## Associations of "At the end of the day" (30 Words)

<b><a href="#">date</a></b>	Sweet edible fruit of the date palm with a single long woody seed. <i>His <b>date</b> never stopped talking.</i>
<b>deadline</b>	The point in time at which something must be completed. <i>The <b>deadline</b> of 6pm passed without incident.</i>
<b>expiration</b>	The end of a period of time. <i>The <b>expiration</b> of the lease.</i>
<b>expiry</b>	The end of a fixed period of time. <i>An <b>expiry</b> date.</i>
<b>extremity</b>	That part of a limb that is farthest from the torso. <i>The peninsula's western <b>extremity</b>.</i>
<b>february</b>	The month following January and preceding March.
<b><a href="#">finally</a></b>	Used to introduce a final point or reason. <i><b>Finally</b> it is common knowledge that travel broadens the horizons.</i>
<b>fortnight</b>	A period of two weeks. <i>Most major tennis tournaments last a <b>fortnight</b>.</i>
<b>hour</b>	The distance travelled in one hour. <i>You can't turn him away at this <b>hour</b>.</i>
<b>january</b>	The first month of the year; begins 10 days after the winter solstice.
<b>last</b>	Especially in enumerating points lastly. <i>The <b>last</b> house in the village.</i>
<b><a href="#">may</a></b>	Used to ask for or to give permission. <i>You <b>may</b> confirm my identity with your Case Officer if you wish.</i>
<b>monday</b>	The second day of the week; the first working day.
<b>month</b>	A period of time between the same dates in successive calendar months. <i>He paid the bill last <b>month</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">morning</a></b>	Every morning. <i>I've got a meeting this <b>morning</b>.</i>

<b>noon</b>	The middle of the day. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>passing</b>	In sport the action of passing a ball to another team member. <i>Thousands mourned his <b>passing</b>.</i>
<b>saturday</b>	The seventh and last day of the week; observed as the Sabbath by Jews and some Christians.
<b>season</b>	A period of the year marked by special events or activities in some field. <i>New <b>season</b> s lamb.</i>
<b><u>secondly</u></b>	In the second place (used to introduce a second point or reason). <i>He was presented first of all as a hopelessly unqualified candidate and <b>secondly</b> as an extremist.</i>
<b>sunday</b>	First day of the week; observed as a day of rest and worship by most Christians.
<b>termination</b>	The action of terminating something or the fact of being terminated. <i>Workers were informed of the <b>terminations</b> on Wednesday.</i>
<b>thursday</b>	The fifth day of the week; the fourth working day.
<b>time</b>	The rhythmic pattern of a piece of music as expressed by a time signature. <i>His <b>time</b> for the mile was 3 49 31.</i>
<b>tuesday</b>	The third day of the week; the second working day.
<b>wednesday</b>	The fourth day of the week; the third working day.
<b><u>week</u></b>	The time spent working during a week. <i>The course lasts sixteen <b>weeks</b>.</i>
<b>weekday</b>	Any day except Sunday (and sometimes except Saturday). <i>The <b>weekday</b> rush hour.</i>
<b>weekend</b>	Spend the weekend. <i>Nobody wants to work on the <b>weekend</b>.</i>
<b><u>year</u></b>	A period of time occupying a regular part of a calendar year that is used for some particular activity. <i>In the <b>year</b> 1920.</i>
