Associations of "At ease" (30 Words)

allay	Lessen the intensity of or calm. <i>Some stale figs partly allayed our hunger.</i>
alleviate	Provide physical relief, as from pain. <i>He couldn't prevent her pain only alleviate it.</i>
appease	Overcome or allay. <i>We give to charity because it appeases our guilt.</i>
assuage	Satisfy (an appetite or desire). <i>An opportunity occurred to assuage her desire for knowledge.</i>
comfortable	(especially of clothes or furnishings) providing physical ease and relaxation. <i>She is a comfortable person to be with.</i>
conciliate	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>Concessions were made to conciliate the peasantry.</i>
convenient	Large and roomy convenient is archaic in this sense. <i>The site would have to be convenient for London.</i>
enabling	Providing legal power or sanction. <i>Enabling power.</i>
extenuate	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>His whole frame was extenuated by hunger and fatigue.</i>
facilitate	Make (an action or process) easy or easier. <i>Schools were located in the same campus to facilitate the sharing of resources.</i>
mitigate	Make less severe or harsh. <i>There had been a provocation that mitigated the offence to a degree.</i>
mitigation	A partial excuse to mitigate censure; an attempt to represent an offense as less serious than it appears by showing mitigating circumstances. <i>The identification and mitigation of pollution.</i>

mollification	A state of being appeased or ameliorated or tempered. <i>His unsuccessful mollification of the mob.</i>
mollify	Make less rigid or softer. <i>Nature reserves were set up around the power stations to mollify local conservationists.</i>
pacify	Fight violence and try to establish peace in (a location). <i>The U N troops are working to pacify Bosnia.</i>
palliate	Make (a disease or its symptoms) less severe without removing the cause. <i>There is no way to excuse or palliate his dirty deed.</i>
placate	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>They attempted to placate the students with promises.</i>
processing	Preparing or putting through a prescribed procedure. <i>The processing of newly arrived immigrants.</i>
propitiate	Make peace with. <i>The pagans thought it was important to propitiate the gods with sacrifices.</i>
quench	An act of quenching a very hot substance. <i>Fury rose in him but he quenched it.</i>
relent	Become less severe or intense. <i>The rain relented.</i>
relieve	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i>Relieve the pressure and the stress.</i>
remit	Law the act of remitting especially the referral of a law case to another court. <i>Thus his indiscretion remitted him to the nature of an ordinary person.</i>
simplicity	Absence of affectation or pretense. <i>For the sake of simplicity this chapter will concentrate upon one theory.</i>
simplify	Make (something) simpler or easier to do or understand. <i>We had to simplify the instructions.</i>
slacken	Make slack as by lessening tension or firmness. <i>He slackened his grip.</i>
soften	Remove mineral salts from (water). <i>The bread will soften if you pour some liquid on it.</i>
soothe	Reduce pain or discomfort in (a part of the body). <i>A shot of brandy might soothe his nerves.</i>
succor	Assistance in time of difficulty.
