**apart** Not taken into account or excluded from consideration.  
*Had a feeling of being set **apart**.*

**in two** To or toward the inside of.

**up** Upstairs.  
*The sun was already **up** when they set off.*

- *Torn asunder.*

## Associations of "Asunder" (30 Words)

<b>apart</b>	So as to be shattered; into pieces. <i>Joking <b>apart</b> they do a really remarkable job.</i>
<b>away</b>	Out of the way especially away from one's thoughts. <i>Wanted to get <b>away</b> from there.</i>
<b>cloven</b>	Split, divided.
<b>diffuse</b>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The problem is how to <b>diffuse</b> power without creating anarchy.</i>
<b>diffusion</b>	(physics) the process in which there is movement of a substance from an area of high concentration of that substance to an area of lower concentration. <i>The rapid <b>diffusion</b> of ideas and technology.</i>
<b>dispel</b>	Make (a doubt, feeling, or belief) disappear. <i>The brightness of the day did nothing to <b>dispel</b> Elaine's dejection.</i>
<b>dispersal</b>	The splitting up and selling off of a collection of artefacts or books. <i>Colleges had made large <b>dispersals</b> and the shops were filled with books.</i>
<b>disperse</b>	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>Winds <b>dispersed</b> the radioactive cloud high in the atmosphere.</i>
<b>dispersion</b>	The extent to which values of a variable differ from a fixed value such as the mean. <i>The study looks at the <b>dispersion</b> of earnings with OECD member countries.</i>
<b>disseminate</b>	Cause to become widely known. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can <b>disseminate</b> and migrate.</i>
<b>dissemination</b>	The act of dispersing or diffusing something. <i>The <b>dissemination</b> of public information.</i>
<b>dissipate</b>	(with reference to a feeling or emotion) disappear or cause to disappear. <i>The concern she'd felt for him had wholly <b>dissipated</b>.</i>
<b>dissolution</b>	Dissolute indulgence in sensual pleasure. <i>The Prime Minister asked the queen for a <b>dissolution</b> of Parliament.</i>
<b>distract</b>	Divert (attention) from something. <i>It was another attempt to <b>distract</b> attention from the truth.</i>
<b>distribute</b>	Be distributed or spread as in statistical analyses. <i>The journal is <b>distributed</b> worldwide.</i>

<b>diversify</b>	Vary in order to spread risk or to expand. <i><b>Diversify</b> a course of study.</i>
<b>division</b>	A group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The new clause was agreed without a <b>division</b>.</i>
<b>effluence</b>	A substance that flows out from something.
<b>intersperse</b>	Place at intervals in or among. <i>The debate was <b>interspersed</b> with angry exchanges.</i>
<b>partition</b>	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>An agreement was reached to <b>partition</b> the country.</i>
<b>scatter</b>	The scattering of light other electromagnetic radiation or particles. <i>A <b>scatter</b> of boulders round the pothole mouth.</i>
<b>scattered</b>	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>A <b>scattered</b> clifftop community.</i>
<b>separate</b>	Become separated into pieces or fragments. <i>A bathroom and <b>separate</b> toilet.</i>
<b>separated</b>	Separated at the joint. <i>His parents are <b>separated</b>.</i>
<b>separation</b>	The cessation of cohabitation of man and wife (either by mutual agreement or under a court order). <i>The damage that might arise from the <b>separation</b> of parents and children.</i>
<b>split</b>	A thing that is divided or split. <i>Once again the family was <b>split</b> up.</i>
<b>spray</b>	A pesticide in suspension or solution intended for spraying. <i>Water <b>sprayed</b> into the air.</i>
<b>spread</b>	Cover by spreading something over. <i>A table <b>spread</b> with food.</i>
<b>sprinkle</b>	A light rain. <i>He <b>sprinkled</b> his conversation with quotations.</i>
<b>strew</b>	Cover (a surface or area) with untidily scattered things. <i>A small room with newspapers <b>strewn</b> all over the floor.</i>
