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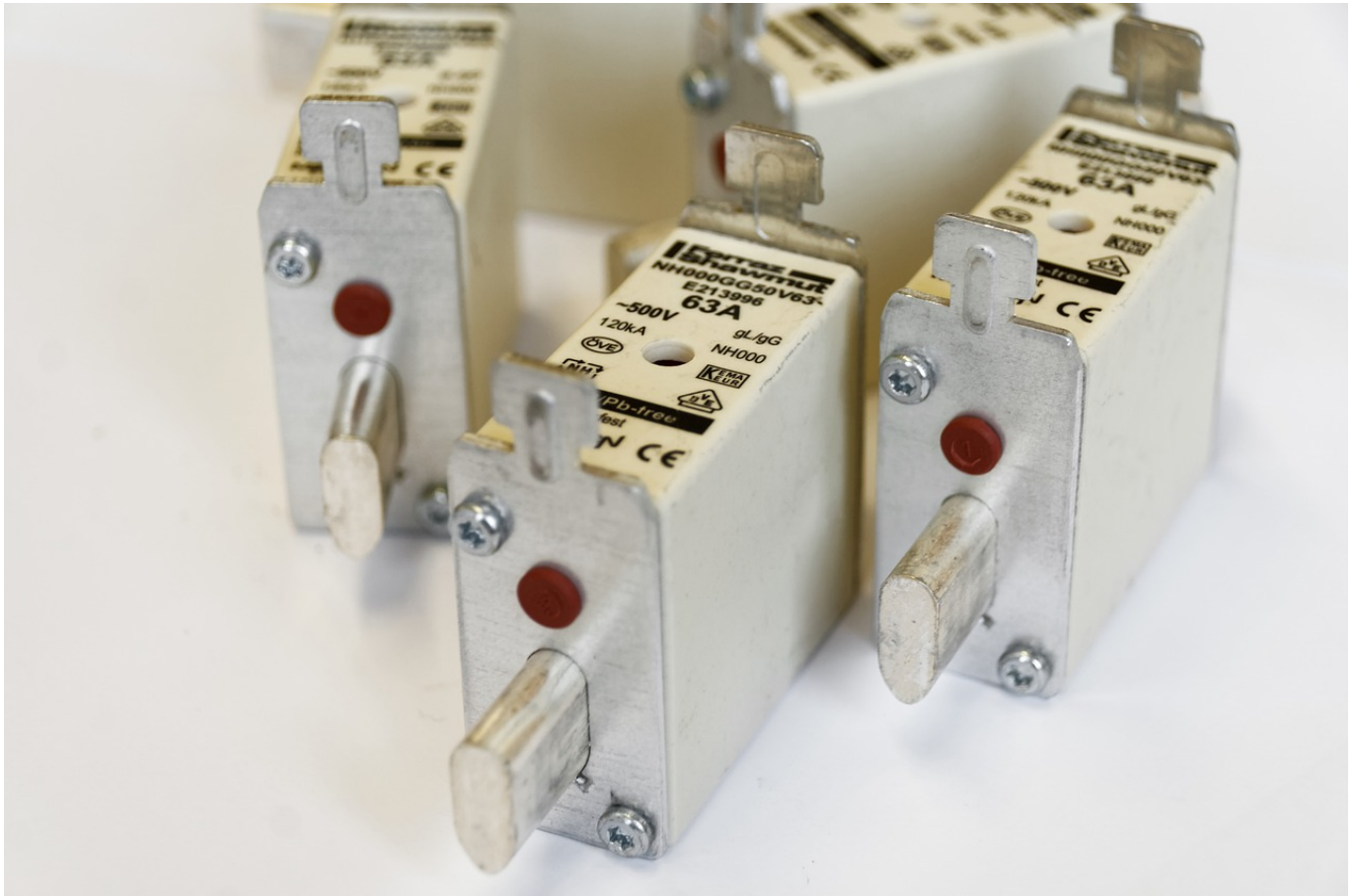
The synonyms of “Assures” are: reassure, ascertain, check, control, ensure, insure, see, see to it, promise, guarantee, secure, tell

Assures as a Verb

Definitions of "Assures" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “assures” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Inform positively and with certainty and confidence.*
- *Make certain of.*
- *Be careful or certain to do something; make certain of something.*
- *Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence.*
- *Cause to feel sure; give reassurance to.*
- *Make a promise or commitment.*



