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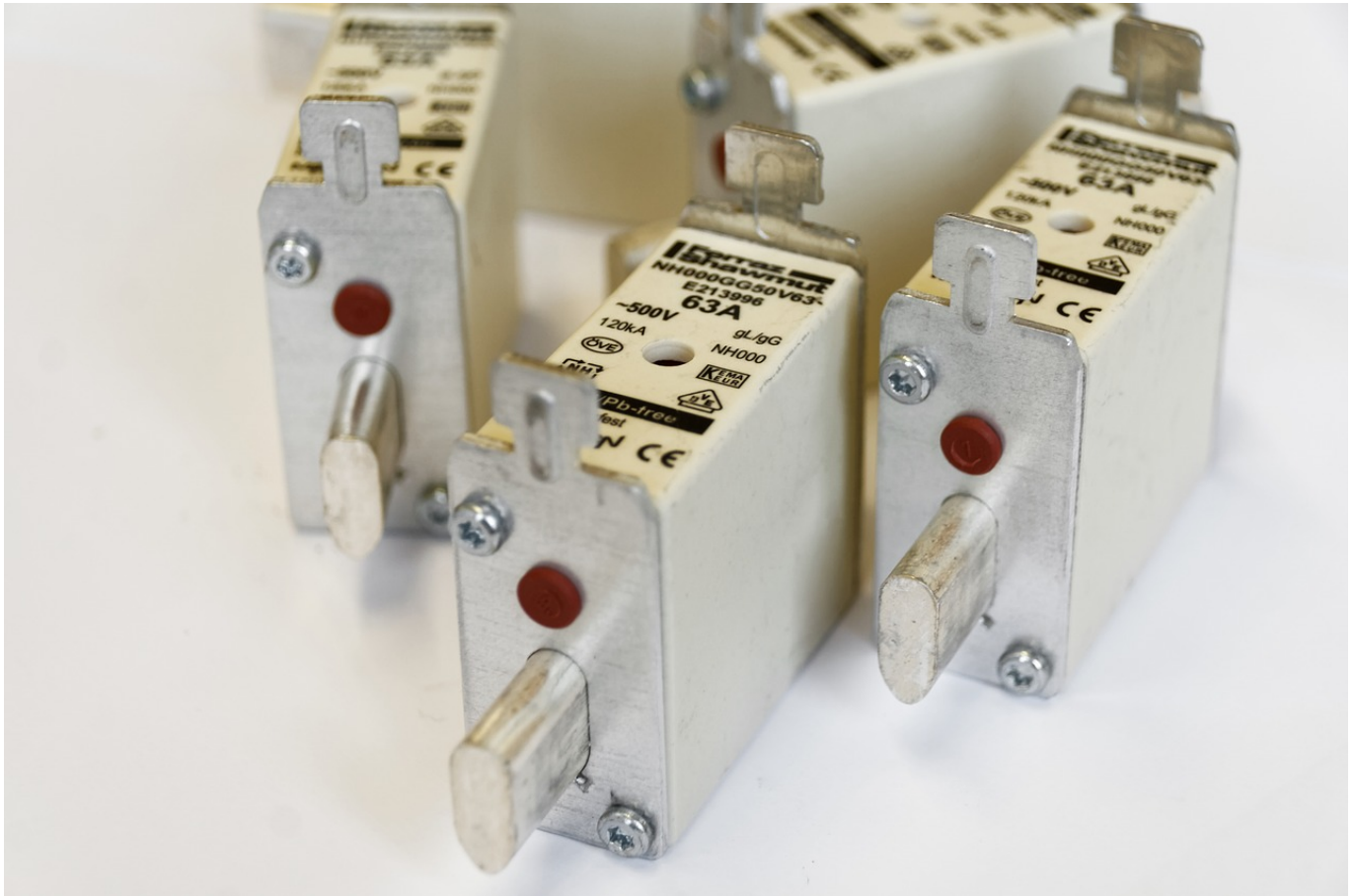

## Assures as a Verb

### Definitions of "Assures" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “assures” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Inform positively and with certainty and confidence.*
- *Make certain of.*
- *Be careful or certain to do something; make certain of something.*
- *Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence.*
- *Cause to feel sure; give reassurance to.*
- *Make a promise or commitment.*



## Synonyms of "Assures" as a verb (12 Words)

- ascertain** Learn or discover with certainty.  
*Management should **ascertain** whether adequate funding can be provided.*
- check** Write out a check on a bank account.  
***Check** the time of the class.*
- control** Control others or oneself or influence skillfully usually to one's advantage.  
*No attempt was made to **control** for variations.*
- ensure** Make certain that (something) will occur or be the case.  
*Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client **ensure** against being misled.*
- guarantee** Stand behind and guarantee the quality, accuracy, or condition of.  
*The company **guarantees** to refund your money.*

