<u>vouch</u>	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>He was refused entrance until someone could vouch for him.</i>
