| anyhow | In a careless or haphazard way. <i>They came anyhow they could.</i> |
| collectively | In conjunction with; combined. <i>The audience collectively winced.</i> |
| complete | Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>His range of skills made him the complete footballer.</i> |
| completely | Totally; utterly. <i>Was completely at fault.</i> |
| entire | Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. <i>An entire horse.</i> |
| entirely | Solely. <i>The traffic seemed to consist entirely of black cabs.</i> |
| entirety | The whole of something. <i>She would have to stay in her room for the entirety of the weekend.</i> |
| every | Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i>Every party is welcome.</i> |
| everywhere | To or in any or all places. <i>Everywhere she went she was feted.</i> |
| fully | Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>They were fully or amply fed.</i> |

| gamut | The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>The whole gamut of human emotion.</i> |
| generic | Characteristic of or relating to a class or group of things; not specific. <i>The generic name.</i> |
| incessantly | Without interruption; constantly. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i> |
| inclusive | (of language) deliberately avoiding usages that could be seen as excluding a particular social group, for example avoiding the use of masculine pronouns to cover both men and women. <i>This is a testament to the inclusive environment fostered at our school.</i> |
| <u>lifelong</u> | Lasting or remaining in a particular state throughout a person's life. <i>The two men were to remain lifelong friends.</i> |
| <u>outright</u> | Directly or openly. <i>The impact killed four horses outright.</i> |
| perfectly | In a manner or way that could not be better. <i>The ring fitted perfectly.</i> |
| <u>solely</u> | Without any others being included or involved. <i>He is solely responsible for any debts the company may incur.</i> |
| <u>stark</u> | Stiff, rigid, or incapable of movement. <i>The stark reality of life for millions of young people.</i> |
| <u>thoroughly</u> | Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>She was soon thoroughly bored.</i> |
| <u>total</u> | Amount in number to. <i>He almost totalled the car.</i> |
| <u>totally</u> | Used to express agreement. <i>They came from totally different backgrounds.</i> |
| <u>unrelated</u> | Not related or linked. <i>Unrelated facts.</i> |
| unsuited | Not easy to combine harmoniously. <i>He was totally unsuited for the job.</i> |
| <u>utterly</u> | Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>He looked utterly ridiculous.</i> |
| <u>whole</u> | To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>The effects will last for the whole of his life.</i> |
