always	Without interruption. <i>He <b>always</b> arrives on time.</i>
<u>anyhow</u>	In a careless or haphazard way. They came <b>anyhow</b> they could.
<u>collectively</u>	In conjunction with; combined. The audience <b>collectively</b> winced.
complete	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>His range of skills made him the <b>complete</b> footballer.</i>
completely	Totally; utterly. Was <b>completely</b> at fault.
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. An <b>entire</b> horse.
entirely	Solely. The traffic seemed to consist <b>entirely</b> of black cabs.
entirety	The whole of something. She would have to stay in her room for the <b>entirety</b> of the weekend.
<u>every</u>	Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <b>Every</b> party is welcome.
everywhere	To or in any or all places. <b>Everywhere</b> she went she was feted.
fully	Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>They were <b>fully</b> or amply fed.</i>



gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. The whole <b>gamut</b> of human emotion.
generic	Characteristic of or relating to a class or group of things; not specific. <i>The generic name.</i>
incessantly	Without interruption; constantly. She talked about him <b>incessantly</b> .
inclusive	(of language) deliberately avoiding usages that could be seen as excluding a particular social group, for example avoiding the use of masculine pronouns to cover both men and women. This is a testament to the <b>inclusive</b> environment fostered at our school.
<u>lifelong</u>	Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>The two men were to remain <b>lifelong</b> friends.</i>
<u>outright</u>	Directly or openly. The impact killed four horses <b>outright</b> .
perfectly	In a manner or way that could not be better. <i>The ring fitted <b>perfectly</b></i> .
<u>solely</u>	Without any others being included or involved. He is <b>solely</b> responsible for any debts the company may incur.
<u>stark</u>	Stiff, rigid, or incapable of movement. The <b>stark</b> reality of life for millions of young people.
<u>thoroughly</u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>She was soon thoroughly bored.</i>
<u>total</u>	Amount in number to. <i>He almost <b>total</b>led the car.</i>
<u>totally</u>	Used to express agreement. They came from <b>totally</b> different backgrounds.
<u>unrelated</u>	Not related or linked. <b>Unrelated</b> facts.
unsuited	Not easy to combine harmoniously. <i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>
<u>utterly</u>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>He looked <b>utterly</b> ridiculous.</i>
<u>whole</u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. The effects will last for the <b>whole</b> of his life.
