## Associations of "At all costs" (30 Words)

<b>absolutely</b>	Used to emphasize a strong or exaggerated statement. <i>An <b>absolutely</b> magnificent painting.</i>
<b>altogether</b>	With everything included or counted. <i><b>Altogether</b> I m sorry it happened.</i>
<b>always</b>	Without interruption. <i>He <b>always</b> arrives on time.</i>
<b>anyhow</b>	In a careless or haphazard way. <i>They came <b>anyhow</b> they could.</i>
<b>collectively</b>	In conjunction with; combined. <i>The audience <b>collectively</b> winced.</i>
<b>complete</b>	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>His range of skills made him the <b>complete</b> footballer.</i>
<b>completely</b>	Totally; utterly. <i>Was <b>completely</b> at fault.</i>
<b>entire</b>	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. <i>An <b>entire</b> horse.</i>
<b>entirely</b>	Solely. <i>The traffic seemed to consist <b>entirely</b> of black cabs.</i>
<b>entirety</b>	The whole of something. <i>She would have to stay in her room for the <b>entirety</b> of the weekend.</i>
<b>every</b>	Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i><b>Every</b> party is welcome.</i>
<b>everywhere</b>	To or in any or all places. <i><b>Everywhere</b> she went she was feted.</i>
<b>fully</b>	Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>They were <b>fully</b> or amply fed.</i>

<b>gamut</b>	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>The whole <b>gamut</b> of human emotion.</i>
<b>generic</b>	Characteristic of or relating to a class or group of things; not specific. <i>The <b>generic</b> name.</i>
<b>incessantly</b>	Without interruption; constantly. <i>She talked about him <b>incessantly</b>.</i>
<b>inclusive</b>	(of language) deliberately avoiding usages that could be seen as excluding a particular social group, for example avoiding the use of masculine pronouns to cover both men and women. <i>This is a testament to the <b>inclusive</b> environment fostered at our school.</i>
<b><u>lifelong</u></b>	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>The two men were to remain <b>lifelong</b> friends.</i>
<b><u>outright</u></b>	Directly or openly. <i>The impact killed four horses <b>outright</b>.</i>
<b>perfectly</b>	In a manner or way that could not be better. <i>The ring fitted <b>perfectly</b>.</i>
<b><u>solely</u></b>	Without any others being included or involved. <i>He is <b>solely</b> responsible for any debts the company may incur.</i>
<b><u>stark</u></b>	Stiff, rigid, or incapable of movement. <i>The <b>stark</b> reality of life for millions of young people.</i>
<b><u>thoroughly</u></b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>She was soon <b>thoroughly</b> bored.</i>
<b><u>total</u></b>	Amount in number to. <i>He almost <b>totalled</b> the car.</i>
<b><u>totally</u></b>	Used to express agreement. <i>They came from <b>totally</b> different backgrounds.</i>
<b><u>unrelated</u></b>	Not related or linked. <i><b>Unrelated</b> facts.</i>
<b>unsuited</b>	Not easy to combine harmoniously. <i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>
<b><u>utterly</u></b>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>He looked <b>utterly</b> ridiculous.</i>
<b><u>whole</u></b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>The effects will last for the <b>whole</b> of his life.</i>