Synonyms of "Assures" as a verb (12 Words)

- ascertain** Learn or discover with certainty.
*Management should **ascertain** whether adequate funding can be provided.*
- check** Write out a check on a bank account.
***Check** the time of the class.*
- control** Control others or oneself or influence skillfully usually to one's advantage.
*No attempt was made to **control** for variations.*
- ensure** Make certain that (something) will occur or be the case.
*Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client **ensure** against being misled.*
- guarantee** Stand behind and guarantee the quality, accuracy, or condition of.
*The company **guarantees** to refund your money.*

insure	Arrange for compensation in the event of damage to or loss of (property), or injury to or the death of (someone), in exchange for regular payments to a company or to the state. <i>Subsidiaries set up to insure the risks of a group of companies.</i>
promise	Make a promise or commitment. <i>He promised to forward my mail.</i>
<u>reassure</u>	Give or restore confidence in; cause to feel sure or certain. <i>I reassured him that we were safe.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Protect against threats; make safe. <i>A loan secured on your home.</i>
<u>see</u>	Go to see for a social visit. <i>It has to be the answer don t you see.</i>
see to it	See and understand, have a good eye.
tell	Perceive (the difference between one person or thing and another). <i>I couldn t tell if he believed me.</i>



Usage Examples of "Assures" as a verb

- *The airline tried to reassure the customers that the planes were safe.*
- *I assured him that traveling to Cambodia was safe.*



Associations of "Assures" (30 Words)

<u>affirm</u>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>The referendum affirmed the republic's right to secede.</i>
<u>assert</u>	Postulate positively and assertively. <i>He asserted his innocence.</i>
assurance	A British term for some kinds of insurance. <i>He gave an assurance that work would begin on Monday.</i>
<u>aver</u>	Allege as a fact in support of a plea. <i>The defendant does not aver any performance by himself.</i>
avow	Assert or confess openly. <i>He avowed that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
<u>certain</u>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable. <i>In this life nothing is certain but death and taxes.</i>
<u>clarify</u>	Make clear and (more) comprehensible. <i>Clarify the butter.</i>
confident	Not liable to error in judgment or action- Walter Lippman- Michiko Kakutani. <i>Confident of fulfillment.</i>
confidently	In a self-assured way that expresses faith in oneself or one's abilities or qualities. <i>He confidently predicts a change of fortune.</i>
<u>convince</u>	Cause (someone) to believe firmly in the truth of something. <i>We had to convince politicians that they needed to do something.</i>
<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>If you have something to declare customs officers will tell you the duty payable.</i>
encourage	Give support, confidence, or hope to (someone). <i>Pupils are encouraged to be creative.</i>
ensure	Make sure that (a problem) does not occur. <i>The client must ensure that accurate records are kept.</i>
exaction	Act of demanding or levying by force or authority. <i>Exaction of various dues and fees.</i>
foolproof	Proof against human misuse or error. <i>A foolproof security system.</i>
grandiloquence	High-flown style; excessive use of verbal ornamentation.

guarantee	Stand behind and guarantee the quality accuracy or condition of. <i>There is no guarantee that they are not lying.</i>
induce	Produce (an electric charge or current or a magnetic state) by induction. <i>The current in the primary winding is induced by the rotating magnet.</i>
magniloquent	Lofty in style.
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>Each took the oath and then gave evidence.</i>
persuadable	Being susceptible to persuasion. <i>They need to identify the most persuadable voters.</i>
persuade	Induce (someone) to do something through reasoning or argument. <i>He did everything he could to persuade the police that he was the robber.</i>
pledge	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>Appeals for emergency relief met with pledges totalling 250 000 000.</i>
promise	Promise to undertake or give. <i>We re promised more winter weather tonight.</i>
purport	The intended meaning of a communication. <i>The purport of existence.</i>
reassure	Give or restore confidence in; cause to feel sure or certain. <i>The airline tried to reassure the customers that the planes were safe.</i>
rhetoric	Loud and confused and empty talk. <i>All we have from the Opposition is empty rhetoric.</i>
shout	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>My grandmother is hard of hearing you ll have to shout.</i>
sure	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>Sure of her friends.</i>
vouch	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>He vouched his words by his deeds.</i>