<b>insure</b>	Arrange for compensation in the event of damage to or loss of (property), or injury to or the death of (someone), in exchange for regular payments to a company or to the state. <i>Subsidiaries set up to <b>insure</b> the risks of a group of companies.</i>
<b>promise</b>	Make a promise or commitment. <i>He <b>promised</b> to forward my mail.</i>
<u>reassure</u>	Give or restore confidence in; cause to feel sure or certain. <i>I <b>reassured</b> him that we were safe.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Protect against threats; make safe. <i>A loan <b>secured</b> on your home.</i>
<u>see</u>	Go to see for a social visit. <i>It has to be the answer don t you <b>see</b>.</i>
<b>see to it</b>	See and understand, have a good eye.
<b>tell</b>	Perceive (the difference between one person or thing and another). <i>I couldn t <b>tell</b> if he believed me.</i>





## **Usage Examples of "Assures" as a verb**

- *The airline tried to reassure the customers that the planes were safe.*
- *I assured him that traveling to Cambodia was safe.*





## Associations of "Assures" (30 Words)

<b><u>affirm</u></b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>The referendum <b>affirmed</b> the republic's right to secede.</i>
<b><u>assert</u></b>	Postulate positively and assertively. <i>He <b>asserted</b> his innocence.</i>
<b>assurance</b>	A British term for some kinds of insurance. <i>He gave an <b>assurance</b> that work would begin on Monday.</i>
<b><u>aver</u></b>	Allege as a fact in support of a plea. <i>The defendant does not <b>aver</b> any performance by himself.</i>
<b>avow</b>	Assert or confess openly. <i>He <b>avowed</b> that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
<b><u>certain</u></b>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable. <i>In this life nothing is <b>certain</b> but death and taxes.</i>
<b><u>clarify</u></b>	Make clear and (more) comprehensible. <i><b>Clarify</b> the butter.</i>
<b>confident</b>	Not liable to error in judgment or action- Walter Lippman- Michiko Kakutani. <i><b>Confident</b> of fulfillment.</i>
<b>confidently</b>	In a self-assured way that expresses faith in oneself or one's abilities or qualities. <i>He <b>confidently</b> predicts a change of fortune.</i>
<b><u>convince</u></b>	Cause (someone) to believe firmly in the truth of something. <i>We had to <b>convince</b> politicians that they needed to do something.</i>
<b><u>declare</u></b>	Declare to be. <i>If you have something to <b>declare</b> customs officers will tell you the duty payable.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Give support, confidence, or hope to (someone). <i>Pupils are <b>encouraged</b> to be creative.</i>
<b>ensure</b>	Make sure that (a problem) does not occur. <i>The client must <b>ensure</b> that accurate records are kept.</i>
<b>exaction</b>	Act of demanding or levying by force or authority. <i><b>Exaction</b> of various dues and fees.</i>
<b>foolproof</b>	Proof against human misuse or error. <i>A <b>foolproof</b> security system.</i>
<b>grandiloquence</b>	High-flown style; excessive use of verbal ornamentation.

<b>guarantee</b>	Stand behind and guarantee the quality accuracy or condition of. <i>There is no <b>guarantee</b> that they are not lying.</i>
<b>induce</b>	Produce (an electric charge or current or a magnetic state) by induction. <i>The current in the primary winding is <b>induced</b> by the rotating magnet.</i>
<b>magniloquent</b>	Lofty in style.
<b>oath</b>	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>Each took the <b>oath</b> and then gave evidence.</i>
<b>persuadable</b>	Being susceptible to persuasion. <i>They need to identify the most <b>persuadable</b> voters.</i>
<b>persuade</b>	Induce (someone) to do something through reasoning or argument. <i>He did everything he could to <b>persuade</b> the police that he was the robber.</i>
<b>pledge</b>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>Appeals for emergency relief met with <b>pledges</b> totalling 250 000 000.</i>
<b>promise</b>	Promise to undertake or give. <i>We re <b>promised</b> more winter weather tonight.</i>
<b>purport</b>	The intended meaning of a communication. <i>The <b>purport</b> of existence.</i>
<b>reassure</b>	Give or restore confidence in; cause to feel sure or certain. <i>The airline tried to <b>reassure</b> the customers that the planes were safe.</i>
<b>rhetoric</b>	Loud and confused and empty talk. <i>All we have from the Opposition is empty <b>rhetoric</b>.</i>
<b>shout</b>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>My grandmother is hard of hearing you ll have to <b>shout</b>.</i>
<b>sure</b>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i><b>Sure</b> of her friends.</i>
<b>vouch</b>	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>He <b>vouched</b> his words by his deeds.</i>
