## Associations of "At ease" (30 Words)

<b>allay</b>	Lessen the intensity of or calm. <i>Some stale figs partly <b>allayed</b> our hunger.</i>
<b><u>alleviate</u></b>	Provide physical relief, as from pain. <i>He couldn't prevent her pain only <b>alleviate</b> it.</i>
<b><u>appease</u></b>	Overcome or allay. <i>We give to charity because it <b>appeases</b> our guilt.</i>
<b>assuage</b>	Satisfy (an appetite or desire). <i>An opportunity occurred to <b>assuage</b> her desire for knowledge.</i>
<b>comfortable</b>	(especially of clothes or furnishings) providing physical ease and relaxation. <i>She's a <b>comfortable</b> person to be with.</i>
<b>conciliate</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>Concessions were made to <b>conciliate</b> the peasantry.</i>
<b><u>convenient</u></b>	Large and roomy convenient is archaic in this sense. <i>The site would have to be <b>convenient</b> for London.</i>
<b>enabling</b>	Providing legal power or sanction. <i><b>Enabling</b> power.</i>
<b>extenuate</b>	Lessen or to try to lessen the seriousness or extent of. <i>His whole frame was <b>extenuated</b> by hunger and fatigue.</i>
<b>facilitate</b>	Make (an action or process) easy or easier. <i>Schools were located in the same campus to <b>facilitate</b> the sharing of resources.</i>
<b>mitigate</b>	Make less severe or harsh. <i>There had been a provocation that <b>mitigated</b> the offence to a degree.</i>
<b>mitigation</b>	A partial excuse to mitigate censure; an attempt to represent an offense as less serious than it appears by showing mitigating circumstances. <i>The identification and <b>mitigation</b> of pollution.</i>

<b>mollification</b>	A state of being appeased or ameliorated or tempered. <i>His unsuccessful <b>mollification</b> of the mob.</i>
<b>mollify</b>	Make less rigid or softer. <i>Nature reserves were set up around the power stations to <b>mollify</b> local conservationists.</i>
<b>pacify</b>	Fight violence and try to establish peace in (a location). <i>The U N troops are working to <b>pacify</b> Bosnia.</i>
<b>palliate</b>	Make (a disease or its symptoms) less severe without removing the cause. <i>There is no way to excuse or <b>palliate</b> his dirty deed.</i>
<b>placate</b>	Cause to be more favorably inclined; gain the good will of. <i>They attempted to <b>placate</b> the students with promises.</i>
<b>processing</b>	Preparing or putting through a prescribed procedure. <i>The <b>processing</b> of newly arrived immigrants.</i>
<b>propitiate</b>	Make peace with. <i>The pagans thought it was important to <b>propitiate</b> the gods with sacrifices.</i>
<b>quench</b>	An act of quenching a very hot substance. <i>Fury rose in him but he <b>quenched</b> it.</i>
<b>relent</b>	Become less severe or intense. <i>The rain <b>relented</b>.</i>
<b>relieve</b>	Relieve oneself of troubling information. <i><b>Relieve</b> the pressure and the stress.</i>
<b>remit</b>	Law the act of remitting especially the referral of a law case to another court. <i>Thus his indiscretion <b>remitted</b> him to the nature of an ordinary person.</i>
<b>simplicity</b>	Absence of affectation or pretense. <i>For the sake of <b>simplicity</b> this chapter will concentrate upon one theory.</i>
<b>simplify</b>	Make (something) simpler or easier to do or understand. <i>We had to <b>simplify</b> the instructions.</i>
<b>slacken</b>	Make slack as by lessening tension or firmness. <i>He <b>slackened</b> his grip.</i>
<b>soften</b>	Remove mineral salts from (water). <i>The bread will <b>soften</b> if you pour some liquid on it.</i>
<b>soothe</b>	Reduce pain or discomfort in (a part of the body). <i>A shot of brandy might <b>soothe</b> his nerves.</i>
<b>succor</b>	Assistance in time of difficulty.
