Associations of "At a loss for words" (30 Words)

alphabet	A character set that includes letters and is used to write a language. <i>A phonetic alphabet.</i>
antonym	A word that expresses a meaning opposed to the meaning of another word in which case the two words are antonyms of each other. <i>To him the antonym of gay was depressed.</i>
<u>bilingual</u>	Using or knowing two languages. <i>Bilingual education.</i>
collocation	A grouping of words in a sentence. <i>Strong tea and heavy drinker are typical English collocations.</i>
derivation	The formation of a word from another word or from a root in the same or another language. <i>He prefers shoes of Italian derivation.</i>
<u>derivative</u>	A word derived from another or from a root in the same or another language. <i>Electricity is a derivative of electric.</i>
dictionary	A reference book on a particular subject, the items of which are typically arranged in alphabetical order. <i>The dictionary definition of smile.</i>
diphthong	A digraph representing the sound of a diphthong or single vowel as in feat.
etymology	The study of the sources and development of words. <i>The etymology of the word devil.</i>
grammar	A book on grammar. <i>My old Latin grammar.</i>
grammarian	A person who studies and writes about grammar.
homonym	Two words are homonyms if they are pronounced and spelled the same way but have different meanings.

interpreter	Someone who mediates between speakers of different languages. <i>She was famous as an interpreter of Shakespearean roles.</i>
language	Language communication by word of mouth. <i>The language introduced is standard throughout the text.</i>
lexicographer	A person who compiles dictionaries. The act of writing dictionaries.
lexicography	<i>Webster's name had become famous before he embarked on his career in lexicography.</i>
lexicon	A dictionary, especially of Greek, Hebrew, Syriac, or Arabic. <i>A Greek Latin lexicon.</i>
multilingual	Using or knowing more than one language. <i>A multilingual translator.</i>
orthography	The study of spelling and how letters combine to represent sounds and form words. <i>A spoken language which has as yet no sanctioned orthography.</i>
philologist	A humanist specializing in classical scholarship.
pronunciation	The way in which a word is pronounced. <i>The pronunciation of Chinese is difficult for foreigners.</i>
sentence	Pronounce a sentence on somebody in a court of law. <i>He always spoke in grammatical sentences.</i>
spelling	The process or activity of writing or naming the letters of a word. <i>The spelling of his name was influenced by French.</i>
syntax	A set of rules for or an analysis of the syntax of a language. <i>The syntax of English.</i>
term	Give a descriptive name to call by a specified term. <i>He left school before the end of term.</i>
translation	The process by which a sequence of nucleotide triplets in a messenger RNA molecule gives rise to a specific sequence of amino acids during synthesis of a polypeptide or protein. <i>The translation of research findings into clinical practice.</i>
translator	A television relay transmitter. <i>The translator of Hardy's poems into Icelandic.</i>
verb	Use a word that is not conventionally used as a verb typically a noun as a verb. <i>Any English noun can be verbed but some are more resistant than others.</i>
vocabulary	A range of artistic or stylistic forms, techniques, or movements. <i>The vocabulary of law.</i>

vowel

A letter representing a vowel sound such as a e i o u.
